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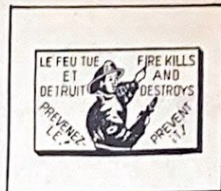

PROVINCIAL GRANTS FOR LAKESHORE HOSPITALS

Two hospitals from the West end of the Island of Montreal will receive important grants from the provincial authorities.

Mrs. Claire Kirkland-Casgrain, provincial deputy for Jacques Cartier, has made it known that the Quebec Government will introduce in its budget grants for the Lachine General Hospital and the Lakeshore General Hospital.

The Lachine General Hospital, one of the oldest ones of the West end, will receive \$1,200,000, while the Lakeshore General Hospital, a new 185-bed institution, will receive \$1,558,000.

The grant to the Lachine General will be made up of \$200,000 immediately, \$160,000 during the 1962-63 fiscal year and \$840,000 in five annual payments of \$168,000 each. The hospital is expanding from 50 to 140 beds at a cost of \$1,943,000. A public subscription brought in \$408,000 and the federal authorities made a grant of \$360,000. The provincial grant represents the balance of the money needed.

The \$1,558,000 provincial grant to the Lakeshore General is the balance of the money needed for the construction of the new hospital which was started last year. The total needed is \$3,912,000. A public subscription made up for \$1,868,000 and the hospital received a federal grant of \$466,000. The provincial grant will be made up of \$243,000 during the 1962-63 fiscal year, \$243,000 for the next fiscal year and \$1,072,000 in five annual payments of \$214,400 each.

The two hospitals receive patients from the West end of the island of Montreal and many municipalities from the neighboring Vaudreuil-

Soulanges county. Mrs. Kirkland-Casgrain has also made it known that she will introduce in the Legislative Assembly a motion concerning the payment of the local service roads of the Metropolitan Boulevard, a problem which could burden too heavily many of the small municipalities of her Jacques Cartier riding.

The motion, explained Mrs. Kirkland-Casgrain, would distribute the cost of the service roads according to the valuation rolls of the municipalities instead of being based directly on the cost of the works. This method, if the motion carries, would reduce the payments made by the smaller municipalities -- from \$82,000 to \$8,000 a year in one particular case.

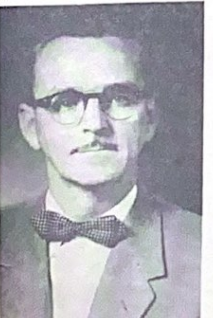
B OF M CHANGES

POLITICAL DUEL NEARS CLIMAX

All was quiet this week on the Lakeshore front as Liberal aspirant Victor Triffon prepared for what he hopes will be a political debate to victory with John Pratt over the question of serving townmasters in Ottawa and on the Lakeshore.

Pointe Claire's executive Victor Triffon accepted the urging of a number of groups to become a candidate for the Liberal nomination in Jacques Cartier-Lasalle. His first challenge so stung John Pratt that the M.P. and Mayor of Dorval busily defended himself with radio statements, and press releases to try to prove that he could carry out his two duties simultaneously.

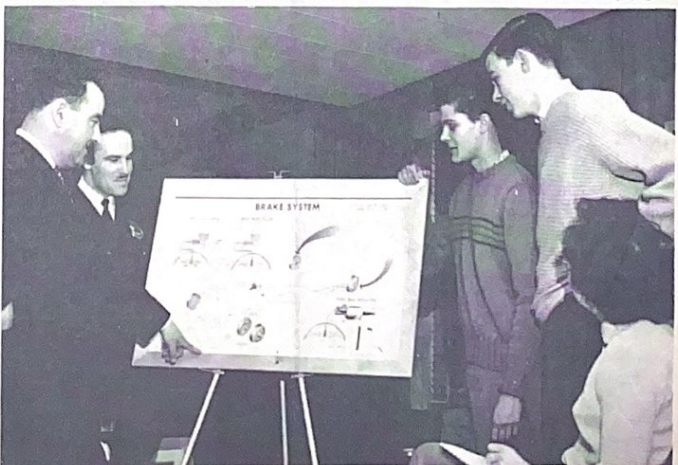
His reply was to challenge Pratt in a bilingual public hall, radio or television debate on the matter.

So far the Member of Parliament for Jacques Cartier-Lasalle has not named the time or place for the bilingual debate. It is expected that he will accept the challenge during the coming week.

In the meantime, the other two prospective Liberal nomination convention candidates, Dorval Lawyer, were busy with their local organizations. It is not definite that the latter will actually throw his hat in the ring.

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**JOHN PRATT
 REPORTS FROM OTTAWA**

At a meeting in Ottawa on October 20, a Founding Committee was established to bring into existence a Canadian Council on Urban and Regional Research.

The proposal had been sent to some 40 people representing municipal, provincial and federal governments, universities planners, engineers, architects and civic groups concerned with problems of urban and regional development. Through the hospitality of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, nearly all of these people assembled in Ottawa on October 20 for a discussion of the proposal. They decided to constitute themselves as a Founding Committee, and named an Action Committee of three of their number to make arrangements for a founding meeting at the Chateau Laurier in Ottawa March 15-17, 1962.

As long ago as 1936, the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities recommended to the Royal Commission on Dominion-Provincial Relations that a permanent body be established to conduct research in relation to problems of urban development. In subsequent years, the Federation continued to stress the need for such an undertaking.

In 1960, the Committee of Inquiry into the Design of the Residential Environment - a committee of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada - recommended the establishment of a centre of urban studies at one of the large metropolitan universities. Several other organizations responded with interest to the proposal to promote urban and regional research in Canada.

The Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities, at both its 1960 and 1961 meetings, also undertook to promote close and active working relations with other groups concerned with research and training activities in the field of local government and urban development.

Discussions between Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, the RAIC and the Federation led to a meeting in Ottawa in February when a decision was made to encourage a discussion of the needs of urban research in a number of study groups throughout Canada and to have a committee gather the results of these discussions and prepare a proposal. Out of these studies came the proposal for a Canadian Council on Urban and Regional Research.

Many organizations, including the Canadian Good Roads Association, the Conservation Council of Ontario, The Community Planning Association of Canada, the Canadian Institute of Public Administration, the Engineering Institute

of Canada, and several provincial and municipal governments -- as well as the CFMM and the RAIC -- have already been engaged in research or in promoting research, but without adequate exchange of information and ideas and with no common centre of bibliographical or digesting service. Many research projects have been carried out with aid from Part V of the National Housing Act, administered by the CMHC.

A further strong impetus to urban and regional studies has resulted from the Resources for Tomorrow Conference of October, 1961, which was held in Montreal. This coming week, the Canadian Council on Urban and Regional Research will hold a Conference at Ottawa, March 15-17, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, to consider the organization and objectives of this Council.

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DRIVER TRAINING IN DORVAL

The second Dorval Police Driver Training Course for High School students which started on January 20 and closes with a dinner at the Green Lantern Restaurant on March 24 will launch 13 trained teen-age drivers, three girls and ten boys. The students have almost completed a course of 20 hours classroom instruction and six hours car instruction. Sergeant E. Kane of the Dorval Police, who took an instructors course given by the Canadian Highway Safety Council, directs the course.

A wide area of training material is covered in the two hour Saturday morning lectures, demonstrations and films. Acting Director of Police P. Garlepy spoke to the students on "How to Protect Pedestrians", Alderman John Macdonald lectured on

"How an Automobile Runs". Alderman G.J. Gencross discusses "Sound Driving and the Importance of Driving Habits" on March 17, and Mayor Pratt will give the closing lecture on "Sportsmanship in Driving and Good Citizenship". Experts in the Automobile and Driving Fields, H.G. Gonthier of Canada Insurance Federation, and Mr. E. Dartt of Harland Automobile Ltd., were other speakers during the course. Sergeant Kane, who gives three of the 10 lectures, shows films to illustrate all lectures, and directs the car instruction. Constable M. Bourbonnais is training to assist with the car instruction.

The thorough grounding which these young drivers receive in elementary mechanics and operation of a vehicle, the human factors involved in driving, courtesy, and observ-

ance of the law is further outlined for them in booklets which they receive: "The Driver's Hand Book" from the Department of Transportation and Communications; "Motor Vehicle Practices"; provided for Bell Telephone System Drivers; "Guide to Good Driving" and "How to be a Better Teen-Age Driver. Metropolitan Life Insurance; "How the Wheels Revolve" and "We Drivers", General Motors. Students are also given a copy of the By-Laws of the City of Dorval, pertaining to Traffic.

At the close of the course, which meets the minimum requirements recommended by the Canadian Highway Safety Council, each student who successfully completes the training and tests receives a City of Dorval Certificate of Achievement and A Driver Training Card. A complete report of the First Driver Training Course has been prepared by Sergeant Kane and submitted to the Executive Director of the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

The course which has been enthusiastically greeted by teen-agers is well supported by the City Council and carefully conducted under Police supervision. It is felt that through this good relationship between police officers and students great strides will be made toward well trained and safety conscious drivers. Dorval is looking ahead in the field of Traffic Safety.

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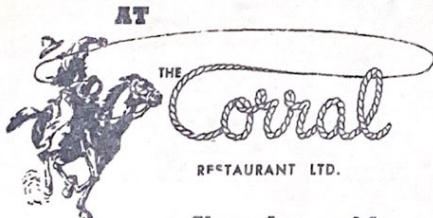
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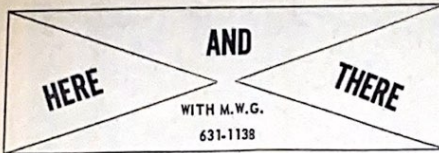

LAKESHORE HOSPITAL ANNUAL MEETING

At the second annual meeting of The Lakeshore General Hospital, President C.S. Campbell announced that the Government of the Province of Quebec has given its approval of the plan to construct a 185-bed hospital and had forwarded its official declaration of intention to make a grant of \$1,558,000 towards this project.

"This is indeed wonderful news," said President Campbell. "The Government's action is deeply appreciated by the Board of Directors and by all the supporters of the Hospital. It will enable us to authorize the completion of the final plans for the building and the undertaking of construction."

"The Provincial grant will be payable in instalments over seven years and the Hospital will be required to arrange its interim financing at its own expense which will pose some problems for the Directors."

"However, everyone is so delighted to have this 'green light' which will enable us to get on with the job of making this wonderful dream a reality."

"The last major financial problem has been surmounted and the Hospital is now assured."

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
