THE CARING GOD

1 Kings 17:17-24; Psalm 30:2, 4-6, 11-13; Gal. 1:11-19; Luke 7:11-17

Kay and Rodney Bevington lost their only child in 1980, shortly before he celebrated his sixteenth birthday. In 1988, they set up a foundation (Alive Alone) to help grieving parents who have lost their only child or all their children, cope with their loss. In one of her articles, *Coping with the Death of an Only Child / All Children,* Kay wrote, "Having a child die is the ultimate grief that any parent will ever encounter. Having one's only child or all children die, compounds that ultimate grief to the point of being unthinkable for most people in our society today." Without a doubt, parents, especially mothers who have lost a child would agree with Kay one hundred percent.

The death of a child from any cause or at any age is the most devastating experience that a parent will ever encounter in one's lifetime. The common belief is that "parents are supposed to die before their children or at least that is what we are conditioned to believe in our society in the United States and many other countries. When our child/children die it affects us emotionally, physically, psychologically, socially and spiritually." Thus, we could imagine the pain that the mothers in today's scripture readings went through after each lost her only child. Some cultures believe that the death of a child cannot happen by natural cause; there must be some supernatural force behind it. It could be as a result of evil force, witches or possibly as a result of the sins of the parents. In today's first reading we encounter the widow who thought that her child died because of her sinfulness. Thus, she said to Elijah, "Why have you done this to me, O man of God? Have you come to me to call attention to my guilt and to kill my son?"

Sometimes, like the widow, when you and I experience tragedy we tend to react and think that God has caused it as a punishment for something we have done wrong. In her eyes, the presence of the holy man in her house reveals God's anger about her hidden faults. That is far from the truth. In the second reading, St. Paul wants us to understand that God's love for you and me cannot be compromised because of our past lives and behaviors. "I want you to know...that the gospel preached by me is not of human origin. For I did not receive it from a human being...it came through a revelation of Jesus Christ." St. Paul was a persecutor of God's Church, and was determine to kill anyone who professed to be a Christian. But God did not count his past deeds against him, instead, He chose him as one of His beloved apostles and ardent instrument to bring other people back to God.

The God you and I worship is a loving and compassionate God - slow to anger and abounding in mercy. He is a God that brings life not death to those who fear Him. We see this made manifest in Jesus' outreach of compassion and love to the widow whose only son had died. The scripture tells us that Jesus "was moved with pity for her and said to her, Do not weep." In times of desolation - when you are faced with difficulties and life's challenges, you should feel the presence of Jesus. You must invite Jesus into your affairs and believe that He has the power to make your burden light. Open up your heart and embrace Jesus as He reaches out to touch you and whispers into your ear - "Do not weep! I tell you, arise!" Arise from your slumber because "God has visited His people." He visits you to help you cope with your anxieties and worries. See, you are alive again!

YEAR OF FAITH



In the beginning of his homily during the Mass of Ordination to Priesthood for our Archdiocese, the Friars of the Renewal and the Idente Fathers, Cardinal Dolan recalled the words of Blessed John XXIII: "Holy Mother Church rejoices." It certainly did that day when our brothers in Christ received the Second Order of Holy Orders. In the greatest of counter-cultural acts

they gave themselves completely to the service of the Church and Her Lord. This weekend, again at Saint Patrick's, the people of God rejoice in the ordination of eight men to the permanent diaconate. Too many of our faithful members do not know about the first order of the sacrament. They use terms such as "lay deacons" to describe their role in the Church. Their misinformation might come from the fact that though the deacon is one who provided much service to the early church it was unknown as a permanent status until it was restored by Pope Paul VI at the behest of the Second Vatican Council's desire. The transitional deacon was one who was destined to be ordained a priest.

In his motu proprio or letter reestablishing the role of the permanent deacon, the Pope wrote: "Let the deacon, as those who serve the mysteries of Christ and the Church, abstain from all vice and endeavor to be always pleasing to God, 'ready for every good work' ... for the salvation of men. By reason, therefore, of the order received they must surpass by far all the others in the practice of the liturgical life, in the love of prayer, in the divine service, in obedience, in charity, in chastity." This is a brief description of a life that calls for spiritual, academic, and pastoral preparation. Presently, the norms of formation call for five years of training. From the beginning, his spouse is consulted for it is recognized that she and their children will at times be called to be sacrificial in spirit and that the deacon's calling will impact in a significant way family life. After a year of inquiry, there are two years of aspirancy, and finally two years of candidacy. Through that period of time the person is evaluated for as every seminarian is reminded as well, none have a right to ordination. During this time as well assignments are given to aid the aspirant or candidate to understand the nature of his ministry.

It would be an error to say that the permanent diaconate came about as a response to the shortage of priests. Their ministry is distinctive as we read in the Acts of the Apostles and in many of the early Church Fathers. As Pope John Paul instructed it is "above all a call to service." Both married and single permanent deacons (if a candidate is single, he must remain so, after ordination) were addressed by Pope John Paul II in his visit to the United States in 1987: "If we keep in mind the deep spiritual nature of this diakonia, then we can better appreciate the interrelation of the three areas of ministry traditionally associated with the diaconate, that is, the ministry of the word, the ministry of the altar, and the ministry of charity. Depending on the circumstances, one or another of these may receive particular emphasis in an individual deacon's work, but these three ministries are inseparably joined together as one in the service of God's redemptive plan. This is so because the word of God inevitably leads us to the Eucharistic worship of God at the altar; in turn, this worship leads us to a new way of living which expresses itself in acts of charity.
