Our Sport Fishing on Lake Erie Exhibit will open at the Kelleys Island Historical Association in May 16th, 2015. The exhibit will explain the timing of the first Ohio resident fishing licenses. There will be a focus on government policy changes for commercial fisherman and the evolution of fishing for fun. Artifacts and fishing tales are being gathered as this is being written. We will have old fishing rods, lures of many kinds and purpose, mounted fish and species identification, the management of fish in the lake in the early days and now. May 16 is International Museum Day and admission is free.

Be sure to bring your family and friends as there will be something for everyone. Those of us working on the exhibit are learning as we go. If any of our members or friends of members think they have something to offer the exhibit, we welcome additional items and participation.

On August 8th, 2015 we will have a speaker, Tory Gabriel, from Sea Grant/OSU who will talk about The History of Lake Erie Fishing. He participates the research teams and will have current information to share as well.

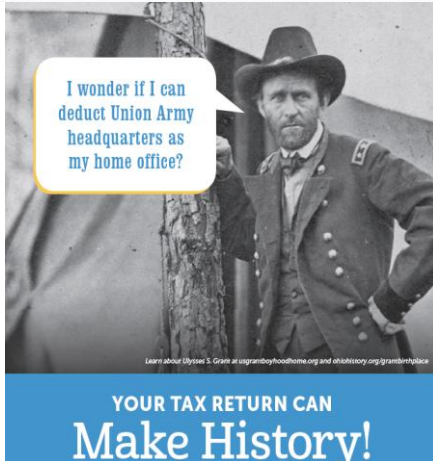
We are also interested in inviting new members and volunteers.

LOOK WHAT WE FOUND – Rev. C. E. Haley of St. Michael's Church “has formulated plans to organize an association to be known as Kelleyites, Incorporated, its membership to consist principally of persons who do not reside the year around on the island.” He proposed an annual Homecoming Day. It is unclear whether the Dollar-A-Year Club ever got off the ground. Haley served his Island flock from 1942-1956.

ICE FISHING JANUARY 1885 - "Last evening [January 30] I took a bird's-eye view of 'Fishtown.' It is pleasantly situated at the north side bay, and when first laid out had some fine streets and avenues, but the ice has compelled the inhabitants to move back to Herring avenue. Fred Elfers, Captain Moore and others reside there and are doing a good business. Capt. Moore has a contract to furnish his friends with fish free gratis. Charley Fisher is leading almost a hermit's life on Fisher's avenue, there being but one other resident on that thoroughfare. 'Honest John' Titus is a new resident of the finny city and likes the place very much. James Titus and Andrew Cameron, two venerable gentlemen of Kelley's Island are participators of the sport. Titus Hamilton is also taking an active part, Mr. John Cameron took to Sandusky last Friday 5 barrels of speared fish."

On February 28 it was reported that Henry Lang [Lange] speared a herring weighing 1½ pounds... Captain Dwelle has sold his spear, deserted his shanty, and will retire from fishing for the balance of the season. Andrew Cameron, an old resident of the Island, has speared fish enough this season to buy a good suit of clothes as the result.

The Kelleys Island Historical Association receives Ohio History Connection Grant for Marker.

The William G. Pomeroy Foundation awarded winners last fall. The Kelleys Island Historical Association was the recipient for one award, a marker for the German Reform Church/Church Parsonage. The marker will chronicle the history of this small congregation, active from the 1860's to the early 1940's. The William Pomeroy Foundation from Syracuse, New York has worked with The Ohio History Connection's Local Office to offer grants throughout Ohio to specifically erect Historical Markers. This same Foundation was successful in conducting a very active historical marker program in New York State.

According to the Local Historian Publication, "Markers funded by The William G. Pomeroy foundation shall meet one or both criteria: 1) the person, place, event, or thing commemorated must have a period of significance which falls between the years 1800 and 1900 or 2) the marker must designate properties or districts on the National Register of Historic Places." As the spring becomes summer, we look forward to receiving and placing the marker.

RUTH FROST PARKER DIES AT 92 - We were saddened to learn of the death of philanthropist Ruth Frost Parker on February 14th, 2015. "She had a big heart and great mind for how to put the resources she was lucky to have in life for the benefit of Sanduskians and did so in a very smart and leveraged way." "Her father's company, Aluminum Magnesium, Inc. did well particularly during WWII and the post war years, supplying magnesium aluminum alloys for making airplanes. Vulcan Materials Company bought the company in 1976." Ruth majored in Biology and chemistry at The College of Wooster, graduating in 1945, then going to train at Northwestern Medical School. She was employed at Good Samaritan Hospital as their chief medical technologist.



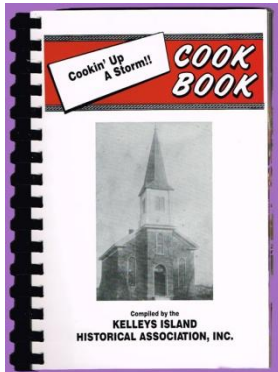
Past Board Member, Anne Eddowes, was a long-time friend of Ruth. Anne wrote several grants for projects at The Kelleys Island Historical Association, and Ruth was very supportive. The Frost-Parker Foundation gave a large grant to assist in the completion of the new museum building. In addition, the Foundation gave a grant to build the brick walk from the parking lot to the church entrance. Just this past fall, KIHA was awarded another grant to complete a drainage system for the Old Stone Church. The Kelleys Island Historical Association plans to install a

plaque in the church in Ruth Frost Parker's memory.

Drainage Project Update: The drainage project seems to be working well as the spring melts ice and snow. The parsonage drainage grant project, funded by The Erie County Community Foundation, includes indoor work that needs to be completed this spring. The parsonage has a fruit cellar that is wet and moldy. The plan includes cleaning it, then filling it in with stone and cement. This will prevent further mold buildup. A sump pump will be installed under the church in the low area under the Northeast corner.

ANNUAL MEETING - Our Annual Meeting will be Saturday, August 8 and we have some great activities planned. There will be a guest speaker and maybe a few surprises. As happens every year, there will be an election to fill two Board seats that expire.

MAKING MAPLE SYRUP ON KELLEYS ISLAND - The weather has been just right for the sap to flow. It is a reminder that spring is not too far off. Brother Ed, Big Dick, and Chicago have been gathering sap and making syrup for several years now. The learning process only makes better syrup; one year the open fire they cooked on made the syrup smokey, another year they overcooked it and it became candy. This year they report three quarts of really good syrup. Below: Chicago, Brother Ed, and Big Dick making maple sugar on Kelleys Island. They have been doing this for several years. A LITTLE SWEET HISTORY - The First written account of maple sugaring in North America appeared in 1557, written by André de Thevet, a French monk, in *Le Singularites de la France Antarctique*.

A little closer to home, our thanks to Leslie Korenko for these tidbits about Maple trees and Maple Sugar on the island. According to one history “The first white settler upon the island of whom anything is known, was a Frenchman by the name of Cunningham. He was an Indian trader, so called, buying of the Indians their furs, maple sugar and peltry, and furnishing them in exchange such articles as they needed or fancied, as blankets, trinkets, and doubtless also whiskey; in those days considered a staple article in the stock of an Indian trader. This Cunningham came to the island about the year 1808, as nearly now can be ascertained.”

Cunningham’s point was once covered with Maple trees and was often referred to as Carpenter’s maple grove [a popular camping ground].

In the cemetery deed dated 1895, a Maple Tree, one foot in diameter, was used as a boundary marker for the cemetery when another 1.33 acres was purchased from Fred and Matilda Meyer.

In March 1966 we find our first reference to Maple Syrup – “As spring approaches collecting sap from the Maple tree becomes the rage and so indefatigable are they in their efforts to procure a little of this saccharine fluid that we begin to wonder if they have not, like some old people, got sap on the brain.”
