Updates from the Council

Happy New Year!

News shorts: We have a budget ready to present at our annual meeting on January 26th. With members giving above and beyond, Calvary's mortgage has been paid off!

Property: The two new sanctuary furnaces have been installed. We are still waiting for an electrician to bring the fuse panel to code in order to complete the furnace installation. Last month someone dumped furniture and garbage at the south end of the parking lot. Gary Clark and Dave Rabon worked to remove and dump it. The enclosure on the north side of the building needs to be removed. However, after it is taken down, a railing needs to be installed for safety. This is a future project.

Congregation Care: We need to do a better job of checking in on our members who are hospitalized, home-bound, or recovering from surgery.

Community Care: We several successful events last month – combined advent soup suppers and worship with All Saints Episcopal Church, Holiday Bazaar, a Christmas pageant, and a Birthday Party for Jesus.

Nominating Committee update: We have 3 council members continuing for another year through 2025: Dennis White, Leann White, Anita Hiebel. Charity Huggett is running for a 1-year position. The following candidates are running for 2-year positions: Kathleen Murphy, Kayse Durgan, Chris Landtiser, Sharon Elliott, Kayla Iiams, Brent Young, and Shari Young. Brent and Shari have also agreed to attend the Synod Assembly. We are still in need of three members for the 2025 Nominating Committee.

Long Term building use: Life Center Pentecostal and De Dios Pentecostes Nueva Vida agreements for December 30, 2024 to November 30, 2025 have been signed.

Thank you to everyone who helped make Calvary's advent and Christmas worship services run smoothly. Worship assistants, lectors, altar guild, musicians, ushers, flower providers, and coffee hour hosts, your efforts are immensely appreciated.

Blessings to all in this new year we have entered. You make a difference every day and when we work together, there is no stopping us.


