Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

FROM THE

Happy Pentecost Sunday! How dramatic a scene we read about in Acts 2:2-4, about a noisy, strong driving wind that fills the house where the apostles are gathered in prayer. Small badges of fire settle above them and they begin speaking in new tongues. Something is new about all of this, and something big is going to come out of it. Yes, all of us in the church. Some people describe this event as the transformation of the loosely formed band of apostles into the true church of Jesus Christ. Jesus had prophesied 'building' his Church upon Peter and His confession (Matthew 16:18), and we see it happen here in Acts 2:14. It is Peter who is the first apostle to open his mouth proclaiming Jesus as the Risen Savior and calling everyone to repent and accept Christ! Certainly we see a much different group of apostles here rushing out into the streets witnessing to their faith and fearlessly identifying themselves as disciples of Jesus (not that long ago we heard about the apostles 'fearfully' hiding behind 'locked' doors- John 20:19 & 26). This bold witness will only continue to strengthen as we read on through the Acts of the Apostles. So the Holy Spirit (wind, fire and movement) ushers in among the apostles their new language of mission-life in Jesus. This newness and freshness cries out loudly of the 'birth' of something new (babes crying out God's wisdom---Matthew 21:16-Psalm 8:3). So often, people call Pentecost the 'Birthday of the Church'.

Back around 2011 when the new Roman Missal English Translations went into effect (the 'And with your Spirit' ones), an extended form of the Pentecost Vigil was re-introduced. This move made Pentecost Mass parallel the Easter Vigil Mass with an extended Liturgy of the Word, that read multiple Old Testament readings (4 & Psalms and Prayers) to lay a deeper foundation for interpreting the New Testament Events of Jesus and His Church. Pentecost is not as long as Easter, but this longer set of readings does review some of the more interesting readings of the Old Testament. For example, we would read Genesis 11, 1-9 about the Tower of Babel (Ps 33), then Exodus 19, 3-8a, 16-20b about God's Descent on Mt Sinai (Ps 19), then Ezekiel 37, 1-14, about the dry bones come to life (Ps 107) and then Joel 3, 1-5, about visions and dreams (Ps 105). That would be the Old Testament- then on into the New, we would read Romans 8:22-27 about the Holy Spirit groaning in creation followed by a sequence prayer & Alleluia, ending with the gospel of John 7:37-39 where Jesus describes the Spirit as a 'rising spring of water with in a person'. This restored liturgy brings quite a bible reading plan with it (Who ever said Catholics don't read the Bible?). These additional readings offer multiple dimensions of interpretation for the event of the Holy Spirit's outpouring upon those first disciples (Now, I didn't say that the feast of Pentecost justifies a preacher's long-windedness today. I also didn't say anything about the Feast being a celebration of 'hot air'!) In fact, after the Resurrection, Pentecost may be the next most exciting feast of our faith! What might the Holy Spirit do in our lives if we were truly led by Him? My favorite 'Spirit' story is the encounter between the apostle Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch in Acts 8:26-40. The Spirit tells Philip there to 'Get up and head south on road..(v26)' What does Philip do? He gets up and goes. And Philip runs into the eunuch who just happens to be reading the prophet Isaiah, but is confused (it is okay to be confused upon first readings of the bible). Philip answers his questions, and it surprisingly leads to a roadside baptism, at which point the Spirit who gives salvation to the eunuch also 'snatched Philip away off to Azotus' (vss 39-40). The life-giving excitement never ends with the Holy Spirit. And this is only one apostle, Philip, and the stories we happen to have of his experiences of the Spirit. How much more happened with the others that we don't have a record of in scripture?

Yet, all of that life and movement is what waits for us when we attune ourselves to the Spirit's direction, accepting His gifts and following His lead! What is ahead on the Way? New languages, new visions and new lands! Listening to the all of this Pentecost action, I am not sure what impresses me most? The driving & shaking wind, the crowns of fire lighting upon the apostles or the new language that somehow people from everywhere understand? Today, I'll answer that the new language gift is most striking. The apostles speak with the Spirit that simultaneously allows people of different national tongues to understand just what he is saying. Is it some kind of (Esperanto) universal language? Is it the shorthand-comfort language of one's own family, the code of friends, the melody of music or universal language of the heart. If it's the Holy Spirit, then it's any voice that carries 'love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control' (Gal 5:22-23)? Peace, FrBrian

#### <u>Another Saint in Time of Plague: Blessed Maria Repetto</u> (born 11-1-1807 died 1-5-1890)

Maria Repetto was born in Voltaggio as the first of eleven children to Giovanni Battista Repetto and Teresa Gazzale. Her family was very devout and frequently attending mass and other prayers at their parish church. Maria was baptized the day of her birth and made her First Communion at age ten. Childhood disease was prevalent in the area of her home and by the tie she turned thirteen years old, she had witnessed the death of two younger brothers. Maria sought ways to serve God in a dedicated form of life, and so she sought out different religious orders in which she could consecrate herself to purity and service in the church. On May 7, 1829 she eventually joined the Sisters of Our Lady of Refuge in Mount Calvary. This religious order was also called the 'Brignolines', who were founded by St Virginia Centurione Bracelli in 1619 (she was featured in this column back on May 31, 2020) who opened homes of women for welcoming and caring for abandoned children. The second orphanage home opened by St Virginia Bracelli was established on property donated by the Marquise Brignola, which led to them being called the "Brignolines". Maria made her initial simple profession of vows on August 15, 1829 and her full permanent solemn vows in 1831. She was very talented working with cloth and linen. She served the religious community as a seamstress and embroiderer. She began having trouble with her eyesight and fearing that she was going blind, her superior reassigned her become the porter (portress) and doorkeeper of the convent. Her duties included welcoming visitors, protecting the cloistered nuns from outside interruptions and conducting business with the public. She made many friends with visitors and many people sought her out for spiritual direction because of their interactions with her while visiting the convent. She was faithful in spreading devotion to St Joseph, as patron saint of the home and welcoming others in the name of Christ. She gave out so many medals, prayer cards, and holy images of St Joseph to everyone who came to the convent door. People would come just to pray with her and listen to any greeting or counsel she would give them.


According to a story told by Dom Antoine Marie, OSB, a woman once came to Blessed Maria asking for prayer and help because her husband (the primary income for their family) went blind. Maria advised her to pray hard to St Joseph for his intercession and for a healing. Maria also went to her cell and prayed, and also took an icon of St Joseph and turned it face toward the wall, saying, "Try yourself seeing in the dark". The woman returned to the convent the following day and claimed that her husband was healed overnight. Maria attributed the healing to St Joseph's intercession, and she went back to her cell, turning the icon again face outward and she kept a candle lit in front of the icon of St Joseph ever after that . She thanked St Joseph and God's mercy every day for the miraculous intervention.

Maria always experienced a deep compassion for those who were sick and those giving care to them. During two different cholera epidemics (one in 1835 & another in 1854), she left the convent to serve the sick in hospitals or in street shelters. After the epidemics ended, she returned to her work welcoming visitors. She felt that her door-keeping work was meant to foster greater devotion to St Joseph as the patron saint of families and homes. Once when certain sisters complained of her popularity and the abundance of pilgrims that came to the convent to see her (the noise and traffic), her superior moved her deeper into the convent behind cloistered walls. When visitors stopped coming all together, her mother superior appointed her again to her previous position as doorkeeper/guestmaster. She was so faithful at working the door, greeting everyone as if they were Christ Himself and making them feel at home, fed and housed if needed (as if they visitors themselves to Bethlehem, but greeted by the Holy Family itself). On January 5, 1890 she experienced some convulsions and then only a few moments later she passed peacefully from this world. Pope John Paul II beatified Maria in Saint Peter's Square on 4 October 1981. Her gift of comforting others especially during epidemic times and nursing the sick make her a great saint in our time of plague and pandemic.
