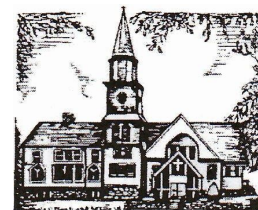

A Word From Rev Jackson



Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ:

Welcome to June and the summer season! We rejoice that the plague of COVID seems to be finally going away. I would ask each of us a question. What have we learned since March of 2020? How have we grown or not grown spiritually since this crisis began? Have we read any scriptures that spoke to us during this time? What has God communicated to us in our prayer life over this period?

One of the spiritual practices that I have been using is examining the meaning behind the verses of our favorite hymns. The one I would share with you is, "What A Friend We Have In Jesus". Consider the third verse. "Are we weak and heavy laden, cumbered with a load of care? Precious Savior, still our refuge - Take it to the Lord in prayer; Do thy friends despise, forsake thee? Take it to the Lord in prayer; In His arms He'll take and shield thee, Thou wilt find a solace there". The verse starts out by offering a solution to our "load of care". It recognizes that we are weak and the cares pile up. It reminds us that He is still the ultimate peace and refuge. The verse directs us to the best place to bring our "load of care"...Jesus.

If you have ever had a "friend" despise or forsake you, then you can relate to this next verse. This verse reminds me of what Jesus said in John 15:18-21. *"If the world hates you, keep in mind that it hated me first. If you belonged to the world, it would love you as its own. As it is, you do not belong to the world, but I have chosen you out of the world. That is why the world hates you. Remember what I told you: 'A servant is not greater than his master.' If they persecuted me, they will persecute you also. If they obeyed my teaching, they will obey yours also. They will treat you this way because of my name, for they do not know the one who sent me."* It hurts a lot when a friend betrays us and then turns around and hates us as well. But, it does happen even in the church, which is what makes it even worse. However, the verse from the hymn gives us the solution: "Take it to the Lord in prayer. In His arms He'll take and shield thee, thou wilt find a solace there." We are called to give it to the Lord in prayer and know that we are

shielded and protected by Jesus. In this place we will find solace, or peace, or trust that will never let us down. In this world of shaky friendships, it is comforting to know our one true friend.

When Joseph Scriven wrote this prayer of comfort for his mother in Ireland, I am sure he encountered some of the examples he wrote about in the Plymouth Brethren Church. He experienced "loads of care" as his two fiancées died tragically, one by drowning and the second from pneumonia. When he was asked about the poem, he said that "he and God wrote it".

What are some of your favorite hymns? What are the verses that really speak to you? Please let me know.

If you have a prayer request or would like us to remove someone from our prayer list, please let us know.



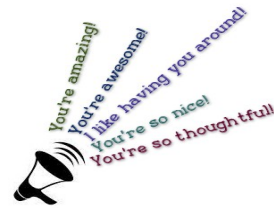

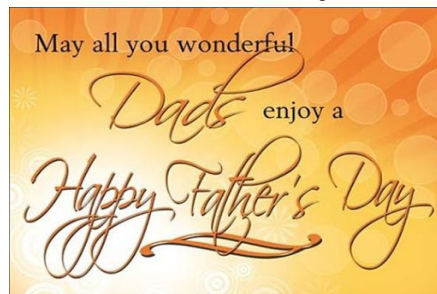
