Secretary Minutes As of March 3rd, 2010.

He then asked for approval of the Feb. 3 minutes as published. Fred Zajac made such a motion, which was seconded by Morris Seguin. No Discussion. The vote was unanimous and the motion was

opposed / abstained all were in favor. The motion was so moved. Members should make sure GSSN emails go into members' **inbox's** so that they're not treated as **spam.** The next Highgrader will alert recipients of this change.

Ian then announced that a suggestion box is and will be at the front door for members to feel free to use. He also set out a sign-up sheet for those wishing to volunteer for the Gold Show at South Point this month. Next Morris S. spoke about outings. He said the 3 day May 14,15,16 outing at Greggs Hideout (co-joint w/ GPAA) is being worked on & he set out a sign-up sheet for those who plan to attend & who might want to volunteer to help out. He said it is so important to get as precise a head count as possible to plan for the amount of food needed. He said he could be contacted by phone or email by the Wednesday or Thursday prior to the outing for last minute people who will be attending. Ian said a potty-type device had been donated to the club.

After a short break, Dennis Johnson spoke to the group about roads going through our claims where windmills will be built. BLM.gov has links for further info. John Bronstien then spoke on some new finds. He asked members to volunteer to help check out new claim possibilities & provided a sign-up sheet for this important club activity. Next, Dennis Johnson gave two interesting book reviews: (1) "Mines of Silver Peak Range, Kawich Range & other Southern Nevada Districts" by S.H. Ball and (2) "Step in the Right Direction" by D. Geary. He also read an entertaining oldtime oratory, "The Ballad of Rattlesnake Jake." After another short break, George Niederiter spoke to the group encouraging anyone to come out to the claims: help is always available. Ian then asked the group about establishing a

reloadable discretionary fund. After some discussion, it was decided to table this agenda item while the board will work out the language except Fred made a motion that meanwhile we provisionally authorize up to \$400 as a Gold Show discretionary fund for this month and Morris seconded the motion. After a brief discussion, the vote was unanimously in favor & the motion was so carried.

Next, the Quarter Kitty Door Prize was drawn & the lucky winner of \$15 was Carol Griffen. This was followed by the 50 / 50 and the recipient of \$46 was Don Kopp. 27 items were raffled off next. At 8:40 PM Fred made a motion to adjourn the meeting, Morris seconded the motion, & the meeting ended at that time.

The Double D

The first hints of the daybreak were brightening the eastern sky as the old pickup towing a single horse trailer pulled off the twotrack.

Jack and Boone jumped out and unloaded Dumbo, a sturdy burro, affectionally named for his huge ears.

Jack grabbed the panniers, one loaded with campfood, a frying pan, a few utensils and water, the other with sleeping bags and mats, a small tent, a change of clothes for both men and some other odds and ends. Boone hung the panniers on Dumbo's pack saddle, strapped on the drywasher and frame, added a pick, two shovels and two gallons of gas. He strapped the leaf blower and drywasher hose to his pack frame. Jack's pack was loaded with snacks, toilet paper, a small first aid kit, binoculars, a map of the area, a gold pan, several cloth bags for their concentrates, more water

The last time they were here, prospecting around the base of the mountain, Dumbo had chewed through his tie rope and wandered off during the night. After tracking for hours, they found him near a hidden spring hole further up the mountain and stumbled across a small plateau.

The trek to the small plateau was about two miles, all uphill. They smoked in silence, comfortable with each other, and watched the sky beginning to color. A small sliver of sun was just appearing over the hills to the east.

Finishing their smokes, Boone fished a carrot out of Jack's pack and offered it to Dumbo, while Jack strapped on his Colt Woodsman loaded with snake shot. He also carried hollow points for bigger varmints.

They shouldered their loads and Jack led off with Boone and Dumbo bringing up the rear. Dumbo was Jack's burro but he seemed to like Boone and was a little more cooperative with Boone leading him.

They walked in silence, enjoying the quiet broken only by the calls of birds leaving their roosts. A startled jackrabbit bounding off the trail earned chuckles from both men. With less than a quarter of a mile to go, Boone tied Dumbo to a Joshua tree. The small plateau interrupted a steep wash that came down off the mountain. The last time they were here, time permitted only digging a few samples. The samples were surprisingly rich when panned. A few pickers and a good showing of small coarse gold excited both men and they were anxious to spend a few days drywashing their new spot. They reached the plateau,

hobbled Dumbo and unloaded the equipment.

Jack set up the drywasher while Boone organized their camp and pitched the tent.

Jack was already swinging the pick into the rocky ground when Boone joined him. The silence of the high desert was shattered when Boone fired up the blower motor and started shoveling. They worked for an hour, shut off the blower and cleaned out the drywasher. The concentrates went into one of the cloth bags but Jack took a few handfulls in his gold pan over to camp. Boone got their water bottles and a couple of apples. Dumbo gazed longingly at Boone until an apple was tossed his way. Jack had the concentrates panned down to black sand and had a big grin on his face. Boone peered into the pan and saw a couple of small nuggets emerging from the black sand and an increasingly bigger crescent of coarse flakes along the edge. Jack pulled his snuffer bottle from his shirt pocket and sucked up all the gold from the crescent.. Twisting off the cap he added the nuggets and gave Boone a high five. After eating their apples, having a drink of water and a quick

smoke, they headed back to work.

By noon, they would have to slow down. It would be too hot for the hard work of drywashing. For now they would just move dirt, knowing they were into good color. Sample panning could wait. Hourly cleanups of the drywasher, a bottle of water and a quick smoke would be the only breaks from the hard, hot, dusty work.

It was after noon. Their hole was about 3 feet wide. 4 feet long and 2 ½ feet deep. As Jack shut down the blower to do a cleanup, Boone scampered out of the hole, went to their camp and returned with a whisk broom and small dust pan. Bedrock was exposed on the bottom of the hole and was begging to be cleaned. Their first bag of concentrates was almost full. Boone put his bedrock sweepings into another bag and they took a break for lunch. While Boone got the peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, trail mix, water, apples and a carrot for Dumbo, Jack tied a rope between two trees and attached a small tarp for shade. It felt good to get out of the sun.

After lunch, Boone took the sweepings and began panning. Jack was awakened from his siesta by Boone's whoop of glee as he held up a marble sized nugget. Boone's metal detector was added to their list of things to bring on their next trip.

They went back to work but at a slower pace with frequent breaks in the shade. More sample panning told them they were still in good gold.

As the sun slid behind the mountain, the small plateau became shaded and although they were both tired, hot and dirty, neither wanted to quit working. When twilight settled on the plateau, Jack shut off the blower and did the last cleanup of the day. Boone was on his knees sweeping the recently exposed bedrock, when Jack grabbed a canvas bucket, filled the gold pan with water, topped off Dumbo's bucket and headed to the spring hole. Boone started a fire and broke out a couple of cans of Hormel chili, saltines, cheese and cookies for supper.

When Jack returned with more water, he found a towel and washcloth and managed to wash off most of the dust using his gold pan as a wash basin. He changed into his clean clothes and took over the cooking duties so Boone could get cleaned up.

They sat by the fire eating and talking about their find. They had prospected together for several years and usually found a little gold but nothing like this. Prospecting was an adventure and the the flash of a little gold in the pan always excited them but they never made much more than gas money.


They decided to lay claim to the plateau on Monday.

Sleep came easy but they were both up at first light eager to gather more concentrates to pan at home. Breakfast was pb and j sandwiches, apples, water and a carrot for Dumbo.

The blower came to life as the first rays of sunlight hit the plateau. Morning passed quickly as they filled most of another bag with concentrates. At noon, Jack cleaned up the dry washer as Boone swept the bedrock. They broke camp, loaded their equipment and took the hobbles off Dumbo. He was happy to be free and kicked up his heels, but a carrot and a few words from Boone calmed him down. With Jack leading the way, they headed down the mountain to the truck. With everything loaded in the truck, they started for home. Both men were hot, dirty and tired but excited. They vowed to meet the next day, file their claim, which they named Dumbo's Discovery, pan their concentrates and plan their next trip to the Double D.
