Halloween is a holiday celebrated each year on October 31, and Halloween 2020 will occur on Saturday, October 31. The tradition originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honor all saints. Soon, All Saints Day incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Halloween. Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trickor-treating, carving jack-o-lanterns, festive gatherings, donning costumes and eating treats.

We welcome all who are on the journey to know Jesus, who share in his love and who choose to embrace the diversity within this community of believers. As individuals we may be at different places along the path, but as a community, we are all traveling together in faith, trusting God to show us the way.

The Life of St. Francis of Assissi

As an Anabaptist denomination, we don't tend to spend a lot of time talking or thinking about the multitude of various saints and saint days practiced by some other branches of the Christian church. Yet even so, taking time to learn and to think about the witness of some of the varied lives and testimonies of saints across the centuries can still be helpful to us in our own lives of faith. While we do not ascribe to the Catholic practice of praying to saints (and I'll admit, I don't have a lot of background or information on why or how one does this), taking time to understand and learn about them can still be a very helpful practice. Especially the further back we go before the Reformation, as, after all, the Catholic church, along with the Orthodox church, was the only way around. That is to say, that while we don't look at saints the same way that the Catholic church does, we can still look to them as examples of faithful witness in their own time and place.

This is all to bring up the witness and life of a particular saint, St. Francis of Assissi, whose feast day is on October 4. That day is used in the Catholic tradition to honor his life and legacy. The story of St. Francis is an important one in the history of the Christian church, as he founded one of two important mendicant orders, the Franciscans. A mendicant order is one that is dedicated to poverty, and specifically to begging, and to this day, those who join a Franciscan order take a vow of poverty. He felt that it was extremely important to not only minister to those who are in poverty, but to walk alongside them in that poverty.

As I read through the Rule of St. Francis, the founding document of his order, it was interesting to see over and over again that he enjoined those who followed it to avoid money in any form. We, too, can benefit from remembering the special emphasis God places on those who are on the margins of our society, as St. Francis did. While we may not embrace the radical nature of poverty and mendicancy that he advocated, we can still find time and places that we can reach out to and minister to those who are in need around us.


One of St. Francis' convictions, and one that we can find to be helpful, is that of finding God in the natural world. In one of his writings, titled Canticle of the Sun, St. Francis writes beautifully of this connection to the natural world:

Cleanup Bucket Drive—CWS

Now more than ever, CWS needs assistance putting together buckets. The impact of COVID-19 has struck even those in the disaster relief community and has strained resources and efforts that were already stretched thin.

But, we were never ones to shy away from a challenge! So in that can-do spirit we are offering two ways to help. You can shop for yourselves and drop off supplies either on Sundays, or during the week OR you can put money in the offering (labeled for CWS Buckets) and WE will do the shopping for YOU.

Each bucket costs approximately \$75, plus an additional \$3 for processing.

- One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (If bucket has been used, clean well but do not use if it has held chemicals of any kind.)
- Four scouring pads
- Seven sponges, including one large
- One scrub brush
- Eighteen reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Easy Wipes)
- One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- One 12-16 oz. bottle of household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles)
- One package of 48-50 clothespins
- Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
- Five dust masks
- Two pairs heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free, nonsurgical)
- One pair work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather
- 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll and removed from carton

United States

Slowly Returning

It has been a long dry spell since BDM has been active at project rebuilding sites. Covid-19 has changed our disaster response patterns.

New protocols are now in place. You will find details in the attachments I have included with this email.

There are four items for you to note. 1) There is a short term project in Nebraska responding to the flooding that happened there last summer. 2) BDM is asking for help with providing face masks for volunteers. 3) A new project is beginning in Dayton, OH, rebuilding after the tornadoes of Memorial Day, one year ago. 4) Children's Disaster Services is requesting help assembling Kits of Comfort.

More details: CDS has been sending Kits of Comfort to children impacted by disasters when it has been impossible to send volunteers to be with children facing the trauma after hurricanes, airplane crashes, or other disasters. The last pdf attachment has the information needed to assemble and send those kits.

The Dayton project needs volunteers the two weeks of August 23-29 and August 30- September 5. S/C Indiana District is to also supply volunteers November 29 - December 5 in conjunction with IL/WI District. Volunteer numbers may be smaller than usual because of distancing protocols. No volunteers will be accepted at the project without agreeing to the much more stringent protocols set in place to protect home owners, hosting congregations and other volunteers.

The third attachment is the request and patterns for sewing masks that volunteers will be using as they work and live at the rebuilding sites. BDM needs many masks!



Be praised, my Lord, through all your creatures, especially through my lord Brother Sun, who brings the day; and you give light through him. And he is beautiful and radiant in all his splendour! Of you, Most High, he bears the likeness.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars, in heaven you formed them clear and precious and beautiful.

This is of course only a small section of his song. It's interesting, as I read into the Canticle of the Sun, to learn that it was the basis of a hymn in our hymnal, All Creatures of our God and King. That version is one that was paraphrased in translation by William H. Draper.

In some churches, a traditional way of honoring St. Francis on his feast day is the practice of blessing the animals. This often involves bringing pets or other animals to the church for a blessing to be given to them.

I hope that this small introduction to St. Francis may help us to understand a little bit about this striking life of faith, and might encourage us to continue to look back upon the witness of those who have come before us.

Due to the age and mileage on this box truck, the needed repairs have become more costly than the vehicle is currently worth. We would like to purchase a used, newer, more reliable box truck, which costs approximately \$20,000- \$25,000.

November New Community Project ...turning the world upside down...

Launched in August 2003, the New Community Project is a small nonprofit organization with a big goal: to change the world. We provide resources that challenge us, experiences that change us, and a community that gives us hope. Our focus is environmental sustainability and social justice, both of which are essential for a peaceful human community. NCP considers the spiritual dimension of our lives to be important, and seeks to bring about deep inner change in our personal and societal values. However, we welcome and work with anyone who shares our commitment to a world of peace and justice and sustainability.

We have partnerships around the world, but a primary focus is the USA, where we have a national network of some 11,000 people. There are Sustainable Living Centers in Vermont (coordinator Pete Antos-Ketcham) and Virginia (coordinator Tom Benevento), which put our ideals into action and host visitors, volunteers and interns. And director David Radcliff speaks regularly around the country in schools, colleges, community gatherings and congregations.

Our partnerships are with grassroots groups in East and Southern Africa (South Sudan, Rwanda, Zambia, the Congo and Malawi); Nepal and Myanmar in South Asia; the Dominican Republic; and native communities in the Ecuadorian Amazon, Alaska and the Dine Reservation in New Mexico.
