P.S. Food here is more expensive than in your locality, while all other merchandise is 1/4 cheaper. We bought a nice double barrel shotgun with accessories for 40 Francs.

P.S. Klein from Bingen is still here. He probably will give an unfavorable report back home. The statement by Mueller should be regarded only as an attempt to serve his own purpose.

The name G. T.(?) Epeneter appears at the bottom of a list of individuals who left Buedesheim on October 25, 1845. It appears he was some kind of official with Buedesheim or the shipping company. The name C. Dintsek in the second paragraph could be Carl Deutsch who sailed with the other Buedesheimers.

Other names on the October 26, 1845 list include P.J. Wendel, Caspar Rothemer, J. Rothemer, Lucas Burtschell, Philip J. Frei, Johan Frei, Adam Braden, Johann Baptist Braden, Anton Braden, Johan Frei, Jr., Louis Gunst, Georg Gayer, Adam Krieger, Johann Schmitt III, Ferdinand Sommer, Ludewig Wink, Caspar Schuler, H. Walder, and Adam Resch.

A purser's list for the ship Andacia, dated 2/5 December 1845 lists L. Burtschel, Ph. J. Frey, Paul Frey, P. Jac. Wendel, John Frey, K. Walter, Caspar Shuler, Adam Resch, Ferd. Sommer, Jac. Werkert.

An earlier purser's list for the ship Andacia, dated 26/29 November 1845 had listed F. Wink, A. Braden, Ad. Braden, J. Braden, Caspar Rothemer, Jac. Rothemer, C. Deutsch, J. Schmitt, and Dornbach.

The December 15, 1845, list of passengers on the Hamilton gives no mention of the Rothemers, etc. The Andacia sailed from Antwerp on December 5, 1845, arrived in Galveston March 29, 1846, and arrived in Indianola on April 12, 1846. The Hamilton left Antwerp on December 22, 1845 and arrived in Galveston on April 8, 1846.

The book A New Land Beckoned lists hundreds of German immigrants to Texas. The Buedesheimers and the names of the ships on which they sailed are not consistent with the purser's lists referred to above. Since the letter written by C. Rothemer indicates a change in plans, perhaps some of these records were filed before final plans were made.
