The unmarried woman dedicates herself to the things of the Lord, that she might be holy.

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

This is a new kind of teaching that speaks with authority

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority. In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted. 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.



Teaching with authority

On one occasion I overheard a man talking to his four year old son about the danger of smoking while lighting his own cigarette. On other occasion I saw a drunken man, while empting his whiskey bottle, telling his son to stay away from drinking for it destroys life. I definitely appreciate the good intentions of both men, as they try to keep their sons away from smoking and drinking addiction. But I doubt if there was some kind of authority in passing their messages to the boys; probably their sons would laugh at them as they themselves failed to practice what they preached. For me, it was a total failure.

Saint Mark in his gospel tells us that Jesus, unlike the scribes, teaches with authority. The people were amazed at his teaching in the synagogue. With a great admiration they commented, "What is this? A new teaching with authority. He commands even the unclean spirits and they obey Him." A question that pops up in our mind is "Why did the scribes fail to teach with authority?" Certainly, the Scribes taught the right



message to their people. However, it lacks authority as they fail to put into practice what they teach to others. The scribes were good at teaching but not at doing. They failed to be living examples of what they taught.

For the people, the authority of a teaching must be shown in deeds. Jesus, on the other hand, is good at both teaching and deed. His words are always accompanied by his deeds, and his deeds are invariably in consonance with his

words. When he taught about love, for example, he proved it by his own example. He willingly offered his life on the cross for us, even "while we were still enemies" because of our sins (cf. Rom 5:8). He proved to be true to his own words, "No greater love than for a man to give his life for his friends." It is understood that he could demand from us to do what he did for us. He said: "A new commandment I give unto you, that you love one another as I have loved you" (Jn 13:34). As followers of Christ, do we live by his examples? Often our words are meaningless for far too often they are not accompanied by deeds. Moreover, Jesus teaches with authority because he is God. He is the creator or author of life. Unlike the scribes who in their teachings probably "copied and pasted" from other rabbis, Jesus' preaching comes from himself. As the Word of God He is the source of his own teaching.


As followers of Christ, how can we teach with authority? Through baptism we share his divine life. Hence we have the ability to teach with authority which means our words teach the gospel values and our practical life becomes a living example of what we preach. Underlining the importance living example, Saint Francis of Assisi says, "Preach the Gospel at all times. When necessary, use words." Or "it is no use walking anywhere to preach unless our walking is our preaching."

From disgrace to Amazing Grace

"Amazing Grace" is one of the most popular Christian songs. Composed by John Newton, the song reveals the faith journey of John Newton 'from disgrace to amazing grace' (Jonathan Aitken). He was a slave ship captain but converted to Christ on the high seas. Following his conversion he fought to end the slave trade. On his granite tombstone located at a small cemetery of a parish churchyard in Olney, England, one will find the following inscription: "John Newton, clerk [pastor], once an infidel & Libertine, a servant of slavers in Africa, was, by the rich mercy of our Lord & Savior Jesus Christ, preserved, restored, pardoned, and appointed to preach the Faith he had long labored to destroy." May Newton's conversion inspire us to respond to Jesus' call: "Repent, and believe in the Good News."

#24 UPDATE: GENERAL LITURGICAL **GUIDELINES COVID-19**

Implications for the **Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne**

As of 11:59pm Sunday 17th January 2021:

- All people must carry a fitted face covering when leaving home unless they have a lawful reason not to.
- The wearing of fitted face coverings is no longer mandatory in all public indoor settings. Face coverings continue to be mandatory in the following locations:
 - on public transport or when riding in a ride share or taxi;
- inside shopping centres, including the retail stores inside shopping centres, such as clothing stores;
- inside indoor markets;
- in large retail stores (over 2000 sqm), such as department stores, electronics stores, furniture stores, hardware stores or supermarkets
- on domestic flights to and from Victoria and at air-
- when working in or visiting hospitals and care facili-
- It continues to be recommended that fitted face coverings be worn in other situations if physical distancing of 1.5m is not possible (including outdoor gatherings).

Under no circumstances should anyone awaiting a COVID-19 test verification, including Clergy (even without presenting symptoms) attend a church or parish setting until a diagnosis is confirmed. Additionally, under no circumstances should anyone attend who is closely connected to people who are awaiting test results or who have tested positive.

Places of Worship and Religious Gatherings

- All places of worship including churches, adoration chapels and other church buildings used for public prayer and religious services may open for permitted religious ceremonies. Religious gatherings can be held indoors or outdoors. Venues must apply the 1 person per two square metre rule to ensure people have enough room to maintain 1.5 metres distance between them. There are no group limits;
- The two square metre rule can be used only if electronic record keeping is used, otherwise, the four square metre rule must apply. The square metre rule doesn't include babies under 12 months of age;
- Record Keeping is required for all attendees beyond a 15 -minute visit - and must include: First Name + Contact Number + date and time at which the person attended the place of worship. Records must be kept for 28 days;
- People must carry a face covering at all times. Fitted face coverings must be worn indoors by all participants unless they have a lawful exemption or are children under 12 years of age.
- Hygiene precautions must continue to be maintained throughout;
- Doors must remain closed to prevent public access if there is no-one available to ensure that particular number limits are maintained;
