PALMS OF LIFE, HOPE AND VICTORY!

Matt. 21:1-11; Is. 50:4-7; Ps. 22:8-9, 17-20, 23-24; Phil. 2:6-11; Matt. 26:1427:66

It has been a very long and bitter winter! The heavens dumped so much snow on us, coupled with other natural disasters around the globe, that we wondered whether we were nearing the end of the world. So much money, time and energy were spent clearing the *whitish substance*, although both adults and children enjoy playing in it. When we looked out our windows or when we walked around the neighborhood, the lawns and plants seemed dead. As I spent time contemplating the meaning of all this – green grass turning brown – plants shedding their leaves and branches withering, I remember what Jesus said: "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies it produces much fruit." Absolutely!

Now, when we look out of the window or when we walk through the neighborhood, everything is coming back to life. The shrubs are budding, the grass is turning green, and the plants are beginning to bloom once again. The sun is coming out from the clouds much more often. There is new life on the horizon! Thanks to you, our devoted and generous parishioners, the coming of a new life is also reflected in the renovations that just took place in the interior of our church – the pews are refurbished and padded – new kneelers are installed – new comfortable and elegant altar furniture has been provided for the principal celebrant as well as the altar servers. When we look at our gardens and lawns we see the spring of new life; likewise, when we look within our church (God's abode) we also see an element of new life. This is very comforting!

It should be comforting as we celebrate Palm Sunday today, the beginning of *Holy Week*, leading us to the *Paschal Mystery* of the crucifixion – the death and the resurrection of our Lord Jesus – because we know that even though the winter might have been very long, painful and costly, spring will always bring new life. A grain of wheat has to fall to the ground and die if it is to produce fruit! The Passion narrative that we listen to today and on Good Friday, tells the story of how Jesus was betrayed, arrested, prosecuted and condemned to die. It tells us how Jesus carried His cross, was mocked and crucified. He died so that you and I might have life and have it more abundantly. Finally, Christ rose on the third day. His resurrection is a reminder and an assurance to you and me that there is always new life after death. There is new life at spring after a bitter winter season!

In the ancient Greek and Roman pagan cultures, palms served as a symbol of life, hope and victory. Early Christians adapted it to celebrate the victory of Christ over death and the new life His resurrection brought to the world. As we gather to bless our palms and as we process solemnly with our blessed palms to God's Jerusalem, the Church, we should make every effort not to lose the meaning of the events we celebrate during this Holy Week washing of feet and institution of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday - veneration of the Cross on Good Friday - solemn procession with lighted candles at Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. It is important for you and me to know that this is not a period of spring break trips to the beaches and resorts. Rather, it is a period when we must take a break from every distraction and self-indulgence in order to reflect on the self-emptying love Christ has for you and me. It is a time to remind ourselves that if we are to enjoy the new life in spring, we must first of all have the courage to endure the bitterness of winter. 

WHAT WE CELEBRATE DURING THE EASTER TRIDUUM

Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday)

- The day commemorates the Last Supper of Christ and His Twelve Apostles and the institution of the Eucharist.
- During the *Gloria*, all the bells of the church are rung. They then remain silent until the Easter Vigil (children are sometimes told "the bells have flown to Rome").
- On Holy Thursday, the celebrant often celebrates the rite of the *washing of the feet*, where the feet of twelve people are washed.
- On Holy Thursday during the day, bishops celebrate the Chrism Mass, where they bless the oils for Confirmation, the Anointing of the Sick and the Catechumens. (The Chrism Mass can be celebrated on another day on Holy Week, however). In the New York Archdiocese, for pastoral reasons, it is celebrated on Tuesday of Holy Week.
- The Hosts not distributed in Communion on Holy Thursday are reserved and distributed on Good Friday, when no Mass is celebrated.
- After the Mass, the Blessed Sacrament is carried in procession to an "Altar of Repose." Then all Altars except that one are stripped.

Good Friday

- The Church mourns for Christ's death, reverences the Cross, and marvels at His life for His obedience till death.
- There is no Mass; the Eucharist is not consecrated. Communion takes place with the hosts left over from Holy Thursday.
- The church remains stripped on this day of ornate objects, including the Altar cloth and candles, as a sign of respect.
- Holy water fonts are emptied.
- On this day, the *Stations of the Cross* are often prayed either in the church or outside.
- Celebration of the liturgy of the Lord's Passion occurs in the afternoon.
- The priest wears red vestments. If a Bishop presides or helps to preside, he wears a simplex miter.

Liturgy: The liturgy consists of three parts in the Roman Rite: the Liturgy of the Word, the Veneration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. The celebrant prostrates before the Altar.

The *readings* from Isaiah 53 (about the Suffering Servant) and the Epistle to the Hebrews are read.

The *Passion narrative* of the Gospel of John is sung or read often with divided roles.

General Intercessions: The congregation prays for the Church, the Pope, the Jews, non-Christians, unbelievers and others.

Veneration of the Cross: A crucifix is solemnly unveiled before the congregation. The people venerate it on their knees. During this part, the "Reproaches" are often sung.

Communion service: The Communion of the previous day is distributed among the people.

• Even if music is used in the Liturgy, it is not used to open and close the Liturgy, nor is there a formal recessional (closing procession).

Holy Saturday (Also known as Black Saturday.)

• A day of silence and prayer which commemorates the dead Christ in the tomb. No Mass is celebrated. In cases of the danger of death, Eucharistic Hosts remaining from the Liturgies of the two previous days are used as *viaticum*.

The Tabernacle is left empty and open. The lamp or candle usually situated next to the Tabernacle denoting the Presence of Christ is put out, and the Eucharist is kept elsewhere, usually the sacristy, with a lamp or candle burning before it.
