### Jasper Community Foundation Funds Quilt Preservation Program



Executive Director Ken Barthelman and Board President Mary Ann Nevins are shown accepting a Jasper Community Foundation grant from President Dan Skokan. The grant will allow the museum to buy special boxes and tissue for proper temporary storage of a portion of the quilts each year. The life of the quilts will be extended by providing a "rest" period away from lights, dust and other environmental factors that can reduce the quilt's life expectancy.

#### JCHM Awarded Annual Geisler-Penquite Endowment

The museum was again awarded a grant from the Geisler-Penquite Foundation to add to the Jasper County Museum Foundation endowment fund. Each year's grant is placed in a permanently restricted account and income from the endowment is available for current museum needs, such as the new computers and programming the museum purchased this year to begin moving our artifacts records to digital storage.

Museum Foundation President (and Historical Society Board Member) Herb Scott and Ken met with the Geisler-Penquite Foundation Board Members, and seventeen other area organizations that the foundation assists, at Teen Challenge in Colfax. We not only had a chance to express our appreciation and learn how other organizations utilize the funds, but also had a quick tour of the Teen Challenge facility (formerly the historic Colfax Hotel).



#### **NEW Faux Windows at the Museum**



If you've ever taken a look at the museum as you drive by I suspect you've noted all the windows. What you might not have noticed is all of the windows, except those on the 2nd floor offices and library are fake.

When the museum was planned, they wisely elected to try to keep energy and window costs as low as possible by limiting the number of windows. At the same time they wanted the museum to look as it does today.

The solution was to paint the wall surface black, add wood strips and finish with Plexiglas. Over the years

the Plexiglas and wood have deteriorated allowing moisture and a slew of insects to get behind the Plexiglas. No impact on energy consumption, but

not very attractive.

Thanks to a bequest from the Swanger family we have been able to take care of some deferred maintenance issues, and this is one of them. Today's replacement windows are actually now less expensive than redoing the Plexiglas windows, so now we have attractive, fully sealed, replacement windows in place. Byebye bugs.
