The Assistance Fund tries to approve people for assistance within 24 hours because they know time is of the essence in many cases. ### Check Manufacturer Websites for Rebates

Manufacturers of brand-name drugs often offer rebates or other assistance to get people to try their medications at deep discounts or

for free. You will need to visit the drug manufacturer's website to learn whether any coupons, rebates or introductory offers available.

Always talk to your physician if you cannot afford your prescription. He or she may be able to recommend other resources to help you. Skipping your prescriptions is never a good choice.



# Bankruptcy 101:

SAYING GOODBYE TO THE STIGMA OF BANKRUPTCY

In 2011 there were 1.4 million consumer bankruptcy filings (Federal Court Website- www. Since then uscourts.gov). consumer bankruptcy filings have averaged over 1 million per year. Bankruptcy is now commonplace because it has become the only affordable source of financial planning for a large segment of the financially distressed population. This recessionary economy which is now the new and apparently sustained state of the world's financial outlook has dried up funds that used to be available through lending institutions, family members, savings and home equity. It is further complicated by creditors' unwillingness general work with debtors by offering reasonable payment plans to help them get caught up. So, for many people, the choice becomes whether to pay bills or put food on the table.

Beyond this, there is the continued fallout from the housing crisis and the still high number of foreclosures and people who are "underwater" on their mortgages. For these people, the choice is pay bills or lose the roof over their head. There is also extremely high inflation and everincreasing gas prices with no end in sight. It used to be that grocery items would increase in penny increments. Now, it is not unusual to see them increase in fifty cent or even one dollar or greater increments. Further, there are the government entities at every level which are constantly looking for

anything and everything that can be taxed, ticketed, or fined. On top of this and most pernicious and reprehensible is the human greed factor: The politicians who live lavishly off the sweat of the taxpayer's brow and put their own self interest, always, above that of the people. The large corporations who overcharge and engage in less than ethical business practices. And certain individuals and businesses who out of desperation or dishonesty take advantage of others in the name of the almighty dollar. Certainly, it is not all politicians, corporations, people or businesses. But it is too many.

The law of Bankruptcy is the only tool that middle-class Americans must level the playing field. The fact is without it many people would be homeless or unable to survive. When I started in this business twenty-six years ago there was a stigma attached to filing bankruptcy. And it really was not justified even then because the largest part of our clientele was made up of people who had catastrophic medical bills and no insurance. But it was perpetuated because there were a certain percentage of filings attributable to people who had simply "over lived" by spending too much on fancy cars, vacations, clothes and "toys" and used the filing to "skate" out of their debt. This type of bankruptcy simply no longer exists. Yes, it was tightened up in 2005 with the introduction of more stringent laws. But the main reason it does not exist anymore is because people have not had the money or the mindset to engage in that type of frivolous spending for some time. Moreover, the

government has forced lenders to tighten credit to the extent that people are not able to borrow for frivolous unsecured purchases anymore.


The people who use bankruptcy now are honest, decent people who are using it to survive. They basically fall into two types. First, there are the people who are in an emergency. They are using bankruptcy (whether chapter 7 or chapter 13) to stop a lawsuit, a foreclosure, creditor harassment, a garnishment, utility shutoff, prevent a car from being repossessed or any number of the other types of relief it provides. And, second, are the people who see the disaster coming and want to cut it off at the pass so to

speak. Either way, Bankruptcy is financial planning. It is a mechanism by which one can exercise control over his or her financial future in a positive way.

Further, the stigma is largely gone. It has become like divorce. In the fifties and sixties people who got divorced were stigmatized. Now it is the norm. Anyone that made comments about a person because they got a divorce, nowadays, would be considered ignorant. It is the same with bankruptcy. Bankruptcy is a relatively affordable and fast mechanism by which one in financial distress can simplify their lives and regain their peace of mind. That is why so many people are using it. I always try to remind and encourage people that if you are truly in financial distress you need to recognize it and admit it so that you can fix it. You need to know financial hardship is temporary and fixable. Like anything, the earlier you fix it the better off you'll be. And the more money you and your family will have to start fresh and begin to live in peace again.



We have studied the project appearing on the March 17, 2020 primary ballot known as Issue 1. We strongly recommend a YES vote for Issue 1 and explain our reasons for support in this editorial endorsement.

Issue 1 is a thoughtful and comprehensive repurposing of land that has generated almost no value for the City of Mentor or the citizens of Mentor the last 100 years. The property in question is located near the junction of I-90 and State Route 615. The property has been in the hands of the same family for more than a century and was originally a farm.

Issue 1 offers Mentor voters a deal too good to turn down. First, the project will create a new 70-acre public park with miles of walking

trails that will be permanently protected and privately funded. Mentor families will be able to walk, run and hike among some of the oldest trees in Ohio (some estimated to be over 100 years old) without paying any fees or higher taxes. That is a big win for Mentor.

Second, the project will create a new town center for Mentor, something we seem always to have been missing. The town center will include new walkable neighborhoods with new home styles not currently available in Mentor. We envision these neighborhoods serving both existing Mentor families looking for a new experience and, importantly, young families coming to Mentor. This latter group will help reverse the trend of our public schools losing student population. The town center will include amenities and public spaces for Mentor residents to gather and socialize. Such public gathering places are few and far between in Mentor, even given the size of our city.

Finally, this project WILL NOT raise anyone's taxes. In fact, it will be a source of new tax revenue that will help hold down future tax increases in other parts of Mentor. We view this project as a thoughtful combination of new public park space and a new town center. For that reason, we urge Mentor voters on March 17 to vote YES on Issue 1.

The Lake County General Health District (LCGHD) is now offering a free online opioid overdose prevention training and naloxone distribution through its Project DAWN (Deaths Avoided With Naloxone) program. Participants will receive online training to recognize the signs and symptoms of overdose, distinguish between different overdose types, perform rescue breathing, call EMS, and administer naloxone. The online education and distribution program will be available to Lake county residents, as well as residents of other Ohio counties who do not currently have a Project DAWN program.

The online program is easy to use:

- 1. Visit https://www.lcghd.org/ naloxone-distribution/.
- 2. Click the "Request a Kit" link to complete a survey and training video.

LCGHD staff will review all naloxone requests, and mail the naloxone kit to all eligible recipients within 72 hours of the request.

"LCGHD is dedicated to ensuring access to naloxone regardless of one's ability to travel or self-advocate, commented Haley Russo, Health Educator and coordinator of the LCGHD's Project DAWN, an overdose education and naloxone distribution program. The Ohio Department of Health reports that in 2018, 84% of unintentional drug overdose deaths in Ohio resulted from opioids.





# Safe Dog Handling for Seniors

Owning a pet can contribute to better health and a more active lifestyle. As more seniors become/ continue to be pet owners, the benefits of owning a pet dog may come with some unfortunate side effects.

A recent University study Pennsylvania found emergency room patients 65 and older with injuries from walking leashed dogs increased from 1,671 injuries in 2004 to nearly 4,400 in 2017. Nearly 80 percent of those patients were women, most commonly with hip fractures followed by injuries to the wrist or upper arm.

While some of these incidents be attributed to the environment (slippery sidewalks etc.) many of the incidents were likely a result of a dog that was not trained to walk on leash. Leash skills are critical for any dog owner, but become increasingly important as the dog-owning population ages and more seniors are enjoying pet ownership.

Things to consider if you

are a senior or know a senior considering adding a dog to the household:

- Energy Level: Make sure that your physical condition and lifestyle can accommodate the dog's exercise needs
- Size of the Adult Dog: Large and giant breeds may be too physically demanding for a senior, particularly if the dogs have poor leash skills and manners (jumping.) Large dogs may also prove difficult to transport.

# ivorce 101:

Divorce v. Dissolution: What is the difference?

This article simplistically identifies the main issues in the termination of the marital contract and explains the difference between a divorce dissolution. The issues in the termination of the marital contract are as follows: (1.) Allocation of Parental Rights and Responsibilities if there are children. The main issues regarding the allocation of parental rights and responsibilities would include who pays child support and how much, companionship time, formerly known as "visitation", who has custody or how is shared parenting, formerly known as 'joint custody", to be allocated, who is responsible for health care/ insurance and how will the tax exemption be divided. (2.) Spousal support. Will one party pay the other spousal support and how much and for how long? (3.) Property distribution. How will the marital real and personal property and all other marital assets be divided. (4.)

Pension and retirement division, if in existence. And, finally, (5.) Allocation of marital debt. These are the main issues in every divorce and/or dissolution.

The most fundamental difference between a contested divorce and a dissolution and/ or uncontested divorce is that in a contested divorce, the parties cannot agree on one or more of the issues; whereas, in dissolution or an uncontested divorce, the parties are in agreement. Dissolutions and uncontested divorces are very cost effective and can be finalized in as little as six weeks from the date of the filing. The cost of the divorce or dissolution will vary on the number of issues in the case. In a dissolution or uncontested (no fighting) divorce the financial cost can be dramatically less than a contested divorce (the parties cannot agree on one or more of the issues) but, most importantly, the emotional cost to both parties and their children, if applicable, is much lower.

An action for divorce- if the parties cannot come to a voluntary agreement- can easily take a year or longer to finalize. There is the dread of runaway attorney fees averaging \$250-\$300 per hour. In a contested divorce (where the people are actively fighting) there is always the worry (which is justified) that the attorney will quit if you run out of money or the fear of receiving another several thousand dollar bill unexpectedly. The information gathering process referred to as "discovery" can become a costly and stressful nightmare. Discovery is not required with dissolution.

The emotional price of continuous daily resentment, depression, fear and worry can become overbearing and destructive to one's health. Dissolution avoids all of this. That being said; It is very difficult to get two people who are usually not the best of friends to begin with to agree on all issues. All issues must be agreed to for a successful dissolution to occur. This requires compromise. The cardinal rule is that nobody walks away happy. Each party usually feels wronged in some way by the other. Each party usually feels that they could have obtained a better result if they would have just held out longer or been more aggressive. The truth is the law is pretty settled on how property and children are resolved. In most cases, you will not get a better result by engaging in prolonged litigation.

If the parties are unable to come to an agreement regarding all the issues, as is often the case, a divorce must be initiated. I try to resolve as many issues as possible before hand and communicate with the other party or his/her attorney to coordinate the process. It is always best to work together and focus upon resolution of the issues on which the parties agree. The purpose of the attorney is to make the process as minimally painful, and least expensive as possible. Open and honest communication is key. Unfortunately, in many cases, the parties have so much resentment toward each other

that they are simply unable to cooperate. This is never in anybody's best interest and can be very damaging to children.

There are certainly ways to minimize the pain and cost of a divorce but it will never be as efficient and emotionally healthy as two parties coming to a voluntary agreement with dissolution. I believe that a dissolution really should be possible in most cases if two factors are present (1.) the parties are mature, sensitive and intelligent and (2.) the matter is approached with a cost versus benefit business analysis, an open mind and sound professional guidance. I know this is easier said than done. But- if accomplished- the financial and emotional rewards (including healing time) reaped are enormous for the parties and children and will be enjoyed for the span of one's entire life.


