FROM THE ARCHIVES

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN'S FIRST CHIURCH

When the church published its 195th Anniversary issue Newsletter it showed pictures of all of the First Presbyterian Church buildings: the current building (occupied since 1952), the 1885 building, with the little black cross (more about that later in the year), the white church built in 1855 and what looks to be a row of houses captioned "How the First Presbyterian Church appeared in 1825." You mean that First Presbyterian could not afford a church building until 1855 and met in people's houses? Not really. As I mentioned in September, they did meet in member's homes at first, but did finally get the land for a church. The original church building, built in 1827, was built completely by members of the congregation. The first church is described as a white frame church with a steeple which barely surmounted the stately trees about it. Since photography was in its in-





fancy in those days, there are no photographs of the building which housed the congregation until 1855. At that time the original building was sold and cut in two, and moved to East Fourth Street and Roosevelt Avenue. That is the picture in the church history collection. The houses were moved again to 326 and 328 East Fourth Street and one of the buildings (328 East Fourth Street) still stands.

Star Fish Friend:

In order to address restrictions imposed during the Covid-19 outbreak, Star Fish suspended their normal operations in March. They then worked with the *Plainfield Food Security Project*, a coalition of non-profits helping feed the hungry. As of August, Star Fish is again open for normal food services to people in need.

Star Fish is still a donor to the Project which operates out of Parking Lot 7 at the corner of Park Avenue and East Seventh Street in Plainfield every Thursday. This is a one-day effort—the produce and/or groceries come in

CHILDREN'S CORNER

Parents, please read this to your younger child(ren)

Theme:_Do what you tell others to do.

Scripture: Matthew 23:1-12

Lead kids through a couple rounds of Simon Says. In Simon Says, the leader tells kids things to do but they have to listen closely. If you say, "Simon says," then kids do the motion. If you don't say, "Simon Says," kids don't do the motion.



After a few rounds of Simon Says, say: You guys did a

great job playing Simon Says. Let's play it the opposite way. You still need to listen to me say, "Simon Says" before you do a motion. But, in this Opposite Simon Says, you will do the opposite of what I say. If I say, "Simon says, 'don't touch your head,' you will do the opposite and touch your head." Let's try this.

Simon says, "don't clap your hands." (Kids should clap their hands because they're doing the opposite thing.)

Say these things for kids to do the opposite: "Simon says, 'Stand up.'" (Kids will sit.)

"Stand up." (Kids should not move.)

"Simon says, 'Sit down.'" (Kids will stand up.)

"Simon says, 'Don't pat your head.'" (Kids will pat their head.)

"Simon says, 'Don't stop patting your head.'" (Kids will stop.)

"Pat your stomach." (Kids should not move.)

"Simon says, 'Don't practice what you preach." (Kids will be confused.)

Have kids sit down.

Practice what you preach. What does that mean? (Pause.) I think it means that if you tell someone to do something, you need to do it, too. Practice what you preach means don't do the opposite thing that you say. Instead do what you say others should do.

In our Bible lesson today, Jesus had something to say about "practicing what you preach." Jesus was talking about the teachers of the law and the Pharisees in the synagogue where people went to worship. Jesus said that everything that they did was done so that others would see them and think how great they were. But they didn't do what they told other people to do. In fact, they did the opposite!

What did Jesus tell us to do about teachers like these? (Pause.)

You might think Jesus would say, "Don't listen to them! You don't have to do what they say." But He didn't. Jesus said, "Obey these teachers and do everything they say. But do not do what they do, because they do not practice what they preach." When it comes to living the Christian life, we need to make sure we do what we say.

Here's a little poem that would be good to remember.







World Community Day-November 6th

Theme: "Resolve to Love"

World Community Day began in 1943 as a day for church women across denominations to study peace. After World War II, the leaders thought that while many denominations were performing peace and justice work by themselves, having a day when they could study together would be beneficial to all.

World Community Day continues to emphasize peace but has been broadened to include justice, a vital partner of peace. The once clear categories of "domestic" and "foreign" were consciously blurred so the global scope of the wide range of problems could be emphasized on World Community Day.

As Christians, we are called to nurture and cultivate life-giving community — within our families, our churches and God's world — even during times of strife and discord. We are called to "resolve to love" as a grateful response to the one who "became flesh and lived among us … full of grace and truth" (John 1:14).

Veterans Day—November 11th Thanks to all U.S. Veterans and our Allies

It's a day for honoring all veterans — so no apostrophe needed as in "Veteran's Day" or "Veterans' Day".

Veterans Day is NOT the same as Memorial Day. A lot of Americans get this confused.

Memorial Day is a time to remember those who gave their lives for our country or from wounds suffered in battle. Veterans Day honors all of those who have served the country in war or peace — dead or alive but is largely intended to thank living veterans for their sacrifices.

Veterans Day was originally called Armistice Day, commemorating the end of World War I when the fighting ended on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918. In 1954 the word "armistice" was change to "veterans" to honor American veterans of all wars.



World War I was a multinational effort, so it makes sense that our allies also celebrate their veterans on Nov. 11. The name of the day and the types of commemorations differ. Canada and Australia both call Nov. 11 "Remembrance Day." Canada's observance is similar to our own, except many of its citizens wear red poppy flowers to honor their war dead. In Australia, the day is similar to our Memorial Day. Great Britain calls it "Remembrance Day," but observes it on the Sunday closest to Nov. 11 with parades, services and two minutes of silence in London to honor those who lost their lives in war.





Thanksgiving Day Thursday, November 26, 2020

What comes to mind when you think of Thanksgiving? Do you picture a time of thankfulness toward God—or is it merely one of eating, partying or watching football?

Scripture tells us in Philippians 4:6-7 that the peace of God guards us when we pray with thanksgiving. May our prayers for Thanksgiving enrich our lives as we turn our focus to God's many promises and blessings. Giving thanks through prayer has power to turn anxiety into peace, sadness into joy, and grief into comfort.

As Christians, we can reclaim Thanksgiving. Rather than just being a day where we eat too much and strategize our Black Friday sales plan of attack, we can go back to our historical and spiritual roots as we give thanks to God. When we give thanks to God for the good things in our lives, we are honoring His provision, protection, and steadfast love.

For Christians, Thanksgiving not only has a patriotic history, but it also has spiritual roots that go back to the Old Testament.

Thanksgiving Day, a national holiday in the United States celebrates the harvest and other blessings of the past year. Americans generally believe that Thanksgiving is modeled on a 1621 harvest feast shared by the English colonists (Pilgrims) and the Wampanoag people (North American Indians). The holiday is particularly rich in legend and symbolism, and the traditional fare of the meal typically includes turkey, bread stuffing, potatoes, cranberries, and pumpkin pie. This holiday is often the busiest of the year, as family members gather with one another.
