"I'M A REDEEMED SINNER" By Pastor Paul DeMoss

What a way to start an article, especially an article for the church newsletter. No, this is not going to be some kind of confession, but I do hope it is going to be earth shattering and life changing.

What do I mean when I say, I'm a redeemed sinner? The truth is that I am a forgiven sinner. I'm forgiven because Jesus died for me and takes all my sins. I remember the movie, *The Passion* and how difficult it was to watch Jesus being beaten by the soldiers and trying to walk the streets to Calvary carrying the cross until He could carry it no longer. I cringed as I watched the nails being pounded in, tearing the flesh on His hands and feet. This movie is in the church library if you'd like to view it.

In the congregation I served in Trotwood, there was a lady who had some old iron spikes. They were kept in an air-proof box and were approximately 10 to 12 inches long. Legend had it that these were the kind of spikes used on Jesus. They were driven through His hands and through His feet. I can't imagine the pain He must have experienced. While in this pain He said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." [Lk.23.34] Jesus was hanging on the cross with blood flowing from His back, His hands and His feet. And words of forgiveness are heard, "Father, forgive them for they do not know what they are doing." Do you hear what Jesus is saying to you? Do you hear these words when you look at The Cross? Do you hear these words when you receive Holy Communion: "The Body of Christ given for you; the Blood of Christ shed for you?" The sacrament of the altar washes away our sins, and we are free of all our past sins. The hard part is forgiving ourselves, and this we must do in order to complete what Jesus has done for us.

Many of us have our secrets from the past that we don't talk about and want to forget. We can forget our sins when we give them to Jesus. I remember preaching a sermon describing Jesus as our garbage collector. We put all our sins, trash, and garbage in a nice neat confession and set them down at the altar rail, and then Jesus comes and takes them away. He takes all of our sins away, no matter what we've done. Do you hear that? You are a redeemed, forgiven sinner. In all the churches I've served, I have not met one person who was not a redeemed sinner, and that includes those at seminary worship.

A young lady telephoned me one day in tears and very upset. I knew the phone was not the way to talk with her. I arrived at her home at the agreed upon time, and we started talking. After a few sentences, the tears were flowing again. After many tears, she finally told me why she was so upset. She had had an abortion in another state when she was 16 years old. Now ten years later, she was feeling the sin and deep pain of that action like never before. She said she didn't think she could ever take communion again. She felt that she was unforgiveable. She said, "I can't take communion again after what I did." Now I could understand how deep this pain was for this young lady.

I explained to her that Jesus died for her, and He took away her sin, yes even this deep sin and pain that she was feeling. I told her that nothing we've done is unforgivable. Look how He forgave His disciples who turned and ran and denied knowing Him. Do you hear Jesus from the cross? "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." Those words are said to and for us, even today.

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Yes, the young lady heard the words from the cross but felt ever so bad. The next Sunday we celebrated Holy Communion. She sat between her mother- in-law and a cousin, and they knew something was wrong, for she was in tears. We read the words of confession, followed by the words of absolution spoken by the pastor. The words of confession had deep meaning for her as did the words of absolution. "As a called and ordained minister of the church of Christ, and by His authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins in the name of the Father, † and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. AMEN". She was in tears when she came for communion; we offered communion by groups of people coming forward. She received communion with her mother-in-law on one side and her cousin on the other holding her up and not knowing why she was having so much difficulty. She heard and saw me look at her, and she had a new understanding, a deeper understanding of the words: "The body of Christ given for you," then with the cup, "The Blood of Christ shed for you." Then the blessing followed: "The Body of our Lord Jesus Christ and His precious Blood strengthen and preserve you unto eternal life." Yes, my friends, we are redeemed sinners.

During the season of Easter, look at the cross and remember what Jesus has done for you.

When you receive His Body and His Blood, remember that this is you, that you are a redeemed sinner. You are a forgiven sinner set free to live in hope and joy for the Lord.

I like Bill Gaither's hymn "BECAUSE HE LIVES!" The chorus is especially meaningful.

Because He Lives, I can face tomorrow, Because He lives, all fear is gone; Because I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living, Just because He lives!

History of Women of the ELCA

Lutheran women in the United States have been gathering in mission since the 1800s, and we owe much to our foremothers who responded to God's call, created a place and lived out a purpose when women had no voice in the church.

Three groups came together in 1987 to form Women of the ELCA. These groups were the American Lutheran Church Women (of the American Lutheran Church), the Lutheran Church Women (of the Lutheran Church in America) and Women in Action for Mission (of the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches). The constituting convention was held June 13-14, 1987, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, with the theme "Embrace God's World." The organization was officially constituted Jan. 1, 1988, with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Communication tools would soon follow. The magazine *Lutheran Woman Today* began publishing in January 1988 and *Newsletter* (the predecessor to *Interchange*) followed in June of that year. The organization's first website was inaugurated in 1995. <u>Café</u>, our electronic magazine for young women launched in 2006, with podcasts soon to follow. In 2011, *Lutheran Woman Today* changed its name to <u>Gather</u>, and continued providing award-winning content (Bible studies and articles) to more than 45,000 readers, with a pass-along rate of 3 additional people per subscriber.

The organization's first smart phone app, <u>Daily Grace</u>, was unveiled in 2011 (available for IOS and Android), the same year that the magazine took on a new name, <u>Gather</u>.

Various program initiatives were launched in 1988, some of which continue today such as a <u>scholarship program</u>. Initiatives came and went, meeting the needs of the women at the time. <u>Raising Up Healthy Women and Girls</u>, the organization's health initiative, began in 2005. <u>Bold Women's Day</u>, an annual celebration of our mission and the women who accomplish it, launched in 2007.

Today the organization is active in approximately 7,000 of the 9,200 ELCA congregations and in 64 of the 65 synods (the only synod without a synodical organization is the Slovak Zion Synod, the ELCA's only non-geographical synod).

WELCA's purpose hasn't wavered since it created its first constitution. "As a community of women created in the image of God, called to discipleship in Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit, we commit ourselves to grow in faith, affirm our gifts, support one another in our callings, engage in ministry and action, and promote healing and wholeness in the church, the society and the world."

Since constituting in 1988, Women of the ELCA has belonged to the women; it is self-incorporated. No money from the ELCA budget is given to Women of the ELCA; <u>all monetary support comes from the women themselves</u>.

- Saints The First Lutheran "Saints"


There will be service projects for the community—one each Sunday

The first European to reach the cape was the Portuguese explorer Bartolomeu Dias on March 12, 1488, who named it the "Cape of Storms". It was later renamed by John II of Portugal as "Cape of Good Hope" (*Cabo da Boa Esperança*) because its discovery was a good omen that India could be reached by sea from Europe. St. Paul said, "so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints." The Young Adults in Global Mission



The Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) invites young adults (21-29) to embark on a life-changing journey. Participants serve in a variety of fields in one of 10 country programs and experience the transformation that comes with one year of international mission service. Volunteers serve in the spirit of accompaniment — walking together with global companions in mutuality, solidarity and interdependence. In recent years, the YAGM

program has sent around 80 volunteers into service annually. Volunteers are placed according to skill and experience in alignment with requests from our global companions. Just off the eastern coast of South Africa is the island of Madagascar, one of the places where YAGM works. The Malagasy Lutheran Church was established by Norwegians in 1863. Today there are some four million members doing ministry in Madagascar.

One of the many books I read while in Florida was <u>The Neil Gaimon</u>
Reader, which included some of his short stories as well as excerpts from his novels. I quote the following narrative from one short story entitled "The Man Who Forgot Ray Bradbury:"

"A poor man found himself in a forest as night fell, and he had no prayer book to say his evening prayers. So he said, 'God who knows all things, I have no prayer book and I do not know any prayers by heart. But you know all the prayers. You are God. So this is what I am going to do. I am going to say the alphabet, and I will let you put the words together.'"

(Think about that one, Folks!)

On the way home from Florida, a three-and-a-half-day trip if we take it easy, I read Someone Knows my Name, by Lawrence Hill, a story surrounding the Atlantic Slave trade from 1518 - 1865 and the Black Loyalists who supported England in the Revolution and were promised land first in Nova Scotia and then in Sierra Leone, where Liberia will be founded by former American slaves. The writing includes the early history of Beaufort County, South Carolina (where Paul and I took a bus tour two years ago) and details about indigo. It was a fascinating read.

Currently, I am reading Love In the Time of Cholera by Gabriel Garcia Marquez, copyright 1988 and, by the way, a translation. I read it once a few years ago and totally missed the point. Now my Toledo-Defiance-Findlay book club members chose it for the end of April, so I struggle through it again. As I begin again, I am aware of how many different meanings of the word love are used. I will keep you posted on how well goes the read.
