

PTA Votes \$500 Gift For Order

The Nazareth Academy Parent-Teachers Association in a recent session voted a gift of \$500 to honor the Order of Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament on its 100th anniversary in Victoria.

The group also voted to present the faculty with the annual gift of \$100 as a Christmas token.

Mrs. Bert Kiesel, PTA president, announced the Executive Board had unanimously decided to invest \$3,000 by obtaining a certificate of deposit at a local bank at 5 per cent interest payable May 15.

Sister M. Borgia, high school principal, told the session a Living Nativity will be presented in front of St. Mary's Church by the high school students, and the Drama and Tri M clubs will be in charge of Christmas assemblies Dec. 19 and 23, respectively. A Pageant of a Centennial of Service will be presented Jan. 7 at St. Mary's Hall.

Sister M. Blanche, school librarian, spoke on the growth of the Library Memorial, and reported a need for an additional encyclopedia.

Soto Is Named In Indictment

A murder indictment against Johnny Soto, 19, of 508 S. Glass St., was among the 26 indictments returned Friday by the Victoria County Grand Jury, the sheriff's department revealed Saturday.

The indictment grew out of the grand jury's investigation of an Aug. 13 car-pedestrian accident in the 600 block of East Convent Street in which Moises Rodriguez, 44, of 1511 S. Sycamore St., was killed.

The case was presented under a charge of intoxicated driver of automobile killing person by accident.

Police said Rodriguez was struck as he was walking west next to the curb by a car which was headed in the same direction. Rodriguez was pronounced dead on arrival at a local hospital.

Soto is free under a \$1,000 bond posted two days after the accident.

Ruby Case Parleys Slated This Week

DALLAS (AP) — Lawyers for Jack Ruby are expected to meet during the week with Dist. Judge Louis Holland, possibly to decide on a site and time for his second murder trial.

Ruby was convicted and sentenced to die for slaying Lee Harvey Oswald, the man the Warren Commission says assassinated President Kennedy in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963. Ruby slipped into the crowd during a routine jail transfer of Oswald and shot him.

celebrated their 100th anniversary. She presented Miss Alfreda Gramann, whose ancestry dates back to the time of the Sisters' arrival in Victoria, as guest speaker. Miss Gramann reminisced on the part her ancestors played in the history of the order.

Her mother, the former Mary Ann Hansner, at age 16, accompanied Father Augustine Gardet to the depot to welcome the five nuns arriving from France; and then her grandmother, Mrs. Charles Wissing, served them their first meal in Victoria. Her grandfather, Dr. Charles Wissing, later became the Sisters' physician during the Flu epidemic.

Miss Gramann pointed out the first school opened Jan. 7, 1867 with 55 pupils, and by now thousands of its students have gone out equipped by the Sisters to become outstanding members of society. She then presented the faculty of Naz-

areth Academy, for the archives, letters dating from 1866 which have been kept by her sister, Mrs. Larkin Smith. Special guests at the meeting were Mrs. Robert Lawrence, Miss Bertha Griffith and Mrs. Smith. The next PTA session will be at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 12.
