Cascadia Subduction Earthquake

 OSSPAC Report-Oregon Resilience Plan reveals the following time frames for service recovery under present conditions:

Critical Service	Zone	Estimated Time to Restore Service
Electricity	Valley	1 to 3 months
Electricity	Coast	3 to 6 months
Police and fire stations	Valley	2 to 4 months
Drinking water and sewer	Valley	1 month to 1 year
Drinking water and sewer	Coast	1 to 3 years
Top-priority highways (partial restoration)	Valley	6 to 12 months
Healthcare facilities	Valley	18 months
Healthcare facilities	Coast	3 years

Lessons Learned from:

Hurricane Katrina

Less than 20% of first responders returned to work.

Joplin Missouri Tornado

The tornado caused 161 fatalities and 1,371 injuries as of May 27, 2011, making it the single deadliest U.S. tornado since 1947 and the seventh deadliest in U.S. history.



Increase disaster preparedness/awareness with your employees using the following methods:

- Newsletters with periodic reminders.
- Invite a guest speaker (local Emergency Manager, CERT)
- Post flyers around the office with tips on how to be more prepared.
- Solicit volunteers from workgroups to be an advocate.
- Mail home seasonal letters to your employees and their families.
- Offer training during work hours.



How it's done in Eugene:

- The City of Eugene is currently hosting a year long Emergency Preparedness Campaign within their department which includes:
 - Monthly preparedness themed <u>emails</u> to all staff;
 - Tips, tricks, and videos to be better prepared as an employee and citizen of our community posted on internal websites;
 - Offering supplies for employees to build their kits for purchase during <u>National Preparedness Month</u>.



Preparedness Kits:

- Personal Preparedness Kit
- Employee Jump Kit
- Team Kits

72 hours vs. 2 weeks supply



Personal Preparedness Kit could include:


- Water container w/water
- Water purification
- Backpack to carry everything
- Light w/batteries
- Knife or multi-tool with knife included
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- Para-cord 50ft. min.
- « Gloves and extra clothing, shoes as needed (winter/summer etc.)
- « Glasses, sunscreen, lotion, Vaseline, TP
- Cell phone with battery backup
- * Light weight blanket or plastic added
- * Lighter and fire starter (cotton balls in Vaseline)
- Extra set of clothes/shoes
- Food/snacks





Employee Jump Kit could include:

- Pack or bag or case
- Cell phone w/battery back and charging cable
- & Laptop
- * 12 volt USB car jack
- Emergency contact information
- Misc. cords and jacks (common)
- « Glasses, note pads, pen etc.
- & Money (change/cash)
- & Hygiene/Meds supplies and towel
- Blanket & pillow
- Food / water
- Reference materials and checklists





A Team Kit could include:

- * Flashlights
- Batteries
- & Hand crank radio/light/charger
- * First aid kits
- Tip Ties
- Bio-Hazard bags
- Pencils/clipboards/forms/write in the rain paper
- Tools of the trade (specific to your operation?)
- Barrier Tape
- Hand Sanitizers
- Emergency Blankets
- * Food rations/water purification supplies

Encourage Employee preparedness at home, because if the home and family is not safe & secure-they are not coming to work.

Do they have a kit at home?

Do they have a communication plan with their family?

Do they have a meeting place identified if they get separated?




Communications Plan

Its important to discuss how to prepare and respond to emergencies that are most likely to happen where you live, learn, **work** and play.


