#### GOING TO THE CARWASH!

Is. 43:18-19, 21-22, 24-25; Ps. 41:2-5, 13-14; 2Cor. 1:18-22; Mark 2:1-12

It is true that when your car is dirty you can take it to reliable carwash center to have it cleaned! After it has been washed, you pray that it doesn't rain or snow; and while driving you will be extra careful and try not to muddy the car again, at least in the next few days or weeks. If it inadvertently gets dirty again, you would not be ashamed to return to the carwash center. This is how it is with Confession! When your soul is stained by sin, you need to immediately go to the *Carwash of the soul* – the Confessional.

When you and I profess the Apostle Creed, we say: I believe in...the forgiveness of sins. We believe in the cleansing away of Original sin by the waters of baptism. We believe in the forgiveness of sins (committed after baptism) - they can only be taken away by the sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). There are people, Catholics and non-Catholics, who question the authority of the Church when it comes to the forgiveness of sins. They claim that they can confess their sins directly to God. They do not need any intermediary. God is the only One Who can forgive sins. These people undoubtedly think like the Scribes, who, in today's gospel challenged Jesus: "Why does this man speak that way? He is blaspheming. Who but God alone can forgive sins?" Of course, it is only God Who can forgive sins, but what we must realize is that He does that through His prophets and priests. Whenever you and I go to confession, we are encountering God Who is ready to forgive us our sins.

In 2 Samuel 12:1-13, after David had sinned and Nathan had rebuked him, he humbly confessed his sin and said to Nathan: "I have sinned against the Lord," Nathan said to David: "The Lord God has forgiven your sin; you shall not die." You and I know that Nathan was not the one who forgave David's sin, but he was transmitting God's forgiveness to David and assuring him of it. God the Father sent our Lord Jesus Christ for the sole purpose of forgiving us our sins, healing us, and taking away our iniquities; thus, you and I must "know that the Son of Man has authority to forgive sins on earth." The priest, who sits in the confessional, is sitting there in *persona Christi* – in the person of Christ. More than Nathan, the priest acts in the name of Jesus – he has authority to convey God's forgiveness on a repentant sinner.

As we saw the last two Sundays, for the Old Testament people there was always a correlation between illness and sin. For them, if one suffered from leprosy he/she was to be ostracized from the community – a paralytic was forbidden to approach the holy bread in the Temple – the lame were presumed to have done something wrong that necessitated God's punishment, and thus, he/she must not approach the Temple to receive the holy bread. In the Christian context, when we sin, we inevitably alienate ourselves from the community of faithful – we become estranged from God's love. Like the paralytic, in order for you or I to be restored into the Christian community, we need to go to Jesus, in the Confessional, to confess our sins, and thus receive absolution.

Therefore, as we prepare to enter into the Season of Lent this Ash Wednesday, let us make a trip to the *Carwash* to cleanse our souls, and thus, listen to Jesus say to you and me: "Child, your sins are forgiven," and hence you are cleansed, thus, I say to you, "Remember not the events of the past, the things long ago consider not; see, I am doing something new!" Indeed, the Lord is doing something new – He forgives your sins of the past, and you must turn away from them and live a new life in Jesus.




# **OPENING OF THE 2013 MASS BOOK**

Both tithing and stewardship are part of a spiritual way of life that calls us to use all of our resources for the service of the Gospel. Everything we are and everything we have comes from God. Offering back to God something of what he has given us is part of how we worship and give thanks to God.

Tithing is the practice of giving back ten percent of what we earn. It comes from the Old English word for ten. The first scriptural example of tithing came from Abraham giving a tenth of his possessions to the priest Melchizedek. He did so as an act of thanksgiving to God. Stewardship calls us to use well all that we have and all that we are, placing all things in service of others. Stewardship helps us see the good we can accomplish by making God and our spiritual life the most important values in our life. Whatever wealth we accumulate in this life stays here. We can't take it with us! Both tithing and stewardship help us remember that nothing is mine or even ours; all belongs to God.

Metanoia is a Greek word for Lent, which connotes a change of mind and heart, altering one's mind-set toward whole new ways of thinking and acting. Lent is a period where we take a long look at where we are and try to see where we ought to be. It involves testing our values and discerning how they stack up against the values that our Lord Jesus offers His followers. Subsequently, Lent is a time when we acknowledge our guilt for the sins that led to Christ's passion and death.

through almsgiving, prayer and fasting.

This Wednesday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, is Ash Wednesday and marks the beginning of Lent. As the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday calls us to the conversion journey that marks the season. The readings assigned to Ash Wednesday highlight this call to conversion. The first reading from the prophet Joel is a clarion call to return to the Lord "with fasting, and weeping and mourning." On Ash Wednesday the Church invites us to receive ashes on our foreheads as a sign that during the season of Lent we will make

sincere efforts to cleanse our lives of sin, and discipline ourselves

As with all material things which are used as religious symbols, the symbolism of ashes is complex and difficult to understand. In themselves, ashes have little meaning, but they have their own biblical and historical context in the liturgical practices of today. Ashes are an ancient symbol of repentance (sackcloth and ashes). Consequently, when received in the light of God's revealing word, ashes can become a biblical symbol for us, and our desire to turn back to God. When we receive ashes on our foreheads, we remember who we are. We remember that we are creatures of the earth ("Remember that you are dust"). We remember that we are mortal beings ("and to dust you will return"). The reception of the ashes on our foreheads reminds us of the fact that we are God's chosen children on a journey of conversion, hence "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." The ashes remind us that we are members of the body of Christ, and the blotch on our foreheads will proclaim that identity to others, too.

#### ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICES

Ashes will be distributed at each Mass on Ash Wednesday. The times of the Masses are 7 a.m., 9 a.m., 12 Noon and 7:30 p.m. With the exception of those who are ill, ashes will only be distributed during Ash Wednesday Masses.

**ASH WEDNESDAY** and **GOOD FRIDAY** are days of **fast and abstinence**. **FRIDAYS** during Lent are days of **abstinence**.

**FASTING** requires that only one full meal be taken per day. Two smaller meals that together do not equal a full meal in quantity may be taken to maintain strength. Fasting applies to those between the ages of 18 & 59; others are encouraged to participate to the extent they are able.

**ABSTINENCE** prohibits those who are 14 years of age and older from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and Fridays during Lent.

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
