

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

WHAT NEEDS TO BE PRUNED IN ME THAT I **MAY BEAR FRUIT TO THE FULLEST EXTENT?**

The early church was persecuted by both state and reli-




gious authorities, so to proclaim at the end of this passage from acts that it was at peace throughout the region seems unbelievable. But then again, the fact that Saul of Tarsus, hated persecutor of the church, was now speaking out boldly in the name of the Lords was equally incredible. The wonders God could do did not end on Easter morning.

Today's Gospel passage takes place at the Last Supper, Jesus' final meal with His friends before His death. He had just dismissed Judas, after announcing that he would betray Him. He also had already told Peter that he would deny Him three times before morning. The other ten apostles would abandon Him as well, none of them accompanying Him as He was put on trial So when He tells them, "Remain in me," He is making a heartfelt pleas to His closest friends (John 15:4). He knows full well that they will not remain with Him. But their bond is stronger than their actions on that fateful day. Though they do not remain with Him, they remain in Him as He remains in them, as He remains in us, no matter how far we may wander.

The image of the vine is a wonderful one. A vine does not grow straight up like a tree or most other plants. Its flexible stem hunts for any hold, spiraling around posts, climbing up fences, wrapping around other plants. In

doing so it connects everything in its surround-As does ings. Jesus. Jesus, the true vine, reaches out to all, and all of us are connected, not just to the vine, Je-



sus, but to everyone else. We see this demonstrated in Barnabas connected the newlythe first reading: converted Saul to the Christian community in Jerusalem. The vine continues to connect us with our neighbor, across space and time, to a single community in the Lord.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:


In order to flourish and bear fruit, the vine needs to be pruned. What in me needs to be pruned so that I can bear fruit to the fullest extent possible?



Branching Out Isn't Always What It's Cracked Up to Be

"That's a really beautiful tree branch. Man, would you look at the bark on that thing? The others are real duds, but that low-hanging branch has really got it all together."

I've never heard anyone say this. Maybe I just need to hang out with more arborists, but I can't recall ever hearing someone admire the particular beauty of a single branch. When someone comments on a tree, it's usually the whole tree - perhaps a visual element of it, like the color of the leaves or its height. But people don't usually zero in on one branch.

Maybe that's because usually, if one branch is looking a little weak, chances are every other branch is, too.

The Bible tells us that when we bear fruit as good everyday stewards, it is for the Father's glory. We are the branch on His magnificent tree. What we have is from Him, and what we do likewise points back to Him. We also tend to reflect how well the other branches around us are incorporating the nutrients coming their way. That's all fine and good in theory. In practice, it can be an arduous exercise in humility.

When I do something virtuous or charitable or kind, there is a part of me that wants to stand out for it. I think that's true for all of us. We've given of ourselves in some way or overcome some human temptation to accomplish a little bit of good in this world, and even though we know God sees us, we'd really love for everyone else to see it, too.

It's a struggle, for sure. But we need to remember that our fruit belongs to the whole tree.
