

New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

WHAT IS MY FAITHFUL PATH AFTER THE CHRISTMAS SEASON?

Matthew tells us that it was only after the magi arrived and started asking questions that King Herod became greatly



troubled. But he must have seen the same star they had, for Bethlehem is only about five miles from Jerusalem. Perhaps he was much too busy with official business to concern himself with a star. Perhaps he saw it, but lacking eyes of faith, he regarded it as merely an unusually bright star. Perhaps he was so full of himself that he assumed it was actually pointing to him! It appears that the magi inadvertently connected the dots for him.

Have you ever gone to a party or a gathering with a gift, only to arrive and realize that the gift is wholly inappropriate for the recipient or the occasion? Imagine what the magi felt with their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh when they walked into the stable where Jesus was born. Perhaps their first thought was that they should have left those gifts in Herod's palace. But then 'they prostrated themselves and did him homage," two things they did not do for Herod (Matthew 2:11). Despite the humble surroundings and humble parents, they recognized the king and presented their most appropriate gifts.

Herod, leader of Judea and King of the Jews, sent the magi to Bethlehem and ordered them to bring him word once they had found the newborn king. To disobey the orders of

any king, let alone the king of the country in which you find yourself, was an unimaginable offense, something most people would



never dream of. But in fact it was in a dream that the magi were warned not to return to Herod. Matthew tells us that the magi returned home a different way. Perhaps he is saying not only that they avoided Herod, but that their encounter with Jesus had changed them. No longer were they understanding things the same way. They changed their plans, their path, and their lives.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

How has my encounter with the Lord through the Christmas season changed me? Where do I imagine my new path will lead?

PRAYER KEY IN OUR LIFE


The story of the Wise Men bringing gifts to Jesus, the newborn King, is a great one, isn't it? They had a great big star in the sky to lead the way. How well would we do following a star like that.? But the important point here is that God led them to the manger. The manger was a place that unless God specifically showed you this was where the Christ Child was born you wouldn't have believed it. You would have passed on by.



In our lives, there are no big stars in the sky leading us where we need to go. It isn't so easy sometimes discerning where God is leading us. We may seek to use our gifts wisely, but in what manner and to what end is not always clear.

This is where prayer can make a huge difference. If we seek to cultivate a prayer life

where we are mindful of the presence of God throughout our day, then the call is easier to discern. We can help the process by intentionally offering to God in the morning the entirety of the day to come: all our actions, all our time, and all our decisions. In the evening, we can examine the past hours of the day and reflect on when we responded well to Christ's call and when we fell short. Then we resolve to begin again tomorrow, inviting Christ to be with us every step of the way. God may not offer a star in the sky to lead us, but if we invite us on our journey each day, the path will be much clearer.

When I was younger, I wrote music to and recorded Thomas Merton's poem, "Epiphany Carol." If you have never read it, search it out on the internet. Merton's words are profound and paint a picture of the awesomeness of Jesus, the newborn King of Kings, lying in a simple straw bed. The shepherds and Wise Men are drawn to pay homage to the One who has been born above all others and brings with him hope for a broken world.

As Merton correctly points out, the gifts we are called to bring to this baby and lay at his feet are our prayers and penances, next to those gifts of worldly wealth. What is it that you have to bring to the stable on this feast of the Epiphany of the Lord? Unless those prayers and penances lead to a new way of living, our gifts will be void of meaning. What we lay before him speaks to the change in us that he has given to us by his birth. Our daily stewardship is resembled in those gifts. If we are to truly echo the kingdom of God in our lives and actions, what we ultimately offer to him is no less than our entire selves. This baby will give his entire self for us, and his work must continue through our hands and feet.
