

God's Encouraging Word ... when I am suffering

Are you familiar with tunnel vision? Someone experiencing tunnel vision can see an object directly ahead, but they often fail to notice what's around it. Maybe age or injury has robbed them of their peripheral vision. Maybe they grow fatigued during a long drive. Do you know what that's like?

We're also prone to tunnel vision when we're suffering. Face it, we've all been there. No one is immune from problems and pain. Everyone experiences hurts or hang-ups. But when we're hurting, is the bad all we can see? Do we focus on the problem so much that we ignore everything else? We can see no help. No hope. No good. No God. Do you know what that's like? It's not a happy place to be.

It can be especially tough as we prepare to enter the holiday season. How can we put on a smile for Thanksgiving and pretend that we are just fine?

No need to pretend. Listen to the psalmist: "My comfort in suffering is this: your promise preserves my life" (Psalm 119:50). Remember how God worked so wonderfully to solve our greatest problem. The burden of sin we could never carry. The consequence of guilt we could never dodge. The sentence of death we could not avoid. So Jesus stepped in for us and shouldered them all. The cross and the tomb—both empty now—mark Jesus' great victory.

And his victory is your victory. So resist the urge to give in to those feelings of defeat. Don't shrink back in fear. Don't separate yourself from others. Don't become bitter. Don't give up. Otherwise you will miss the help God wants to give you.

All around the problem of suffering, God's help is ready and waiting. Look up and find confidence: "My help comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth" (Psalm 121). Look in to God's word where he promises, "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5). Look back and recall how God has helped you through past challenges. Look around and find Christian friends eager to give you a hand and fold hands for you in prayer. Look ahead and see the open heaven God has in store for you through Jesus.

God promises to bring you safely through the tunnel of trouble. Trust his goodness!

Here's some background about Pastor Biedenbender.



After Paul's graduation from seminary, he was sent to plant Christ Lutheran Church in Denver, while also serving at Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Thornton.

In 2010, God brought Teresa Martinez and her daughter, Jazmine, into Christ Lutheran Church, and into Pastor Paul's life in a very special way. In 2012, Paul and Teresa were married, and blessed with three wonderful girls: Jazmine, Camila, and Emma.

Pastor Paul and his family currently live in the historic Cole neighborhood of Denver, and have become an integral part of the community they serve. Board of Education News

- We started the 2018-19 school year with 100 students and we added a new student after Labor Day. We have 13 students in PK and 88 students in K-8.
- Sunday School classes are going well. The enrollment numbers are becoming more consistent.
- Youth Group Pastors Day at LLHS went well. Pastor Brandt would appreciate someone to help him lead the group.
- Pioneers Program calls will be made to ask for a primary leader or leaders.
- The school will be receiving \$10,000 from the State of Wisconsin Department of Justice for the School Safety Initiative and for training. Mrs. Gunst and Mr. Cody will be attending training seminars and updates will be made to the school's outside doors.
- Concerns about students' dress code violations were shared with the BOE.
- Discussion about the soccer team / season was shared. Concerns about field size and eleven man format for our fourth through sixth grade participants were shared with those in attendance and asked to be forwarded to the Athletic Directors in their next meeting.
- BOE approved the four teachers attending the Washington DC trip in April.
- The BOE reviewed the school projects list and made a plan to try to complete some of the projects here at the start of the school year.
- The BOE received some requests from the SCRIP program and they were approved.
- Next Meeting will be Monday, November 12 at 7:00 P.M.

- Our Social Studies Fair and Praise Concert were held on Monday, October 22. Thank you to everyone who attended and assisted in both events!
- The first forensics meet was held at Zion, Columbus on Friday, October 19. The second meet is scheduled for Friday, November 2 at LPS.

- First Quarter for grades K-8 concludes on October 24. Parent / Teacher Consultations are scheduled for November 1 and 6. Preschool Parent / Teacher Conferences are scheduled for November 13 and 15.
- The Fall Church and School Blood Drive will be Friday, November 2 in the church basement. A Red Cross representative spoke to the students on Tuesday, October 23 about the blood drive and asked them to help recruit participants.
- A Food Drive will be held from November 1 to Friday, November 16. Collection of non-perishable food items will be held in the classrooms and hallways of the school.

November is Alzheimer's Awareness Month

Alzheimer's disease is the most common form of dementia, which is a general term for the loss of memory and intellectual abilities. Alzheimer's disease is fatal and there is no cure. It is a slow-moving disease that starts with memory loss and ends with severe brain damage. Alzheimer's causes a gradual decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills.



Symptoms depend on the stage of the disease:

Early symptoms include:

- Misplacing items
- Forgetting the names of places and objects
- Repeating themselves regularly, such as asking the same question several times
- Becoming less flexible and more hesitant to try new things

Middle- stage symptoms include:

- Increasing confusion and disorientation
- Obsessive, repetitive or impulsive behavior
- Delusions (believing things that are untrue)
- Problems with speech or language (aphasia)
- Disturbed sleep
- Changes in mood, such as frequent mood swings, depression and feeling increasingly anxious, frustrated or agitated
- Difficulty performing spatial tasks, such as judging distances

Later symptoms include:

- Difficulty changing position or moving around without assistance
- Considerable weight loss although some people eat too much and put on weight
- Gradual loss of speech
- Significant problems with short and long- term memory

Early detection is important in treatment options which can slow down the progress. If you think you or anyone you know has some of the warning signs of Alzheimer's, contact the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) of Dodge County for a Free Memory Screen: 800-924-6407 or 920-386-3580.

PRAYER UPDATES FOR: Saviour of the Nations Lutheran Church Vancouver, British Columbia, CANADA (Cortright & Sigrist Ministry)



Here are some update prayer requests shared recently by Missionary Wife Alicia Cortright for our Befriended Canadian mission:

- -Prayers for our Vicar Qiang Wang and his wife Susan: Susan's mother is battling cancer in China. She is weak and it seems like her days on earth are coming to a close. Susan has been in China for an extended amount of time now caring for her mother and will continue to stay as long as she can. We are all very thankful that Susan's mother is a newly baptized child of God and that Susan can be there to encourage her with God's Word. We pray for strength for Susan and Qiang as they are apart and also for Susan's mother as the Lord guides her remaining days.
- -Prayers for our second worship site in Surrey: Over the summer, the group of South Sudanese folks our congregation was meeting with in Surrey came together in an official capacity. They are having weekly worship and have plans in place for starting a new instruction course. There are regularly over 30 people in attendance at worship and we give thanks for this door the Lord has opened. We ask for God's guidance as the group continues to grow and as Pastor Cortright and David try to serve both Vancouver and Surrey (both with Sunday afternoon worship and studies due to limited availability of our rental spaces).
- -Prayers as we launch our fall programming: Prayers that God would bless our teachers as we start up with Sunday school, weekly Bible studies, catechism, etc. And that the Holy Spirit works in the hearts of those new to Christianity who attend our weekly studies that they would be baptized and continue to earnestly study the Word.
- -Prayers for our leaders as they explore a third worship site in Coquitlam: Vicar Wang and Pastor Cortright are looking at the possibility of reaching out with the Gospel in Mandarin in another local city called Coquitlam. There is a growing Chinese community there and not as many churches as other parts of our metropolitan area. We pray that God guides them in the best approach.

The rally began with attendees gathered around the Word as Pastor Dorn led a bible study on "How God's Love Influences My Life". The business meeting followed with a few reports and a couple short presentations. A quick note of thanks here to all of you who shared a portion of your blessings from the Lord for the two mission projects: WM: Haiti Projects & HM: Campus Ministry New Start. Your offerings totaled \$288 for this important mission work! Thank you! After the meeting, everyone gathered in the church fellowship hall for a light lunch, visiting and SOS silent auction bidding! Proceeds are used to "Send One Sister" to the 56th Annual LWMS Convention to be held in Des Moines, IA June 27-30, 2019! The afternoon session began with an entertaining skit and moved quickly to our featured speaker, Pastor Phillip Henselin, Executive Director, Institutional Ministries. Our eyes were opened to the importance of sharing Jesus with people who are at a low point in their life and in a place they don't want to be, whether it is in a hospital, nursing home, mental health facility, correctional institution or jail. Following Pastor Henselin's presentation, door prize recipients were announced as well as the results of the SOS silent auction. The rally closed with devotion by Pastor Rose. Then work began loading all of the service project donations! Thank you to everyone from our St. John's family who generously donated items/money for New Beginnings Home for Mothers! Along with our entire circuit, we were able to stuff a pick-up truck and an SUV with needed items and deliver them to the home the same day! Staff and residents were delighted with the donations and very thankfull

Rally day is a wonderful opportunity to get together with other Christian women and be filled up with God's Word, have some fun, and learn about the challenges and joys of different areas of ministry. Circuit rallies are only held twice a year, in the spring and fall. The commitment is small but the rewards are big! We hope to see you at the next rally in the spring!

CAMM Letter

Beth and I are very thankful for the encouragement and prayers we receive from all of you who support CAMM. There are others here who also need your prayers and support. They are our Malawian staff. These are the folks who are in the front line of our mission, they see our patients, provide medical care and expertise, provide health education and issue medications. In short they are the face of the Lutheran Mobile Clinic. We have a total of nine clinic staff, a Head Nurse, four nurse/midwives, a medical assistant, a Nutritionist, a Registrar and a Driver.

Here is a little introduction to our Malawian staff.

Mrs Pennina Howa – Nurse/Midwife. Mrs Howa is also a very experienced nurse. She is skilled in all of our clinic area and also has a background in psychiatric nursing. She recently taught a class at the Lutheran Church of Central Africa Youth rally on depression. Mrs Howa is quiet and generally lets other do the talking, but when she speaks she is worth listening to. Mrs Howa is Beth's new hero, yesterday she discovered a pregnant woman who was in labor and told Beth that the patient should immediately be taken to the local health center. The patient and Mrs Howa were promptly dispatched and the baby was delivered in the back of the ambulance three minutes after arriving at the Chiwamba Health Center.

Miss Madalitso Kaphalanya – Nurse/midwife. Mada has her Bachelor's degree in Nursing and is at the early stages of her Master's degree. She has been with LMC for about 4 years. Mada is a fun, competent young nurse who goes about her business with little fuss or bother. Mada will be married on October 6, we wish her all Gods blessings.

Miss Violet Chikwatu - Nurse/Midwife. Violet is our only nurse who is a member of the Lutheran Church of Central Africa. She received the Althea Sauer scholarship and earned her Bachelor's degree earlier this year. She joined us in March and is learning all of the work involved at LMC. Violet is still a little nervous about teaching, but meets all her other challenges head on and is showing herself to be a fine young nurse and team member.

Miss Jean Kanyemba - Nutritionist. Jean is the consummate professional. She manages all of our nutrition activities including coordinating with the World Food Program. When not busy with nutrition, Jean can be found anywhere another staff member needs help. Jean recently received her bachelor's degree in social work. We are praying that she stays with LMC.

Mrs Thokozani Nkwazi – Medical Assistant. Thoko is our resident diagnostician and sees nearly all of our outpatients. This young man, Teja, is part of a new group of former students who did not complete the seminary training at Christ Evangelical Lutheran Ministries (CELM), our worker training school. Now, like the others, Teja has been given a second chance. It is exciting to have him return. You see, Teja is the first "graduate" from one of our children's homes to attend the CELM program. He began the required pre-seminary program in 2013 and graduated in April 2016. He greatly desired to continue his education the following year at seminary, but his

mother and uncles were pressuring him, "Why do you want to study for this job? You will be a poor man." He was encouraged to fulfill any family obligations before attending classes. Teja reluctantly agreed. He acquired a job at a dental clinic, yet frequently asked, "When can I return to school?" The reply was always, "Wait and trust."

During that time, Teja financially helped his widowed mother to "marry off" his younger sister and then assisted

in costs for his sister's first two babies. This is all part of the bride's family responsibilities in India. As the only son with no father, much of this responsibility fell on his shoulders. Teja is 22 years old.

Now, family obligations have been fulfilled and Teja was excited to be back at CELM Seminary for the refresher course this past spring. He said last April, "I'm not concerned about money. I just want to share the joy."

But the roadblocks continue. Just before the school year began in July, Teja emailed, "I don't know if I should come to classes. My uncles say I have no life experiences. Many will not respect me. I am young." The story of Paul encouraging Timothy also encouraged Teja. Once again, he was encouraged to trust in the Lord.

Thanks to many prayers and the Lord's guiding hand, Teja has returned for this school year AND has been blessed to keep his job at the dental clinic when not at classes. Our classes run two weeks of each month. A small subsidy is given students to assist while they study at the school. But now, with this chance to continue working during the two weeks off, it is a great blessing for him. The caregiver that brought him to the children's home is also giving him experiences at the local place of worship. What a privilege to watch this young man mature physically and spiritually. Please continue to remember him in your prayers. We pray that he will be a blessing for many.

I'm really glad to be here

"I got baptized on Friday... and I'm really glad to be here."

Those were the words Ed spoke after his confirmation in August. I wasn't sure I would ever hear them.

I met Ed, his wife Lis, and their daughter Michelle on Christmas Eve. They had received our Christmas postcard invitation that we sent to every home in our community, and they came to worship with us.

Over the following weeks, Lis and Michelle came back on Sunday mornings – but Ed wasn't with them. After a couple of months, Lis and Michelle started our FaithBuilders (Bible Basics) class. Lis had grown up in the Lutheran faith in Germany and Michelle had been confirmed in another Lutheran church body after they moved to the U.S. But Ed had never joined.

I began meeting with Lis and Michelle. The first week we met, Ed hung around the table where we were sitting. The second week, I brought an extra copy of the class and invited him to follow along.

He did.

After a few more weeks, he slowly started to chime in with answers and some questions. The one that was the most difficult for him had to do with worship, "I know lots of people who go to church on Sunday. They don't act any different than anyone else the rest of the week. Why should I give up my day off?" He asked that several times. We continued to study how God works through his Word to create and strengthen faith. And as we studied God's Word, he did just that for Ed.

When we got to the lesson on baptism, I asked Ed if he had been baptized. He said that he didn't think so because his parents didn't go to church when he was a kid. And while he had attended a church with Lis and Michelle when they moved to the States, he had never actually been part of a church. I asked if he wanted to be baptized, and he said he needed some time to study it a little more.

In the following weeks, we completed the class and Ed expressed interest in being confirmed, but again, he wanted to think it over. Lis and Michelle chose to temporarily wait so that they could encourage Ed and, hopefully, be confirmed and join our church with him.

Six weeks later, Ed walked through the doors on Sunday morning.

"I want to be baptized," he said. He requested a private baptism, so we set a date for the following Friday afternoon. Friday came and God worked through the water connected to his Word in the sacrament of Holy Baptism for Ed.

Two days later, Ed, Lis, Michelle and several others were confirmed and became members of Foundation Lutheran Church. And Ed said with a smile, "I was baptized on Friday... and I'm really glad to be here." Since then, Ed has been in worship with his family every Sunday (except when his job takes him across the globe). He often has a thoughtful comment or question after worship. And he doesn't even miss his day off.

Instead, he's "really glad to be here."
