THE JOY OF PRIESTHOOD

Several years ago, while I was serving in Epiphany Church in San Francisco, Sister Paula, an elderly nun who attended Mass every morning, approached me and said, "Father, there is



something that I have noticed. Even while you celebrate Mass, your eyes are smiling, and it seems to me that you have a joyful attitude about life! It seems as though you don't have problems at all. You must be so contented with your life?" I told her that I thank God because he has given me a smiling face and smiling eyes." Frankly though, all of us, with no exceptions, have our own personal worries and cares. Parents worry about how to raise their children, how to provide for their needs, how to be good examples to them, etc. As a priest, I also have my own share of worries and problems, both vocational and personal. If people see joy in my eyes, it is because when I have these concerns, I always go back to my Galilee.

When I am confronted with personal concerns, I always say to myself, "this too shall come to pass". Sometimes it is not easy to do that, because in reality, when we are confronted with problems, we have a tendency to dwell on the problem, rather than focusing on finding a solution to it. And we often keep our problems to ourselves. Many times, it feels like the problem does not come to an end. It seems like there is no light at the end of the tunnel; as if it is the end of the world for us. Actually, it is not. There is always the light after the darkness, if we allow Jesus to journey with us. We are not alone! Jesus walks with us in good times and in bad. We just need to recognize his presence, even in the midst of trials and difficulties in life.


There is a story of a blind man, who sat on the sidewalk every day asking for alms. His sign read: "Help me, I am blind!" People passing by vaguely notice him. Then one day, a good Samaritan took pity on him and changed his sign. It caught people's attention and donations came flowing in. The new sign read: "It's a beautiful day, and I can't see it!". Even the blind man knows that there is light out there. So when we are weighed down with a lot of concerns, we need not worry, no matter how heavy they may be. These concerns, too, shall come to pass. Just trust in the Lord and be joyful.

When I am confronted with ministerial issues, and there are issues too heavy to carry, I always go back to the day I first said "yes" to the Lord. I bravely left my family, the people dear to me and my career and profession. I tread the path not too many men would travel, when I promised from my heart and free-will to follow where the Lord would lead me. Serving the Lord in the ministerial priesthood gives joy to my heart. This way may not be the most materially rewarding vocation, but the joy of celebrating the Eucharist alone is enough reward for me, which cannot be compared with any material possessions. This, along with the joy of giving absolution to the sinner, accompanying the dying in their last moments of life, listening to people's pain and heartaches and comforting the broken-hearted, in spite of my own brokenness and woundedness. I am so grateful the Lord called me to be his servant-priest, to help lead people to their eternal salvation. These are the sources of my joy, springing forth from serving the Lord through his people. No one can take that joy away from me, because it's a kind of joy that comes from deep within the core of my being, deep within my heart where my gracious Lord resides.







The Salt Lake Deanery had another great Spring Luncheon celebrated at St. Patrick's Church in March. Our guest speaker was Maria Cruz Gray, the Director of Hispanic Ministry for the Diocese of Salt Lake. Mrs. Gray spoke on V Encuentro, the Fifth Encounter.



You have probably heard about it but skipped the information in the Intermountain Catholic since it involves the Hispanic and Latino Ministries in the United States. Actually, it involves all of us. We are being invited to participate by encountering Hispanic and Latino

Catholics, particularly those living in the periphery. The main goal of V Encuentro is to discern ways in which the Church in the United States can better respond to the Hispanic and Latino presence, and to strengthen the ways in which Hispanics and Latinos respond to the call to the New Evangelization as missionary disciples serving the entire Church.

Hispanics in Utah have grown to an estimated 411,143 members in 2015; this is approximately 13.7% of the population. They are the single largest minority in Utah. Hispanics bring a rich cultural heritage to Utah and a strong, vibrant faith to the Catholic Church in Utah.

The New Evangelization of the Church calls us to a loving encounter with Jesus through our neighbors, even the neighbors who do not speak our language or look like us. We are called with words and actions to walk with Jesus and our neighbors. V Encuentro provides us with a process and tools to extend a loving hand to Hispanics and Latinos in our parish communities. Rather than turning our backs and shunning our neighbors, perhaps it is time to open hearts and extend a warm welcome.

LEADERSHIP COMMISSION

This Leadership report covers the time frame of June 2017 through April 2018. During that time, the Leadership Chair and Co-Chair selected a committee to update the Sponsorship Application for DCCW, the DCCW Sponsorship Guidelines, and the Standing Rules for Sponsorship. There was a small change in wording for the sponsorship application and guidelines. The wording was changed to read that "Sponsorships are for packages A, B, C (only in combo with Package B or D), and up to one-half hotel room for one night". This change was made to clarify the inclusion of the banquet with B or D, since Package A already includes the banquet.

An idea was proposed this year to create a sponsorship program for one woman's registration to the annual NCCW Convention. It was suggested to the membership at the DCCW meeting at St. Ambrose Parish on January 27, 2018. I handed out a list of pro's and con's for the membership to ponder and take back to their councils to discuss. There was no decision made on that day regarding this proposed sponsorship. It would have to be written, voted on, and put into action for the NCCW Convention in 2019, since it was proposed so late in the year. This sponsorship was suggested since DCCW is in good shape financially and could provide assistance to send a member to attend National for the purpose of education in leadership and spiritual growth.

Our Mission as the Council of Catholic Women is to support, empower, and educate Catholic Women in spirituality, leadership, and service.

The "Throw Down Challenge" was created a few years ago to increase attendance at the DCCW Convention in April. I included this in my annual report last year, and some may think this is like a broken record, but others may not have heard of the challenge. Any affiliate or group who increases their number of women attending the convention from the previous year earns a raffle ticket for each additional attendee. Those tickets are submitted to a drawing to win one free Package A registration to the next year's convention, and a second drawing for one free Package B registration. Last year's drawing winners were St. Vincent DePaul Parish for the Package A registration, and St. Joseph the Worker Parish for the Package B registration. This was an awesome idea to increase attendance and was created by Kathy Fazio from Christ the King Parish, Cedar City, when she was the DCCW Leadership Chair.

My reports during the year were written from articles in the NCCW *Catholic Woman* magazine and the NCCW *Connect* Bulletin. I wrote about the gifts that Council has given to us as individuals; building trust within your council groups; mentoring other council members, and the empowerment of women in your local groups and around the world. We all know the power the "Me Too" movement has had across our nation and throughout the world. What better way to show the empowerment of women when we join forces? There have been many women, who have mentored and inspired me over the years in leadership skills and confidence and made me thankful to be a part of the Council of Catholic Women. I hope my reports this year for DCCW have enlightened or educated women in their councils.



I will end my report by saying we were all saddened over the loss of one of our past DCCW presidents, Mary Adams, and also one of our Membership Development and Resource Team Chairs, Anne Smith. Both of these women were great leaders and dynamic personalities in our council. May they rest in peace and let perpetual light shine upon them.

SPIRITUALITY COMMISSION

Prayer:

There is real wisdom, Lord, in the adage 'It is always Springtime in the heart that loves God.' Springtime is a season of optimism and hope, and the Christian lives a faith centered on hope. Winter, with its cold and dark days has gone, just as Good Friday has passed to Easter and beyond. We live a resurrection life reflected in the new life springing up around us. Thank you, Lord, for the hope that you bring, the renewal that you bring, both to this world and to our hearts and lives.



"Just as there are seasons in the world around us, so there are in our interior life," Teresa of Avila wisely observed. "We cannot expect it to be otherwise."

Spring is a season of renewal and rebirth - as outside, so inside. Spring is a time for making way for fresh possibilities and new commitments. It's a time to revive our senses and expand our horizons. It's a time to begin again, a time for opening windows, turning soil, planting seeds.

Praying with Seeds

It is also an ideal time for praying. In fact, prayer can be especially invigorating during this season by attaching it to three activities in particular.

Seed Prayers

Jesus once told a parable about a sower who scattered seeds on different types of soil. In His story, the seeds represented words (see Mark 4:14). So, one way to pray this spring is to make the seeds you plant - whether in a planter, a garden or field - into prayers. You might attach a name to each seed, praying for a different person as you poke the seed into soil. Or you might pray a different prayer with each different kind of seed you plant - say, a prayer of praise as you plant flowers, intercession for others as you plant vegetables, etc.

Feed Prayers

Spring is also a great time to feed birds and other wild animals. So you may wish to fill your bird feeder as you pray, "God, just as you feed the birds of the air who do not sow or reap or store away in barns, please provide my family's needs" (see Matthew 6:26). Or you might scatter bread or crackers for wildlife while praying for the hungry, or <u>donate</u> to a food pantry or soup kitchen along with a prayer for those in need, or better yet, volunteer at a feeding program near you.

Leave an extra-generous tip for your restaurant server as a prayer for his or her well-being.

You may want to alternate "seed prayers," "feed prayers" and "good deed prayers" over the course of the next few days or weeks. Or you may try to include one each in your routine every day. Whatever you choose, it takes just a little extra effort - and brings much extra blessing - to spring into prayer.

Dear Council Sisters,

As I finish my two-year term as the Service Commission Chair for the DCCW, I am in awe by the service that the women of our parishes are accomplishing every day for those in need. It has been my pleasure to serve alongside the women of the DCCW.

Last year our service project for the DCCW was centered around feeding the hungry children around our state. As you will remember, over 175 boxes of food were delivered to pantries in various counties for distribution to children with food insecurities. Your response to this collection was incredible.

This year our project was focused on people affected by domestic violence. Eight shelters were chosen from around the state and a list was compiled of needed items. Once again, the response was so generous. I would like to share with you the what some of our parishes did for this cause.



<u>Saint Peter's</u> reported their project was held during Lent and was titled "Under the Clothes, Over the Toes," and included their Hispanic families. Debajo la Ropa, Sobre los Dedos dei Pie. The items collected went to the South Valley Sanctuary in West Jordan. Inclusion of all our women is so important and builds our CCW communities. Such a beautiful success story.

The women of <u>Saint Vincent de Paul</u> further helped the South Valley Sanctuary when they hosted a speaker from their shelter and donated items from their wish list. Later, they went on a tour of their space and donated more items. The countless people these two parishes helped is immeasurable.

"The one thing you can always count on from the ladies of the CCW is their benevolent nature." So it is with the women of <u>Holy Family</u> in South Ogden. They donate each year to the local Catholic Community Services pantry. The hygiene and personal items they collected over the year numbered in the hundreds. What an impact this will have on countless recipients.

The women of <u>Christ the King</u> in Cedar City donated cleaning materials and a large amount of copy paper to the Cedar City Women's Crisis Center. They also donated backpacks to the Southern Utah Family Support Center. They are filled with school supplies for children who need to be in a protected environment. They come to the shelter with nothing. I'm sure these centers are appreciative of the fabulous way our women serve others.

<u>Saint Olaf</u> in Bountiful participated in an interfaith service project to benefit the Safe Harbor Shelter in Davis County. We combined with the Episcopal Church, the Community Church and an LDS stake to sew 65 pairs of pajama pants, 200 blankets and collect pillows as well as cleaning supplies. We also filled 170 buckets of cleaning supplies for the Refugee Resettlement program and filled 1000 pantry packs for the hungry children for their weekend meal needs. This was a fantastic day of service.

After they hosted a speaker from the health department, <u>Saint Anthony</u> CCW ladies held a baby shower for the WIC program. They also learned about the "Clothesline" project which helps women and children of violence. They donated funds to help buy tee shirts that the victims decorate as part of the healing process. What a wonderful worthwhile service project.

Service was also taking place at <u>Saints Peter and Paul</u>. A clothing drive was conducted in December and several bags were delivered to the YWCA shelter. These women come to them with nothing when they flee and these items are so needed.

The story from <u>San Andres</u> in Payson is heartwarming. After they received donated craft materials from their ladies, they made advent wreaths and sold them after masses and at meetings. The demand kept growing as the advent season continued and they sold 45 and proudly presented a check for \$850.00 to the Family Support and Treatment Center in Orem.

<u>Saint Ambrose</u> held their drive in December and their parish responded ten fold. It yielded a full truckload of items from our collections list delivered to the YWCA in Salt Lake. They were very excited and appreciative of the generous donation.

Wonderful things were being conducted at <u>Saint John the Baptist</u> in December. They collected many items for the Center for Women and Children in Crisis in Orem. They made 50 bracelets for the women and gave snowman candy tins to the children as well as pillows, bras, underwear for women and children, socks and tee shirts, sweat pants, journals, pens, and baby wipes. Another amazing success story for their shelter.

Works of service were also unfolding in Hurricane at the <u>Saint Paul Catholic Center</u>. Their women collected and delivered numerous items to the DOVE/Erin Kimball Center in October. They also cooked turkeys, breads and side dishes for the center for Thanksgiving. God willing, they will continue their projects year and year. The women of <u>Saint George Catholic Church</u> are also busy collecting items for the DOVE Center as well. Incredible acts of service always in the works.

We should all be proud of the fantastic things we are accomplishing in our communities. The ripple effect from our works will be felt near and far. Let us all remember those feelings of JOY and peace that come from sharing ourselves and helping others. As we move on through the years let us remember that children will continue to be hungry and women and children will continue to enter shelters for safety every day. God's blessings to them all.

LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION Donna Murphy, Chair — St. Thomas More, Sandy, Parishioner



The legislative session was a long 45 day event starting on Jan. 25th and ending March 10th. There were 533 bills passed this session for the Governor to sign into law or to veto. There was much controversy about the House Bill 234 (HB) Utah Inland Port Authority Sponsored by Senator Stephenson. This bill created by the Legislature to create new authority to oversee development of a trade hub in the northwest quadrant of the state did pass and got signed into law by Governor Herbert.

Senate Bill 27 (SB) sponsored by Senator Todd Weiler, Republican (R) from District 23 worked together with Democrat (D) Rep. Angela Romero from District 26 as cosponsor to address Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and stalking Amendments. Rep. Robert Spendlove (R) from District 49 sponsored HB 33 Domestic Response Amendments with Senator Bramble (R) from District 16 did not pass the last night of the session.

There were a few issues which shaped this year's session, which included Medicaid expansion, a high suicide rate and medicinal marijuana. A partial Medicaid expansion included coverage to 70,000 low income adults. As per the *Salt Lake Tribune*, lawmakers have consistently refused to cover the state's "gap" population of 150,000 uninsured poor people who were supposed to gain Medicaid coverage under the passage of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) or Obama care 8 years ago. Some legislators voiced concerns over the program's potential costs, despite the federal government 'paying 90% of the bill. Since there is a Medicaid expansion on the ballot this November which citizens can vote for as it includes the 150,000 people in the gap without insurance and not require the approval of the federal government. This is unlike the Legislature's version.

Representative, (Rep.) Eliason sponsored HB 41 with Senator Dan Thatcher regarding Youth Suicide Task Force Amendments. Utah has had a near record year of youth suicide and legislators have worked tirelessly on bills with a task force aimed at tackling the issue. A bill targeted to direct schools to provide education and youth suicide prevention programs as well as to allow the Utah Office of the Medical Examiner to collect more data on suicide deaths was passed. There is also an app. In which a person can download on their cell phones titled SafeUt. This app. has 24 hours coverage by professional social workers employed by the University of Utah who can readily respond to these phone calls and has saved many youths from suicide. Data is being monitored from these crisis phone calls.

Approximately 400 deaths in Utah happened in 2016 from opioid addiction and this year legislators passed a bill requiring pharmacists to place labels on pill containers, warning of the risk of overdoses and addiction. Law-makers passed a resolution to call on Utah Attorney General's office to sue large opioid manufacturers-a step several counties in Utah and around the country have already taken with along at least 16 states. Recently the Tribune posted an article about Salt Lake County District Attorney, Sim Gill with Mayor Ben McAdams, Sheriff Rosie Rivera and former Arizona Attorney Grant Woods who have filed a suit against Big Pharma. There are six pharmaceutical companies named as defendants in the lawsuit. They spoke about the opioid addiction's effect on crime and the strain it has put on the county's budget and jail. Gill claims that many people who use heroin in the county and across the nation started with prescription painkillers. Summit and Tooele counties filed lawsuits last month against many of the same countries and lawsuits are expected from Box Elder, Cache, Davis, Utah, Washington and Weber counties are expected to follow.

Abortion is always a heated subject and legislators heard two bills and one passed through the session as SB 118 Abortion Law Amendments which updates and improves the state's informed consent law. It replaces an outdated video and replaces it with online modules which are more accessible and easier to adapt. The concept is to help eliminate bias some women felt when speaking to their care providers about the old informed-consent pamphlets and video. The other abortion bill which did not pass was HB 205 Down Syndrome Nondiscrimination Abortion Act which was very controversial which would have made it a crime for a health care provider to perform an abortion if they knew the woman wanted to do so since the baby had been diagnosed with Down Syndrome. Legislative attorneys warned legislators this HB could be found as unconstitutional.

HB 86 Manslaughter Amendments included verbiage how assisting suicide is a crime and includes doctorassisted suicide being illegal as well. HB 86 protects doctors, who in accordance with Catholic teaching, may use pain relief medications and treatment procedures without intending to assist patient's suicide.

Some bills which helped the preferential option for the poor included waiving the \$20 fee for obtaining a birth certificate. HB 170 Licensing Fee Waivers Amendments, which waives the professional licensing for individuals receiving public assistance as this may reduce barriers to work did pass. Affordable housing in Utah is difficult to find as it is a critical issue and the \$100 million bond bill did not pass this session but legislators agreed to study the problem. The main SLC homeless shelter is scheduled to close in 2019. The legislature was unable to pass HB 148 Tax Revisions which would have eliminated the sales tax on food. HB 57 Utah Intergenerational Poverty Work and Self Sufficiency Tax Credit included an Earned Income Tax Credit for families living in intergenerational poverty did not pass either.

On March 24, 2018 Utah students marched from West High School to the Utah state Capitol in protest about how legislators across the nation appear to care more about gun rights than about young lives. These students participated in The March for Our Lives and are in support of gun violence protection with sensible gun laws.

Pope Francis made world news a few years ago when he declared that health care is a human right and not a privilege. Remember as Catholics we are called to protect the dignity and sanctity of each and every human being. We are encouraged to sign the initiatives for the Medicaid Expansion as well as the above initiative with sensible gun laws. Hopefully these initiatives will have enough signatures, as 113,000 signatures from the 26 Senate districts by the end of April in order to be on the November ballot. Please take time to do your civic duty as a Catholic who cares about protecting the dignity and sanctity of all human beings. Keep our politicians in your prayers to help them vote favorably on issues which can save and help all of us live in a better world.



EASTERN DEANERY Barbara Jewkes, President — St. Anthony, Helper, Parishioner



The Eastern Deanery has had a busy year assisting our parishes with activities and service projects, contributing to our communities, and participating in our deanery project, which we called "Chuck your Change". Each parish collected change and the funds will be matched by EDCCW and sent to CRS and CCS to help with disaster relief. We have also participated in the Domestic Violence Shelter project for DCCW. At our Spring meeting, we honored the Women of the Year from each of the four parishes, and we also had our installation ceremony for our new officers for 2018-20. I would now like to honor our beloved member of sixty plus years, Christina Sanchez, and share the story of this beautiful Catholic woman and her journey to DCCW.

Christina was born in Velarde, New Mexico in October of 1925 and raised by her loving parents as an only child, as her two brothers died from pneumonia as infants. She remembers selling fruit from the family farm on the highway when she was a young girl. Her father and uncles left the family farm and relocated to Utah to work on the railroad. Her future husband, Fidel, traded her father a straight edged razor for a picture of Christina and told every-



ond, Fidel, traded her father a straight edged razor for a picture of Christina and told everyone that this beautiful young lady would someday be his wife. They were married on her seventeenth birthday, and she moved with him to Utah (Their marriage was later blessed at St. Anthony's). Fidel worked in the coal mine and then joined the Army, fought in WWII and Christina suffered a stillbirth before delivering their oldest daughter, Elaine in 1944. Their family soon grew, adding Joseph, John and Rose (spaced only about a year between them). In 1950 her widowed grandmother, Tita, moved to Helper to assist, along with Christina's parents her growing family. They bought their first home and moved to Spring Glen, near her parents. Again, the family expanded, adding Patrick, Anthony, Felipe, Michael, Geralyn, Marie and Felipe Michael (in close succession). Although it came with sacrifice, all the children attended Notre Dame School in Price, the four oldest were ND graduates. Christina and her mother joined St. Anthony's Altar Society in the early 1960's. Tina's faith would soon be tested as they suffered a series of tragedies: Tita passed away on Christmas Day in 1964, then six weeks later, nine-month old Michael died of pneumonia, followed in March by the same fate for his three-year old brother, Felipe.

Five-year old Anthony got the infection too, but survived. Christina's daughter, Rose would come to realize years later while attending nursing classes that the babies likely died of Reyes syndrome, caused by the aspirin they were given to combat high fevers. Rose was killed in a car accident in 1982, leaving behind three young children and a loving husband, and, again a grief-stricken mother.

In 1965, Father Dowling, in an effort to get her more involved in church activities and take her mind off her grief asked Christina to drive a group of St. Anthony's ladies to the DCCW Convention in Salt Lake who would otherwise be unable to attend. Christina agreed. Thus, began her relationship with the women of the Salt Lake Diocese. Council literally saved her, as these women, along with the good people of St. Anthony's and her family would become her support group and friends. She would go on to become involved at each council level, holding offices from president on down at the CCW and Deanery levels as well as secretary and treasurer of the DCCW. She attended nearly every meeting, and travelled to most DCCW Conventions and several NCCW Conventions through the years. She was named St. Anthony's Woman of the Year in 1984. Until recently, she continued to serve her parish by helping with many events and activities. Fidel died in 2003. Recently, between her advanced age and spending time with her children, she has been unable to participate in many Council activities. She is currently residing with her son and daughter-in-law in West Valley. She has built quite a legacy with her 9 surviving children, 34 grandchildren (one passed away), 68 great-grandchildren, and 12 great-greats (as of mid- April 2018).

What an amazing woman she is and such an inspiration to us all. Smiles still abound whenever her name is mentioned at a Council event, and I for one am looking forward to seeing her at the 90th DCCW Convention in April. Her daughter, Geralyn, will accompany her. I'm sure I speak for all who know her, when I say, "We love you Christina, thanks for being our friend and mentor, and may God bless you".

St Mary's Council of Catholic Women West Haven Jessica Jurkowski, President



St. Vincent de Paul: St. Vincent de Paul CCW meets the fourth Monday of the month at 7pm. We have a President, Secretary & Treasurer and usually have 20 women at each meeting. Our Newsletter is titled *Heart to Heart* and is published in the bulletin the weekend before our meeting. A group of our women has begun a welcoming newcomer ministry and greet people every Mass as well as call all the newcomers every week. St. Vincent de Paul CCW has a Facebook page thanks to one of our members. We sponsor Sunday coffee and donuts alternating weeks with the Knights of Columbus. Instead of a split and take every meeting, we are now charging \$1.00 dues every month to cover expenses. During our meetings this year we learned how to sign the Mass, had a speaker from St. Martha's Baby Guild along with a baby shower and games, celebrated a Christian Seder, and learned to make terrariums. In June we will have a potluck with election of officers for 2018-2019. Other than helping at the parish summer picnic, we take the summer off and resume meetings in September.

<u>St. Thomas More</u>: Since the last Aware, the ladies continue to be busy. We made Valentine's Day cards for the residents of Wentworth Retirement Home and the seminarians. We also gave each seminarian \$25. In February, Regina Smithers came and presented a power point of her trip to Haiti. It was a powerful presentation and many suggested she give her presentation to the entire parish. The Ladies hosted the parish Easter Egg Hunt this year on Easter Sunday. We also participate in the parish donut Sunday. We are currently accepting letters from non-profit agencies/groups for disbursement of the money we made on our boutique luncheon. This is approximately \$18,000, and we try to keep 70-80 percent of these funds here at Saint Thomas More. Our April activity is being presented by author, Karen Jones, who is new to Saint Thomas More.

<u>Women of St. Francis Assisi</u>: In January we had a candle light service on love, respecting others and what words came to mind on how they interact in our life. We hosted a Stations of the Cross from "Mary's Point of View", which was heart wrenching. For our service project we held a collection of items to help other women in need (Crisis Center in Orem). We put a big push on DCCW Convention this year stressing how important it is to support not just our parish, but all of the Catholic women in Utah while building our faith and love for our Lord and each other. I do believe we will have a big turn out this year. In May, we will be honoring our Blessed Mother and women who have changed our lives.
