VACATIONING WITH JESUS

(Jer. 23, 1-6: Ps. 23: 1-3, 3-4, 5, 6: Eph. 2:13-18: Mark 6:30-34)

On the fourth Sunday of Easter we celebrated "Good Shepherd Sunday," when Christ reminded us that He is the Good Shepherd Who lays down His life for His sheep. Once again, the image of a shepherd dominates today's scripture readings. This image is well established throughout the entire Scripture for the simple reason that it was easily understood by the agricultural people of biblical times.

Then, kings had long been called shepherds, basically, because it was their sacred duty to instill the fear of God in their kingdom, and also to ensure that their subjects paid allegiance to no one else but God alone. They were to keep their kingdom pointed to the Lord God, and not allow it to wander away. Unfortunately, some of the kings were not truly "good shepherds." The example of that was King Jehoiakin, who succeeded his father, King Josiah, who was killed in a battle. Jehoiakin did not put his trust in the Lord's promises; rather, he relied on making treaties with pagan nations. Thus, through Prophet Jeremiah, the Lord threatened to punish the "bad shepherds" and take the Kingdom away from kings such as Jehoiakin, and hand it over to shepherds (kings) who would be willing to take good care of the Lord's flock (God's chosen people) - a true shepherd who will "gather the remnant of My flock," nourish them, and increase their number.

For forty years Jeremiah was the voice of God during all of the political upheaval and moral decay of the society at that time. He was not afraid to denounce a series of kings as weak and unworthy shepherds. Through His words today one can hear the outrage of God against the leaders who had been given the privileges of being a shepherd but who neglected their responsibilities. "Woe to the shepherds who mislead and scatter the flock of My pasture, says the LORD." The story does not end here however, but with a promise that God will "raise up a righteous shoot to David" who will be a true shepherd and who "shall do what is just and right."

God's promise by Jeremiah is made manifest in our Lord Jesus Christ. In the Gospel, Jesus presents Himself as that promised Shepherd. He is God's chosen Shepherd Who will "guide (you and me) in (the) right paths." When we trust and follow Him, He leads us back to God. He restores us to a right relationship with God so that you and I may ultimately "dwell in the house of the Lord" all the days of our life. He is the Shepherd Who will deliver us from all evil and temptations. He will do all that a true shepherd is expected to do - caring, protecting, guiding, leading and nourishing his flock. Jesus is the Shepherd Who never fails us - He will lead you and me to a "greener pasture."

In today's Gospel reading Jesus invites you and me to "come off" with Him to "a deserted place" of solitude to rest with Him. Granted, you and I have a lot going on in our lives, but Jesus knocks at the door of your heart and invites you to open it for Him. Like the Apostles, we may have worked so hard, but Jesus, the Good Shepherd, wants you to take time out and hasten to meet Him, Whose heart is always moved with pity for you, who are "like sheep without a shepherd." You must make an effort to follow Jesus, Who is present in the Holy Eucharist offered at Mass every Sunday where your physical, emotional, and spiritual hungers can be fed by Him, and Him alone.

THE HOMEBOUND: St. Bartholomew's Parish wishes to show our love and care for our members who for reasons of health or infirmity cannot be with us as we gather for Mass each week. JAMES Apostle July 25

This James is the brother of John the Evangelist. The two were called by Jesus as they worked with their father in a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. Jesus had already called another pair of brothers from a similar occupation: Peter and Andrew. "He walked along a little farther and saw James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John. They too were in a boat mending their nets. Then He called them. So they left their father Zebedee in the boat along with the hired men and followed Him" (Mark 1:19-20).

James was one of the favored three who had the privilege of witnessing the Transfiguration, the raising to life of the daughter of Jarius, and the agony in Gethsemane.

Two incidents in the Gospels describe the temperament of this man and his brother. Saint Matthew tells that their mother came (Mark says it was the brothers themselves) to ask that they have the seats of honor (one on the right, one on the left of Jesus) in the kingdom. "Jesus said in reply, 'You do not know what you are asking. Can you drink the cup that I am going to drink?' They said to Him, 'We can!'" (Matthew 20:22). Jesus then told them they would indeed drink the cup and share His baptism of pain and death, but that sitting at His right hand or left hand was not His to give - it "is for those for Whom it has been prepared by My Father" (Matthew 20:23b). It remained to be seen how long it would take to realize the implications of their confident "We can!"

The other disciples became indignant at the ambition of James and John. Then Jesus taught them all the lesson of humble service: The purpose of authority is to serve. They are not to impose their will upon others, or lord it over them. This is the position of Jesus Himself. He was the servant of all; the service imposed on Him was the supreme sacrifice of His own life.

On another occasion, James and John gave evidence that the nickname Jesus gave them - "sons of thunder" - was an apt one. The Samaritans would not welcome Jesus because He was on His way to hated Jerusalem. "When the disciples James and John saw this they asked, 'Lord, do You want us to call down fire from heaven to consume them?" Jesus turned and rebuked them ..." (Luke 9:54-55).

James was apparently the first of the apostles to be martyred. "About that time King Herod laid hands upon some members of the church to harm them. He had James, the brother of John, killed by the sword, and when he saw that this was pleasing to the Jews he proceeded to arrest Peter also" (Acts 12:1-3a).

This James, sometimes called James the Greater, is not to be confused with the author of the Letter of James and the leader of the Jerusalem community.
