Today's speaker told us a graphic, disturbing, and uplifting story. Bamshak Dagwer, along with his wife Makayla, run "Seeds of Hope", an organization

dedicated to helping the children of Nigeria who are victims of the ongoing conflict with Muslim extremists. Over 100,000 lives have been lost and millions displaced.

At the age of 18 in 2001, Bamshak's village was attacked and many of the people he knew were killed or disappeared. A large number perished in the burning of his father's Christian church where they had gone for sanctuary. Bamshak ran for many miles and was extremely fortunate to escape, eventually making his way to America and Green Bay.

Bamshak has made return trips to his country and wants to give Nigerian children the opportunity to grow up in a safe environment. His organization is now working on constructing a complex of buildings that will include an orphanage, school, trauma counseling facility, and feature a feeding program. He showed us how even a very small donation can buy a month's worth of meals for a child.

Marypat is a member of the Seeds of Hope's board of directors. Thank you for bringing Bamshak to today's meeting and helping us learn about an organization that is doing some of the most difficult and important work going on anywhere in our world.
