

Grace & Peace: From the Pastor's Desk

Psalm 27:1 "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?"

Walt Disney was an amazing man. He was not only a wealthy movie maker, an amusement ride genius, and a production wizard, he was a man who lived out his faith. He once said..." Whatever success I have had in

bringing clean, informative entertainment to people of all ages, I attribute in great part to my Congregational upbringing and my lifelong habit of prayer. To me, today, at age sixty-one, all prayer, by the humble or highly placed, has one thing in common: supplication for strength and inspiration to carry on the best human impulses which should bind us together for a better world" (Bill Iadonisi. Another of his quotes, "Somehow I can't believe that there are any heights that can't be scaled by a man who knows the secrets of making dreams come true. This special secret, it seems to me, can be summarized in four C's. They are curiosity, confidence, courage and consistency." I believe these 4 C's are something that can build a Christian's life and faith.

Curiosity... Have you always wondered what made something work or are you content with knowing it works, not caring how or why? Are you curious about where life is taking you, or are you content with where you've landed and expect no more? Are you curious about what God has in store for the rest of your life? God isn't finished with you yet, you can ask God to reveal to you what he wants you to do in the time you have left on this earth.

Confidence... So many of us second guess ourselves, worrying that we've made a mistake or that what we've planned isn't going to accomplish the desired outcome. When our confidence is rooted in God, we can be assured that God has control of the outcome. Our confidence comes from our faith in God.

Courage... I've referenced Psalm 27:1 at the beginning of this article because it is one of my favorite Bible passages. It speaks to courage, of having no fear because God is with me. But courage is more than having no fear, courage is doing what needs to be done even when you're afraid to do it. God's presence and guidance gives confidence and courage to those who lean on God.

Finally consistency.... You most likely have heard insanity defined as doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results. Einstein has often been credited with the quote about insanity, however it originated with the writer Rita Mae Brown. Consistency isn't equated with that quote. Consistency means that when you do a task repeatedly it becomes so ingrained in you that it is a second nature. It is building a good habit that leads to a better life, such as beginning your day with Bible reading and prayer, perhaps some time of quiet contemplation or meditation.







Rooted in Faith, Growing in Grace



A high-school friend of mine coined the word, *Metheran*, because so many people in the small community of McKean, PA, switched between the Methodist and Lutheran churches there. I might be a "Metheran". Although both of my loving parents spoke to us of God and lived Christian values, neither of them attended church until their later years. As a pre-adolescent, I began walking to the neighborhood Methodist Church on Meadville Street in Edinboro, where I was baptized and confirmed. I continued membership there through high school, when they moved to their new building on High Street. In the late 1970's, I found myself as a recently divorced single mother, and I returned to that church on Meadville Street that had become the First Evangelical Lutheran Church of Edinboro. I was loved and supported by the wonderful church family there and my (our) daughter, Kristy, was baptized and confirmed in that church. In 1986, I met my wonderful husband (on a blind date!), and we were married by Pastor Dick Schultz, who was serving the Lutheran congregation in Edinboro at that time. We began our marriage as a blended family, with one young adult son (Eric), one teenage daughter (Angie), and one second grader (Kristy).

Fast forward to the year 2000. My dear mother-in-law, Margaret Durst, was diagnosed with terminal cancer. Pastor Russel Shuluga, from Rick's home church (Simpson Methodist) provided loving and devoted pastoral care to Rick's mom and our entire family. The Lutheran Church in Edinboro had dissolved and became an Episcopalian Church. In 2001, we returned to our Methodist roots and remained active in that congregation for over 20 years. When Simpson/Table of Grace church made the decision to disaffiliate from the Methodist Conference, Rick and I began exploring other worship opportunities. God led us to Immanuel.


Denominations aside, my faith journey has been a long slow process of maturing in God's love and forgiveness. I have no dramatic conversion story to share, though I always appreciate hearing about those who can name the time and place that Jesus came into their lives. I am so grateful for the many pastors, teachers, and friends, that God has placed in my life to help me learn and grow. God has always been with me in the best and worst of times. 
Volunteers will need to be at Holy Trinity at 4 pm.

Reformation Sunday, October 27, 2024

Every year on the last Sunday in October, many churches set aside this day as "Reformation Sunday." If you didn't grow up with this practice, you may wonder where this tradition comes from, and why some congregations continue to practice it.

So ... what is Reformation Sunday, and why should we care?

History

What follows is a very simplified explanation of complex theological, political, and economic events that all coincided.

In 1517, across Europe, the Roman Catholic Church was engaged in one of the greatest fundraisers in all of history.

If a person – out of contrition for their sins and as a sign of repentance – made a financial gift to help with the building of Saint Peter's Basilica in Rome, then the church would furnish that person with a certificate acknowledging that gift and promising that they or their loved ones would be freed from a portion of the misery expected in the afterlife.

In short, the church at that time taught that even those bound for heaven had to be cleansed of their earthly sins and this cleansing (purging) in the afterlife took place in a place called Purgatory. The certificates offered by the church (called "Indulgences") promised to lessen this time of cleansing for oneself or others who have already died.





There were some very nuanced explanations of this practice at the time. And there were other very crass explanations that basically amounted to people paying to be forgiven.

November 1st was an important day for the selling and buying of these indulgences, known as All Saints Day on the church's calendar.

The day before a German Monk named Martin Luther posted a list of 95 Theses – 95 reasons that he objected to this practice of selling indulgences. Along with other writings by Martin Luther, those 95 Reasons went viral among the people of that time.

Luther insisted that we are not forgiven because of anything we do – including the buying of Indulgences or doing enough good work. *Instead, we are forgiven because of who God is.* We are loved and forgiven because God is full of grace and mercy. Salvation is not for sale, it is a free gift from God.

It's not an "If... Then..." As in, "If we do this, think this believe this, then God loves and forgives us." Rather it is a "Because... Therefore..." As in, "Because God is love and offers grace to all through Christ, we are loved and forgiven and given the gift of new and abundant life."

His teachings and writings got Martin Luther kicked out of the church. But he didn't go alone. Others agreed with him, and after his death those who agreed with Luther became known as Lutherans and also as Protestants.

Every Protestant church traces their roots back to this moment in history.

Why Reformation Sunday Matters

This is a chance to reclaim and retell the story of how God is always making us new and to focus in on the free gift of God's grace for you, me, the church, and the whole world. We give thanks to God for this gift of grace and salvation.

Reformation Sunday also gives us an opportunity to celebrate how God is always making things new – constantly forming and reforming us for life in the kingdom of God here and now and forevermore. It begs us to ask the questions – what in the church needs to be reformed? What in the world needs to be made new?



Thirteen Events in the Life of Martin Luther







- 1483, November 10 Martin Luther born in Eisleben, the second son of Hans Luder; baptized at St. Peter's Church the next day November 11, on the feast day of St. Martin of Tours.
- 1507, April 3. Luther ordained priest at Erfurt Cathedral.
- 1518 (?) Luther's "tower experience" understanding Roman 1:17 how we are counted as righteous by the work of Christ, to arrive at the justification by faith in tower of Black Cloister in Wittenberg, exact date unknown.
- **1520, June 1**. Leo X issues papal bull *Exsurge Domine*, giving Luther sixty days to recant or be excommunicated.
- 1521, April 18. At his second hearing, Luther distinguishes between his books, allowing him to make a statement. On key points, however, he stands firm. He says, "My conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and will not recant anything, for to go against conscience is neither right nor safe. Here I stand, I can do no other, God help me. Amen."
- 1521, May 4. Luther "kidnapped" in the forest near Mohra.
- 1525, June 13. Luther marries Katharina von Bora a former nun in Wittenberg, who he had helped escape from a badly run convent.
- 1526, August. Diet of Speyer in the Edict of Speyer reaffirms the Edict of Worms only for Catholic territories and allows German Lutheran princes the right to establish religion in their territory, stopping the Edict of Worms for the Lutheran princes (for now).
- 1529, March-April. Second Diet of Speyer, condemned the results of the Diet of Speyer of 1526 and prohibited future reformation aiming to reverse the policy of religious tolerance adopted in 1526, the Lutheran members of the Diet protested, resulting in the issue of the Pretestio, giving rise to the label "Protestant," which the Romanists applied to all who agree with Luther.
- 1529, October 2-4. Luther, Melanchthon, and Zwingli meet for Marburg Colloquy; Reformed and Lutherans are brought together to create a united Protestant front, unable to agree on Lord's Supper.
- 1530, June 25. Augsburg Confession first read and presented to Charles V at Diet of Augsburg.
- 1538 Luther's Smalcald Articles published.
- 1546, February 18. Luther dies at the age of 62, in Eisleben.

Sometimes in Our Own Back Yard...

Many times we look high and low for persons, places and things that will teach us about the environment and how to care for our wonderful, God-given earth. And sometimes there is something right in our own back yard which is a precious gem that might get overlooked. This month we want to highlight the Tom Ridge Environmental Center (TREC) at Park in Erie, PA. This state-of-the-art, green-designed facility encourages visitors to experience the unique history and ever-changing, diverse ecosystems of Presque Isle State Park. It is the first building in the Pennsylvania Bureau of State Parks to earn a LEED silver certification rating.

TREC is an educational center dedicated to teaching visitors about the unique 3,200 acres of Presque Isle and the many different forms of life that inhabit the peninsula. TREC also serves as a center for research -- contributing to conservation efforts and promoting environmental awareness, helping to preserve the unparalleled beauty of Presque Isle and Lake Erie, the site of Pennsylvania's only seashore.

The Green Team's purpose is to "raise awareness of and advocate for the care of creation." Our mission is to support and encourage creation care ministries, raise awareness, model creation care advocacy consistent with ELCA teachings in our faith communities and public life.

Pumpkin Bacon Soup

- 3 pound sugar pie pumpkin
- 6 slices bacon diced
- 1/2 cup onion chopped
- 2 carrots peeled and chopped
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme
- salt and pepper to taste
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 3/4 cup heavy cream
- 1/4 cup pumpkin seeds
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley cooking spray



INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Cut the stem end off the pumpkin.
- Cut the pumpkin in half lengthwise and scoop out all the seeds. Place the pumpkin halves, cut side down, on a sheet pan coated with cooking spray.
- Roast the pumpkin for 35-40 minutes or until very soft.
- While the pumpkin is in the oven, cook the bacon in a large pot over medium heat. The bacon should be crispy and browned, which will take 5-6 minutes.
- Remove the bacon from the pot and reserve for later use. Drain most of the grease from the pot, leaving 1 tablespoon in the pot.
- Add the onion and carrots and cook for 5-7 minutes or until onions have softened. Add the garlic and thyme. Add salt and pepper to taste. Cook for 30 seconds.
- Remove the pumpkin from the oven. Scoop out the flesh and add it to the pot.
- Pour the chicken broth into the pot. Bring to a simmer.
- Let the soup simmer for 10-15 minutes or until vegetables are very tender. Stir in the heavy cream.
- Use an immersion blender or a traditional blender to puree the soup until smooth. Taste and add more salt and pepper if needed.

Top the soup with reserved bacon, pumpkin seeds and parsley, then serve.

Why Reflecting on Fall Bible Verses Is Important?

It's a time to reflect and be thankful, as nature itself shows us the importance of change, patience, and the rewards of hard work. Why should we think about these themes during fall? It's a season that reminds us to be grateful for everything we have, big or small.

There's no better way to get in touch with these feelings than through the Bible. The Bible captures fall's spirit, giving Bible verses about autumn that touch our hearts. Reading these verses, you celebrate not just a season but life's deep teachings.

The Second Harvest Food Bank is hosting the Third Annual Empty Bowls event on October 13, 2024.

This fundraiser consists of a modest meal of soup and bread as a reminder that too many of our community members and neighbors are facing hunger with "empty bowls." Guests will enjoy a variety of soups, breads and desserts that have been so generously donated by local restaurants. With 100's of handmade bowls to choose from, all guests attending will select a bowl as a memento of their contribution toward alleviating hunger in northwest Pennsylvania.

Supporting the Second Harvest Food Bank Empty Bowls event helps to provide nutritious meals for the more than 95,000 individuals facing hunger in our community, including 1 in 5 children. Just a \$20.00 donation to Second Harvest provides enough meals to feed one person for two weeks.

Tickets for the Empty Bowls event are \$25 per person prior to the event and will be \$30.00 at the door.

There are two meal times. The first session is 11 am —2 pm. The second session is being held from 4:30 pm—7:30 pm.

With the price of admission, guests will enjoy a selection of delicious sops from various local restaurants. The event will also feature live entertainment.

Each person attending will select a hand-made bowl to take home as a reminder that many of our neighbors need our help to fill their "empty bowls."

Who doesn't love a good bowl of soup and some yummy bread! This is for a worthwhile cause in helping stamp out hunger in our community.

The Leaves They Are a-Changin'

With the autumnal equinox in late September, foliage season has officially begun across much of the United States.

Why do leaves change colors?

Did you know that fall's vivid colors are actually hidden underneath summer's green? The main reason for the color change is not autumn's chilly weather, but light—or rather, the lack of it. The green color of leaves disappears when photosynthesis (from sunlight) slows down and the chlorophyll breaks down. Trees with a lot of direct sunlight will produce red leaves, while other trees may turn yellow, orange, or brown.

When is the best time to see autumn color?

Unfortunately, autumn color is not very predictable, especially in the long term. Half the fun is trying to outguess nature! But it generally starts in late September in New England and moves southward, reaching the Smoky Mountains by early November. It also appears about this time in the high-elevation mountains of the West.

Remember that cooler high elevations will color up before the valleys.



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY



October 4, 1927— October 31, 1941 400 workers sculpted a colossal 69 foot high carving of US Presidents: George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Theodore Roosevelt and Abraham Lincoln to represent the first 150 years of American history. This mountain side is know as Mount Rushmore. This project was dreamed up by Doane Robinson to attract tourist to South Dakota. It worked too! Mount Rushmore is visited by more than 3 million people annually.

The presidents were chosen for their significant contribution to the founding, expansion, preservation and unification of the country. George Washington (1789-1797) was chosen because he was our nation's founding father. Thomas Jefferson (1743-1826) was chosen to represent expansion, because he was the president who signed the Louisiana Purchase and authored the Declaration of Independence. Theodore Roosevelt (1858-1919) was chosen because he represented conservation and the industrial blossoming of the nation. Abraham Lincoln (1809-1865) was chosen because he led the country through the Civil War and believed in preserving the nation at any cost. Each president's face is 60 feet high. The faces appear in the order: Washington, Jefferson, Roosevelt, Lincoln. Jefferson was originally intended to be on Washington's right. After nearly two years of work on Jefferson, the rock was found to be unsuitable and the partially completed face was "erased" from the mountainside using dynamite. Washington's face was completed in 1934. Jefferson's in 1936. Lincoln was finished in 1937.

The actual carving was done by a team of over 400 men. Remarkably, no one died during construction. The men who worked on the mountain were miners who had come to the Black Hills looking for gold. Although they weren't artists, they did know how to use dynamite and jackhammers. 90% of the mountain was carved with dynamite, and more than 450,000 tons of rock was removed. Afterwards, fine carving was done to create a surface about as smooth as a concrete sidewalk. The drillers and finishers were lowered down the 500-foot face of the mountain in bosun chairs held by 3/8-inch-thick steel cables. Workers at the top of the mountain would hand crank a winch to raise and lower the drillers. If they went too fast, the person in the bosun chair would be dragged up the mountain on their face.

Every night, Mount Rushmore gets illuminated for two hours. Since illumination can impact the natural environment (think lost moths, among other things), a new high-tech LED lighting system was installed in 2015 to minimize the negative effects of lighting Mount Rushmore.

Some believe you can see an elephant, or at least the stone face of an elephant, if you look to the right of Lincoln. Others believe if you look at a picture of the mountain rotated 90 degrees, you can see another face. Mount Rushmore is granite, which erodes roughly 1 inch every 10,000 years. Since each of the noses is about 240 inches long, they might last up to 2.4 million years before they completely wear away. After about 500,000 years, the faces will likely have lost some of their definition. But at this rate the basic shape of the presidents' heads might last up to 7 million years.
