Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Recently I have been thinking about the essential nature of corporate worship for practicing Lutheran Christians. For those of us who employ elements of a more traditional liturgy in our services, it's worth asking the question from time to time, what should our liturgy aim to do? And on the flip side, what should our liturgy NOT aim to do?

On the positive side, a more traditional liturgy **should** aim to do a number of things:

- **Keep us rooted.** Psalm 145:4 says "One generation shall commend your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts." By sharing a liturgy that stretches back thousands of years, we allow generations that have gone before us to commend God's work and mighty acts to us now.
- **Keep us telling a story.** It's tempting for pastors and/or worship leaders to get stuck on their own hobby horses, their own favorite topics, and their own musical styles. A more traditional liturgy can keep us in the habit of telling a story when we gather, with a robust diet of Scripture, creeds, and prayers.
- **Keep us responding.** We hear who God is, and we respond in confession. We hear that we are for given in Christ, and we respond with praise. We hear his Word, and we respond in proclaiming what we believe. We hear the story of our redemption, and we respond with thanksgiving. The whole service is a pattern of revelation and response, and revelation and response again.
- Keep us focused on Jesus. The best thing liturgy can do is point us away from ourselves and to the glory of God revealed to us in Jesus Christ. For example, the Church Year itself, from Advent to Pentecost, annually walks us through the story of God's redemptive plan through Jesus' coming, living, dying, rising, ascending, and sending of His Spirit. For a forgetful people who are prone to wander, the insistence of liturgy to point us to Jesus is a great gift.

But on the flip side, there are a number of things liturgies of any kind shouldn't aim to do.

- Impress God. This should go without saying, but I'm going to say it anyway: our liturgy does not impress God. The beauty of our worship, excellence of our music, or modernity of our technology does not impress God. We do not employ liturgy to impress God, we employ liturgy because it's a gift from God to help us worship God. We worship God, not liturgy. God accepts our praise through Christ, not through a formulation of beautiful words.
- Impress people. Liturgy is the plate, but God is the feast. It would be ridiculous for me to ask guests at my home to eat the plate on which I serve them their food. It's similarly ridiculous for us to ask worshippers to be impressed with our liturgy. When our liturgy becomes the feast, we've got it all wrong. God is the feast, and we feast upon him in his Word. Liturgy is just another tool to help people "read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest" God's living and active Scripture.
- Impart faith. Saying the Apostles' or Nicene Creed will not impart faith upon those who recite it. Saying ancient prayers will not cause a person to mean them. Listening to the words explaining the meaning behind communion will not bring a person to put their trust in Jesus. Over time, these liturgical elements may certainly help a person make sense of their faith, learn some helpful patterns of prayer, and understand what communion is all about. But liturgy should never be expected to impart faith upon people simply by being included in a service for years in a row.

• Enliven stale services. The old saying goes "the heart of the matter is the matter of the heart". That goes for worship services too. Simply tinkering with different factors – like musical styles, service times, set design, and liturgy – will not enliven stale services. Those factors are all very much secondary. The factor of first importance is the heart. The human heart is only ever truly satisfied by the One for whom it was created to glorify and enjoy. We start with the heart: helping people see, savor, sing, and celebrate the immeasurable riches of God's grace in Jesus Christ, asking the Holy Spirit to reveal Jesus to us even more clearly.

Then our liturgy will be seen in its proper place: as a gift from God that we can use, keeping the main thing the main thing, helping to strengthen those people in our pews every Sunday.

May you hear God's Word in all its power through the ministry of Augustus Lutheran Church.

Sharing God's Bounty

Fearing God

s stewards, we are managers, caretakers, and trustees of all that God entrusts to us. Through grace, we respond to God's love and care. We live our lives and return our gifts out of gratitude and thanksgiving for who he is and what he does for us. However, if we do not include a fear of the Lord in our thinking as well as an acceptance of his grace and love, our understanding of God is incomplete. The fear of the Lord results from a recognition of our sinfulness and the separation from a just and holy God that sin causes. As our judge, God holds us accountable. He cannot and will not tolerate our sin. Because of original sin, we, by ourselves, are incapable of pleasing God. Out of his love, God sent his Son, who had no sin, to the Cross for our sins. "In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace that he lavished on us with all wisdom and understanding" (Ephesians 1:7-8).



In 2 Corinthians 5:9-11, Paul refers to our need to fear the Lord. "So we make it our goal to please him, whether we are at home in the body or away from it. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one may receive what is due him for things done while in the body, whether good or bad. Since, then, we know what it is to fear the Lord, we try to persuade men." This passage does not refer to justification because, through faith in Christ, we are justified forever. What it does refer to is the question, "What have you done with your life through faith?" We are responsible for our actions. We will "appear before the judgment seat of Christ" to answer for what we did as his stewards. We can't avoid our accountability.

In Proverbs 9:10, we are told what is meant by "fear of the Lord." "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding." As children of God, we revere him and submit to him. He is the exalted King. "For I am a great King,' says the Lord almighty, 'and my name is to be feared among the nations'" (Malachi 1:14b). We are blessed because, not only do we stand in awe of our great King, but we also rejoice in him. "Serve the Lord with fear and rejoice with trembling" (Psalm 2:11).

Through the fear of God, we see ourselves as we are ... small and sinful. Fear helps us see our need for God's mercy and grace. We submit to God because we understand our state of helplessness. The fear of the Lord is indeed the beginning of wisdom.



Give your heart to Christ, and let him direct your giving. In order for you to be what you should as a church member, you must first define and confirm your stewardship obligations and commitments between yourself and the Christ who gave his all for you. Stewardship of time, talent and possessions is the very heart of Christian discipleship and our way of expressing our love in response to God's amazing grace.


Music Challenge: Pastor Martha Kriebel will preach here – at no charge to Augustus — simply donate to the music program in October!

Devotional Meditation

Scripture Reading:

"Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into him who is the Head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work" (Ephesians 4:15-16).

Joining Together

Are you a joiner? Our insurance companies call us "members." Some publications refer to their readers as being part of their "family of subscribers." Regardless of what organizations we belong to, most of



us have "joined" them in order to extract some kind of benefit for ourselves.

It's not like this when we join the church, however. Read again our Scripture reference, especially the second half. We're joined together so that we might grow and be built up in love, as each of us does his own work for the welfare of the Body of Christ.

God gives each of us gifts so that all the needs of his body may be met, but how difficult it is for us to follow his plan! As sinners, we're often quick to judge how others use their gifts, but slow to use our own. We are tempted to compare our gifts, finding some to be more valuable than others. Yet St. Paul tells us that each is equally important in the functioning of the church.

How are these failings overcome? Peter tells us that we must speak the truth in love. What is that truth but the Word of God! St. Paul writes in Colossians 3:16, "Let the Word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom . . ." Then we will grow up in Christ, the Head. Then we can more ably use our gifts to build each other up for service to God's people and the spreading of the Gospel to the lost.

Long-term Care Insurance

As we or our parents grow older, more and more people face the probability of some day needing nursing care assistance. Therefore, many people are asking the question, "Should I consider purchasing long-term care insurance?" The purpose of long-term care insurance is to pay for the nursing care facility or other institution or a variety of home health care situations. This insurance can be important because, in most circumstances, Medicare and Medicaid do not pay for prolonged stays or needs of the elderly and disabled.



Suze Orman, the *New York Times* number-one best-selling author, gives an example of the potential benefit with long-term care insurance:

Let's say you are 55 and will need to be in a nursing home at age 84: The projected yearly cost of a nursing home 30 years from now, if you live in middle America (assuming an annual rate of inflation of 5 percent), would be \$148,176. Given that the average stay is 2.75 years, that would mean a total cost to you of about \$407,484. The total cost of a long-term care policy if started at age 55 and paid each year until you were 84 would be \$36,395. Look at the numbers: you will pay over 11 times more for the total cost of a long-term care stay than you did for the entire time you paid your premiums.

When you buy insurance, you buy it in the hope that you will never need it. The truth is that you are actually more likely to use your long-term care insurance policy than you are to use your fire or car insurance. One in 1,200 people will use his fire insurance, one in 248 people will use his car insurance, but one in four people will use his long-term care insurance.

The premiums you pay for long-term care insurance will depend on your age, health, and the choices you make, but the annual premiums can be in the thousands. If you choose to buy long-term care insurance, your policies should contain the following:

- 1. A prior stay in the hospital should not be required.
- 2. The policy should be adjusted for inflation.
- 3. The policy should be guaranteed renewable for life.
- 4. Home care should be included.
- 5. The policy should allow for a waiver of premium if its owner is institutionalized.

Insurance premiums will be much cheaper if you begin paying the premium in your 40's or 50's. Remember, it's buyer beware. It is to your advantage to compare several policies before you make your final choice.

As a Christian, "Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and your plans will succeed" (Proverbs 16:3). Insurance is a vehicle that helps us plan for the future. Through insurance we prevent the possibility of being a burden to others (2 Corinthians 11:9).
