#### 4. AFTER ACTION REPORT: BY RON VAUGHAN

Shaver Lake Barbeque at the Clague's Cabin. We had 15 persons present to munch on hors d'oeuvres, and wine, followed by dinner of delicious barbequed tri-tip and chicken, plus side dishes, and desserts.

Prior to the meal, Dr. Clague presented a 30 minute talk on Civil War Medicine. Brian's research has uncovered a book from 1870, written by a CW Physician, Surgeon J.J. Woodward, who compiled statistics on casualty treatment during the war, and published them in "The Medical and Surgical History of the Civil War."

He shared some of the statistics, and I managed to take note of a few: There were one and a half million Union cases of Diarrhea and Dysentery during the war, of which 44,000 died. These were largely the result of poor sanitary conditions in the camps. During the first year of the inspections by the U.S. Sanitary Commission, they found 50% of the camps were unsanitary.

Brian discussed the various treatment modes that surgeons used, and most of these were ineffective and detrimental. Various poisonous metals were often used, that were deadly. Some doctors began to study autopsies, and found that bacteria were responsible for most of the sickness and deaths.

After the talk, we had a raffle for a door prize. It had been won by the Vaughan's at the CW Mini Con at Temecula, CA in June. The prize bag contained a book by Sarah Kay Bierly, on "The Battle of New Market". Also a DVD of the battle that is shown at the museum, "The Field of Lost Shoes." All of the 15 names present were on a list, and a 20 sided die was rolled. The first three rolls were 16, 17, and 20! Finally, number 12 came up, which was Kay Scott.
