The children of our Lutheran grade schools will be celebrating reality during National Lutheran Schools Week, under the theme "Real. Present. God."

The basis for this emphasis is Psalm 46, which also is the basis for the hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." God promises in Psalm 46 to be truly present in our lives through His great and precious promises. These promises are a reality in the lives of children and adults alike.

Let's look at reality in the theme of "Real. Present. God." for the five days.

- ► REAL GRACE Because of the grace of God, He did send His Son to come into this world, who suffered, died, rose from the dead and ascended.
- ► REAL PLACES Jesus was born in Bethlehem and died and rose again in Jerusalem. Jesus is also with God's children wherever they are. Jesus said:

"The Lord of hosts is with us" (Ps. 46:7).

- ▶ **REAL PEOPLE** Jesus died for all the children, including those who are in our parochial grade schools, along with all their teachers. The students and teachers are real people.
- ▶ REALTIME "But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son" (Gal. 4.4). God sent His Son at the right time. God deals with our lives in His time. We may not always agree, but that is what faith believes — God's time is the right time for young and old.
- ▶ REAL PRAISE "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice" (Phil. 4.4). Our praise of our God is real as we believe and rejoice that God has made promises and continues to keep them.

The students in our schools are blessed with Lutheran teachers who serve with the love of Christ in every subject they teach. The children entrusted to their care learn that they are real children of God, created in the image of God and a wonder of God's creation. They are special. That is real!

Our district has 19 elementary schools, three high schools and more than 40 preschools. There are more than 3,000 students served in the district by about 200 teachers. They will all celebrate National Lutheran Schools Week. It is



an annual event that takes place all over our country in LCMS schools. Many of you reading this have been blessed as you attended one of these schools. You understand the reality of Lutheran education. I learned that reality years ago and am thankful for my school and caring teachers.

These schools are making a difference in people's lives every day. These children are learning how to deal with life's realities in a Christian setting, whether it's how to forgive one another or about the beauty of God's creation.

Our mite offerings for Jesus are not placed into an envelope like the Hearts for Jesus money was when I was a child. They are placed into our mite boxes. We pray for the recipient of our mite offerings, that they too may know the love of Jesus and give their "heart to Jesus."

you can download a monthly calendar at *lwml.org/mites-received*. For each day there is a suggested amount to give. These suggestions are great reminders of how God has blessed us and how we are to share our gifts, prayers and love with others.

One of the North Wisconsin District LWML grants selected for the 2018-20 biennium will support the Food and Clothing Co-op at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind. This mission grant will help students attending the seminary, who are preparing to serve God's people here and abroad. Their stay at the seminary can put a strain on their finances. The co-op helps to meet the food and household needs of the students and their families freeof-charge.

National LWML Grant #16 — "Education Loan Repayment Assistance Grants–Ministry Focus" is designated to help 20 full-time church workers who have completed their training at a Concordia university or seminary. Many times economic challenges and finances can affect the service and commitment of our church workers. This grant will help these students manage their loan debt while encouraging and equipping them to continue their service to God.

St. Paul tells us in 2 Cor. 8:1-7:

"And now, brothers, we want you to know about the grace that God has given the Macedonian churches. In the midst of a very severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the Lord's people. And they exceeded our expectations: They gave themselves first of all to the Lord, and then by the will of God also to us. So we urged Titus, just as he had earlier made a beginning, to bring also to completion this act of grace on your part. But since you excel in everything-in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in the love we have kindled in you - see that you also excel in this grace of giving."

As we lovingly and prayerfully place our coins and dollars into our mite boxes, we can rest assured that our Hearts for Jesus will bless others in many ways.

Paul spoke of was not tied to "walking according to the flesh" (2 Cor. 10:2). He went on to clarify:

"For though we walk in the flesh, we are not waging war according to the flesh. For the weapons of our warfare are not of the flesh but have divine power to destroy strongholds. We destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ, being ready to punish every disobedience, when your obedience is complete" (vs.3-6).

The church is not a human institution, but a holy one. God is on our side. The Holy Spirit is not dead! Yes, this same Spirit that empowered the first disciples to be Christ's witnesses to the world (Acts 1:8) offers the same power today. In the midst of the erosion we see all around us — within and surrounding the church — can come a spiritual explosion to revive the church, and the culture.

What is called for is a partnership between the Holy Spirit and baptized believers. We are to never lose sight of the reality that they are chosen to lead the charge forward through the Spirit.

The Word holds power, as Paul also reminds us. It is the God-inspired Word full of purpose:

"All Scripture is breathed out by god and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for the training in righteousness, that the
