From The Pastor's Desk

Seasonally, we have now moved into my favorite time of year. I am always in awe of the colors of autumn when the leaves on the trees share their dull or bright changes from greens to yellow, red, orange, brown and gold. Flowers and bushes also seem to have a new spurt of color as if they are saying, "I'm going to be something joyful you can remember when your days seem long 2 and bleak as the winter sets in.

November is my favorite month because Thanksgiving is my favorite holiday. Most likely this resulted from the wonderful Thanksgiving celebrations I had in my home as a child, with the turkey on the table and many relatives visiting to share the day with us. Such beautiful memories.

2 The years pass and the things I am thankful for now are so very different from the ones I had as a child...but I am no less thankful for them. And I also think about what it was that I never thought to give special thanks for...and now I realize how blessed I was to have had it. 3

During the month of November, I encourage each of you to compare what it was you were thankful for as a child to what it is you currently are thankful for and see how different it might be.

It was kept burning for the whole twelve days of Christmas, and a charred fragment was kept to bring luck for the whole year...and then used as tinder for the log for the following Christmas. Open fires with blazing logs are wonderful at Christmas, and this decorated log, although not nearly as big as the original Yule log, will burn brightly, giving a gentle scent to the room."

What an image that conjures up in one's mind! Think about Christmases long ago when the season seemed to have been more "wonder-filled" and possibly simpler.

Then consider our Christmases today and compare how the dynamics have changed! No 6 more "Over the hills and through the woods to Grandmother's house we go", traveling by horse and sleigh. Today we travel by fast cars, buses, trains, and airplanes.

The Christmas surprise is no longer a single present found hanging in the stocking by the fireplace but packaged in large boxes with brightly colored paper and ribbon. Or perhaps the present is found in a colorful gift bag surrounded by green and red tissue paper. And often it will be something electronic instead of a simple wooden toy or a doll.


ROCKING HORSE PRESCHOOL



The eHarmony of Prison Reentry

As you read this story, what questions arise? How might you share this story with others in your ministry setting?

A story from our Grand Canyon Synod

Over 600,000 people are released from prison every year, and as they struggle to rejoin society, they face barriers to connecting with reentry service providers. We are honored that so many of our synods and congregations are active in prison ministry; yet they know the challenge of finding reliable and effective resources to support folks once they've been released.

Our synods are supporting reentry ministry: the Metropolitan Chicago Synod helped start the work and the Grand Canyon Synod has launched the innovative online resource the Inside Out Network (ION), a one-of-a-kind platform that helps returning citizens connect with the support they need for a successful reentry. The Grand Canyon Synod has made a strong commitment, awarding ION an "Adapting, Connecting, Transforming and Sustaining" grant so it can help people access ministries and service providers.

ION is a bit like eHarmony: returning citizens and service providers can find each other and exchange messages, even before release, to make sure returning citizens get the support they need as soon after release as possible. What started as a prison ministry from an ELCA church in the Chicago area is now operating in Illinois and Arizona and launching soon in Oregon, with 6,400 returning citizens and 443 service providers and ministries enrolled. ION is always free to returning citizens, and service providers participate free of charge for a year before paying a modest annual fee.

With the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions, ION has gone into Arizona prisons to train staff on using the platform. This has led to inmates enrolling before their release; reports indicate that as release approaches, they are less anxious, seeing ahead of time what help will be available.

ION values its partnerships with ministry and is currently developing a Reentry Congregational Initiative, gathering insights from faith communities that intentionally minister to returning citizens. Many ELCA congregations work in this area, and we welcome any insights they might provide by completing this survey. (https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/SLFWMLS). ION intends to develop a guidebook called "Effective Reentry Ministry for Ordinary Congregations"; its valuable "Spiritual Survival Guide for Prison and Beyond" can be read or downloaded free of charge from the ION website at insideoutnetwork.net/resources.

Also, thank you to Phyllis Heffner for getting all of the ingredients/ supplies we needed for the sale.




Many thanks to those church members who made and/or served lunch for the Restoring Hope volunteers on September 11th!
