Shaking hands in Germany



Beth Hejl, PTP exchange student in 1985-86, has been writing a blog comparing customs in the U.S. and Germany since she moved to Germany in 2012. Since people have said they

missed her blog posts in recent issues, we decided to include some excerpts every now and then.

Social protocol (or Why Americans sometimes just don't fit in over here):

I was at a fancy party the other evening where I knew no one but the hostess. She and I became friends at our three-week summer hunting course, and she was celebrating both her birthday and her successful completion of the three-day, three-part hunting test (I will take – and hopefully pass – my test in May). I had a really nice time chatting with mainly hunters and some folks from Switzerland. The first couple I was introduced to was a Schießlehrer (shooting instructor), whom I hope to become a student of shortly, and his wife. Since it was the Schießlehrer the hostess wanted me to meet, I reached out my hand to him, having grasped long ago that this is the way to greet someone in Germany even during cold & flu season. He looked at me with gentle consternation and pointed to his wife. Right - When introduced to a couple, one must shake the woman's hand first!

I know this rule, but to be honest I thought it only applied to men, in the same way men are (were?) expected to take their hats off inside buildings but women are not. Now I know better.
