Good morning! Hope all is well with you. Make sure you are getting the rest needed to stay healthy for these last 3 weeks.

Loose ball plays....lots can happen during loose balls. We must make sure to see the whole play AND to officiate this using an advantage/disadvantage philosophy.

What this means is that if A1 puts him/herself at an advantage through the contact he/she made with an opponent, it is a foul on A1. Similarly, is A1 puts an opponent at a *dis*advantage through the contact he/she created, we STILL have a foul on A1. We must see the entire play and realize that there are times when loose balls can create a lot of incidental contact and possibly that play when a player gains possession while sliding on the floor and everybody yells 'TRAVEL!' when we know it isn't. We must make sure to understand who created the contact and if a player gained an advantage or put an opponent at a disadvantage from it.

Take a look at the clip today....white 32 dives over an opponent and takes the legs out from under black 2. This is definitely a foul on white 32 for both gaining an advantage since he recovered the ball AND by putting black 32 at a disadvantage. In this particular clip, the foul was called the other way. Make sure we see the whole play here.

I addition, if a foul on a loose ball play is committed, we MUST BLOW THE WHISTLE. Letting plays like this go can lead to very bad consequences. Make sure to be focused on loose ball plays.
