A Taste of Skylight Festival

Over 200 people enjoyed some aspect of A Taste of Skylight that took place April 20 and 21, 2018. The weekend began with 170 people attending a wonderful musical and spiritual exploration of Leonard Cohen by Rabbi Jeremy Parnes, Archbishop Don Bolen and Pastor Sarah Dymond, as a free pre-event. The main event began with traditional drumming by the Buffalo Boys, and a teaching message of traditional stories and challenges for reconciliation by Chief Cadmus Delorme. Roberta Nichol then serenaded the audience with her wonderful melodies and stories.

Saturday kicked off with a great talk by Zarka Nawaz, sharing some funny stories of her adjustment to the CBC schedule and moving to a thought-provoking reflection on resilience of communities in times of trouble. She described a connection made by people in Saskatchewan following the Humboldt tragedy and a bus accident in India around the same time. Saskatchewan donated significantly to the tragedy in India. When we are struck with tragedy we are more empathetic to others who experience tragedy.

The rest of the day was filled with choices of a wide diversity of speakers and

performers, including African drumming with Coffieman, a performance by Listen to Dis' about disabilities, Cindy Bourgeous speaking about transgender concerns, Jamie Arpin Ricci of Winnipeg, sharing his stories and experiences of starting a worshipping community with people on the margins, a Messy Church workshop, Blanket Exercise and more! It was a very full day that was enjoyed by those who came. We had about 70 people registered for the whole event and came in under budget. With the leftover money, the committee agreed to sponsor a performer for Skylight Festival this summer for \$500. This level of sponsorship also provides us with a free ticket so if you want to go to the Festival and this will help, contact Russell.

The event could not have happened without those who agreed to serve on the committee from all three congregations and all those who volunteered to help during the event. It was truly a Living Spirit Centre program! The committee consisted of: Janet Bjorndahl, Sarah Tkachuk, Jean MacKay and Russell Mitchell-Walker from Eastside; Rev. Nancy Yee and Diane Gingras from St. Philip; and Pastor Stewart from Bread of Life.



Russell's Reflection

The challenging quote at left is from a book I read for the Leadership in the New Parish course I have been taking in Seattle. The program has challenged my thinking and practice of ministry, and provided me with opportunity to explore what it means to be parish, listen, and try to practice what we call faithful presence in the neighbourhood. Parish is the neighbourhood that the church is in, ours being Arcola East. This quote is part of the challenge as it pushes us to get to know people who are different from us. That may be people of colour or different cultural backgrounds, but it could also be different contexts or experiences from ourselves. We have much to learn from each other, and that is part of being faithful and Christ-like. Jesus often gathered with people who were different from himself and that others were not comfortable associating with. It is about loving one another.

As I write this, I am at the beginning of my last session for the course. We will look to the sustaining the work of parish ministry - connecting with people in the neighbourhood, recognizing that it is not something that is quick, and is about Appreciation of the assets and gifts in the community, Connecting with people, and Adapting, trying small experiments with folk and learning from failure. It is my hope that we can continue to engage in this ministry together, exploring what it means to be connected to the neighbourhood as a church, that we may be a parish. There is an invitation I have made and you will see in this newsletter to get out and meet your neighbours, gather with them over the summer, get to know them or know them differently. It may not be easy, but it is important as we seek to be church in this community. Do people know who we are as Eastside United Church? What might help us be a more integral part of the community, the neighbourhood? How can we engage with others, in ways that build relationship and deepen our understandings of one another and of the love we can share? These are all questions we can explore together and I invite you to join me in this ongoing journey.



Parish Sunday, September 23

As you may know, (hopefully!) I have been taking a course at the Seattle School for Theology and Psychology called Leadership in the New Parish. Parish is the neighbourhood that the church is in. Our Parish is Arcola East. The New Parish is about the importance of the church being rooted in its neighbourhood. It is about "Practice, Presence, Place", practicing faithful presence in the community, largely by listening. Another phrase I have heard often is 'find out what God is up to in the neighbourhood and join in'. The Holy Spirit is active in the world and is up to something in our communities. Can we notice it? Can we find out what that something is?

Over the summer, I invite you to gather your neighbours in whatever way you are comfortable – for a BBQ, at a pub or restaurant, in a park – and get to know them, or get to know them better. Even if you are not in Arcola East, it is important to be rooted in your neighbourhood, so wherever you live, I invite you to try this.

We will have a Parish Sunday on September 23 where we will share stories of our experiences.





Can a Congregation Transition (to the local)?

A lot of leaders ask me about the possibility or even viability of a congregation becoming local and dwelling among its neighbours. Chris Smith from the Englewood church responds to this in an interview I did with him for the *Journal of Missional Practice*. 
A Church in Englewood and Place in our Culture (https://youtu.be/1gucswK8qUk)

Chris Smith is co-author of Slow Church and editor of the Englewood Review of Books. Here in conversation with Alan Roxburgh he describes how his own church transitioned from its life as a large city church into a vibrant neighbourhood church deeply embedded within its community. That church was able to make this transition because of its long history in that part of Englewood; the place was part of its identity. It chose to embrace this identity, even as the nature of the local population changed and became more socially and ethnically mixed. The church opted to remain in the locality even when similar churches were

leaving the city for the suburbs in so called 'white flight'.

The church went on to thrive within its local community, both in the depth of their life together, and in their relationships and care for the wider neighbourhood. Chris puts this down in part to their practice of conversation, an organised gathering of talking and listening which allowed room for conflict. Gradually, over a decade or more, the people in the congregation became more able to be present with one another, and more at ease with difference. Chris felt they were then better equipped to engage in an open way with the diversity of their surroundings, learning to resist the desire to fix or control.

This capacity to be present to one another has led to an appreciation of every person in the congregation as a gift from the God who is shaping them all within their context. Chris describes the economy of shared gifts and skills which has emerged involving individuals and also partnerships with local organisations.
