PER CAPITA PAYMENTS DUE

Each year the Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly assess our church a Per Capita fee for every member of the congregation. The Per Capita fees are essentially dues for the services received from these governing bodies of the Presbyterian Church.

For 2017, First Presbyterian's assessment is **\$44.00** per member, which the church pays regardless of how much is collected. Please take **\$44.00** times the number of church members in your family and send that amount in a separate check made out to First Presbyterian, with "Per Capita" in the memo line.

The difference between what First Presbyterian owes and what is collected from the congregation will come out of the church budget. Thank you for taking care of this so that the church can take care of its many other budget needs.




PASTOR'S MESSAGE...

A question that I asked to be discussed around each of the tables at the Annual Meeting was: "What is it that you think God wants to see most at First Presbyterian Church?" I also issued a couple of "ground rules" with questions. Two answers not allowed were: 1) "more members" and 2) "young families with children." Of course, both would be great to see. But those answers are "too obvious." But also, are we sure that those are what *God wants to see most?* Ahead of anything else?

The question is an appropriate one to ask at such a meeting as we look ahead to the 2017 year. It also is an appropriate question as the church begins to anticipate a search for a new pastor over the year ahead (upon my announcement of retiring at the end of 2017).

I would encourage you to continue to ponder that question, and talk about it with one another—as you go about being the great church in 2017 that you were in 2016. As you continue to love and serve your Lord through your worship and prayers, your study as you continue to develop your faith, and your serving others.

And, as you prepare for the season of Lent which is on the horizon, beginning March 1 with the Ash Wednesday service as ashes and communion...and the new steps in faith that await you, and await us all.


<u>CCC OUTDOOR CLASSROOM</u> FUNDRAISER

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

I'd like to share with you my experiences as I take classes with Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. Luther Seminary has made many changes in the past few years as they shift their focus towards creating the best online Seminary program in the country. There are a good handful of students who live on campus, or in the Twin Cities, but the classes I take are mostly filled with students from all over different areas of the country, and world.

"Students" is a funny term to use, as the people I am learning with are currently lawyers, counselors, youth directors and city newspaper staff. These Seminarians are all coming from different walks of life as they discern what their future holds, and what God is calling them towards. Many have felt the call to ministry since they were a child; some have been able to follow that call immediately after college, and some have waited 20-30 years before finally pursuing their Ministry of Divinity Degree towards being a Pastor in the ELCA church.

Those studying towards their Master of Arts Degree, like I am, come from many different backgrounds. Many of us work in the church, while most of us live all over the country. There are very few who study full-time, either living on campus or near Luther Seminary. Not every student studying these degrees are Lutheran and it's always exciting to find out the background of our many students within each class. There's always an interesting story about what has brought each individual to study at Luther, and what they plan to do with the degree they achieve.

This past January, I took two classes at Luther, both taught by Professor Andy Root, who is mentioned as one of the leading scholars in youth ministry and practical theology in the world. The two classes discussed the theological frameworks of our work in children, youth and family ministries, and the role of family and childhood within the church. We discussed the theological implications within Children's Sermon, Confirmation, and the role of the church in family life, childhood, including the impact of divorce. The classes covered many topics, and were incredibly intriguing to discuss with seminarian students from all over the world.

I took note of the students in my classes as we discussed "Family, Childhood and the Church." We had several international students within the course, ranging from Ethiopia, Madagascar, Nigeria, the Philippines, and more. We learned of the different types of "family" in their cultures, and the role of the church within it all. It was fascinating to hear of their stories, and they were excited to learn more about the American culture and religions as well.



CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

I'm greatly enjoying my studies at Luther Seminary. Last semester was a learning time for me, juggling three classes, a new puppy, and work life here, but what this first semester did was inspire me for the road that is ahead. This isn't college, where you skim everything you're supposed to read, "cram hard" for each test, and forget the information as soon as possible. This is a time where I sincerely want to learn all this is being offered, look forward to the discussions from experts within my class, and am inspired by each professor's different style of teaching, and theological spin on everything discussed.

It's true what they say about God having a path set out for you. I juggled with the idea of attending Seminary for the past several years, and just last January, met with an admissions rep at a youth workers conference, and here I am! I am so thankful for all the support I've heard from our members of the congregation, and I look forward to seeing how all these lessons tie into the ministry and life of First Presbyterian Church in the future.

Thank you for this opportunity to learn, and the support you've shared with me. I hope to continue on to share all I can in these years of study together!

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES (from minutes and meetings)

Business and Finance—Parish Nurse task force has met. There will be bulletin inserts requesting input from the congregation.

Administrative and Personnel—The Procurement Policy is being clarified and the Church Manual was presented to Session to review for possible corrections. Email addresses of Session members may be posted on the bulletin board so the congregation has easy access. There have been no applicants for the position of organist.

Property and Equipment—The bill for snow removal in December was over \$4,000. A letter was sent to the company that "fixed" the elevator documenting ongoing problems.

Worship and Music—The communion dates for this year will be the first Sunday of each month with the addition of Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Easter Sunday (not the first Sunday in April) and Christmas Eve.

Christian Education—The Adult Ed class continues to meet on Sunday Mornings. A Lenten series is planned for Tuesdays at noon. \$1,453 was received in Christmas Eve offerings to be used for VBS. Each confirmation student will have a mentor.

Membership—There will be pizza served before the annual meeting Sunday, January 29th. The committee is seeking new members.

Stewardship—Names from time and talent surveys were given to various committees. The committee will not use the Pony Express pledge method next time. In 2016 pledged income was up but non-pledged income was down.

Nominations—Ella Gutzke will chair the 2017 Nominating Committee with Carole Watrel as co-chair.

REPORTS OF RELATED GROUPS

Child Care Center Board—Fundraiser is going well. The CCC is in the process of renewing its state license.

OTHER BUSINESS

Session approved regular meetings at 6:00 pm on the fourth Tuesday of the month.

Pastor Reiter will be serving on the Presbytery Committee on Ministry. His time away will be Jan. 30th-Feb. 3rd.

Jim Skaret gave an overview of the work of the Presbytery of Northern Plains. Session approved sending Jim and Ella Gutzke as Commissioners to the next Presbytery meeting in West Fargo in April.

The church bylaws need to be reviewed.

Pastor Reiter explained the additional goals from the Presbytery's Designated Pastor Call and Covenant. The Session will work on sustainability and visioning. Pastor Reiter announced that he would be retiring at the end of 2017. Jim Skaret will contact Presbytery Clerk to see when and how a new search might begin.


