Healthy Bird Feeding, Watering & Hanging Out at Your Home

Now that the fall/winter season has arrived, it is a good time to remind ourselves that we need to put some extra effort in keeping our feathered friends that visit with us, healthy and whole.

Bird baths and feed stations concentrate numerous birds in a small area, and birds being birds, they have no way to prevent themselves from going to the bathroom wherever they tend to spend time. This means that birds that utilize our feeders and bird baths, tend to come into frequent contact with feces and other items that can be sources of disease.

Other unpleasant and harmful things such as molds, fungus, etc., can also arise from the buildup of old, wet, uncollected food items and seed husks at feeders or feed areas. We need to do our best in maintaining clean feeding and watering areas. Here are some suggestions on how to keep the little guys that are nice enough to visit us, healthy!

Water

Bird baths should be cleaned out and receive fresh water, daily or more often, if necessary. Bird baths should be scrubbed, cleaned and disinfected on a regular basis.

Solid Food

If possible, try to replace seed in your feeder only when it is practically empty; this makes it much easier to do a "quick clean-up" without having to possibly either throw out much "good seed" or feeding out much "bad seed".

Seed gravity feeders, platform feeders and similar devices should be regularly cleaned out, and soap/water cleaned and bleach disinfected, irregularly. Start out by removing all old seed husks and any food that appears unfit to be eaten. Then, as necessary, clean with soap & water and then disinfect (be sure to let your feed device dry thoroughly before placing food in it. Also don't forget to regularly clean those areas near and around your feeders where hulls, seeds, bread, fruit, etc. fall and build-up (such as the ground underneath your feeder).

Liquid Food

For those of you who maintain hummingbird feeders year-round, be sure to clean & disinfect them on a regular basis (an every three to four day interval should be safe, as our ambient temperatures get cooler and cooler). Also be sure to rinse the feeders very well before reuse.

Miscellaneous

Also be sure to periodically clean those areas where "your" birds really like to hang-out, roost and perch such as that favorite rock wall, branch or bush of theirs, because these areas will also be of concern due to fecal build-up.

Have a great time feeding, caring for and watching your feathered friends in the coming months!

Donate Live Holiday Trees to the El Paso Zoo





AT FEATHER LAKE

Feather Lake's water level continues its roller-coaster ride. It dropped throughout October, and the lake went dry in early November. Then came the storm in mid-November. The water level jumped to 2.6 feet, the highest level recorded in 2004. Some water should persist well into December.



Feather Lake will be open to the public through at least the end of the year. Hours are 8 a.m. to noon on Saturdays and 2 p.m. to dusk on Sundays. Visit in early December and you might get to enjoy a combination of water, plentiful waterfowl, and cottonwoods still holding their fall color.

As always, we rely on volunteers to staff our sanctuary during visitor hours. Can you help on one or more days in December or January? If yes, please contact John Sproul (747-8663, jsproul@utep.edu).

We were deeply saddened to learn of the death of Charles Simpson on Nov. 10. In 1998, Charles received our organization's Meritorious Service Award in recognition of his many contributions to Feather Lake and our education programs. As the driving force behind the Feather Lake visitor center, his memory will live on at our sanctuary.

Our first 2005 workday at Feather Lake will be **Sat.**, **January 22**. Once again, we'll start at **2 p.m.**, work a few hours, then see what birds arrive at the end of the day (if we still have water). Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. Admission is free.

Wetlands Park, 4 miles from Feather Lake.



Wyler framway Hawkwatch

Here is some information regarding the 2004 Hawkwatch activities at the Wyler Tramway, and some updated Hawkwatch project summary information.

Fall 2004

Observers made 44 visits to the site for a total of 110 hours of observation time at the topside platform. El Paso-Trans-Pecos Audubon Society chapter members accounted for 20 observation hours, with some of these observation periods being conducted by more than one person. Texas Master Naturalists, Charles & Marian Mayer accounted for 11 hrs of observation time. NMSU students accounted for 9.5 observation hours, with some of these observation periods being conducted by more than one person.

262 raptors were observed from 8/13/04 through 11/4/04.

Project Summary information

The bird checklist for the site, increased to 110 species observed. Since the Spring of 2001, over 400 hours of platform observation time spread out over 174 site visits, have yielded just over 1500 raptor sightings of 17 species.

Keystone Heritage Park

This is a great time of year to visit Keystone, because there is water in the wetlands, the temperatures are cooler, the waterfowl and raptors have "arrived" and the color change of the vegetation, now in various shades of yellow & orange, is always pleasing to the eyes.

The wintry weather that has arrived in the past few weeks has really "slowed down" the activity of the reptiles and invertebrates at the site. Lately, "trap checks" on my day to check the pitfall arrays have yielded very little other than the occasional sideblotched lizard and a few beetles and wolf spiders.

The site's bird checklist has once again inched-up a bit & now stands at 185 species; recently sighted was a very rare to this area Western Gull, in amongst 100's of ring-billed gulls. Other recent sightings include Thayer's & Franklin's Gulls, a male and a female Peregrine Falcon [at the same time], Swamp Sparrows, Soras, Black-tailed Gnatcatchers & Common Yellowthroat warblers.

If you visit Keystone, please keep your eyes open for unusual birds or those birds that haven't yet been reported, & then let me know what you saw.

The Frontera Land Alliance NEWS!

After a little help from its regional and community friends, the newly formed Frontera Land Alliance is now ready to file for tax-exempt status as a non-profit group with the U.S. Internal Revenue Service. At the November 8 El Paso/Trans-Pecos Audubon board meeting, Ed Storey of the FLA steering committee told of progress made since the spring 2004 beginnings, and of the group's efforts to raise a \$500 IRS filing fee. After discussion, the Audubon board agreed to give a \$300 matching grant to FLA. Later that week El Paso Native Plant Society donated \$200, and an anonymous donor added \$100 to clinch the deal.

Ed Storey wants all Audubon members to know that, "The land alliance is very grateful for the assistance. It is the early support of organizations like the Audubon people that will make it possible for the land trust to be formed and serve the greater El Paso region." Ed also invites Audubon members to get involved in TFLA to help with the many needs of a new land preservation alliance.

Everyone is welcome to attend The Frontera Land Alliance meetings at Chamizal Memorial Conference Center on the 3rd Thursday of each month at 6:30 pm. The next meeting is January 20, 2005.

OBSERVATIONS

Due to editorial license the observation column will be carried in the Feb—Mar ROADRUNNER. However a few great sightings are listed.

The RAREST sighting was made by Madaline and Al Gavit at Lake El Paso In Horizon City on the 14th of October.

It was a *Fork-tailed Flycatcher*, only the 16th record for the State of Texas.



Another great bird was a Painted Redstart by Barry Zimmer in his yard.

This was one of only 15 or 20 sightings in our checklist area.

Also John Kiseda had a Golden Eagle at the Tramway Hawk Watch on October 10.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

The El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon Chapter calls upon volunteers in the El Paso area to join with birders across the western hemisphere and participate in one of Audubon's winter time traditions, the annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC). This years count will be the 104th.

Today, over 55,000 volunteers from all 50 states, every Canadian province, parts of Central and South America, Bermuda, the West Indies, and Pacific Islands count and record every individual bird and bird species seen in a specified area. During the 104th CBC last year, about 63 million individual birds were counted. Last year saw a new record high of 1,996 individual counts. Each individual count group completes a census of the birds found during one 24 hour period in a designated circle 15 miles in diameterabout 177 square miles.

People are asked to contribute \$5.00 to help defray the expense of publishing "American Birds", This is the volume detailing all 1900 plus counts. The El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon Chapter will cover \$3.00 of this for the Hueco Tanks and El Paso counts.

HUECO TANKS CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The first count in this area will be conducted in and around Hueco Tanks State Historical Park.

Lets see if we can get over 65 species this year, a number that has been achieved only a couple of times since 1970. To accomplished this I will need at least 10-12 counters, *Please call and volunteer*. With the montane invasion this year it could be accomplished, during the Nov. monthly BIT for a period of 3 hours and only in the park we had 37 species, unusal were Stellar's Jay, Townsend's Solitair, and Mountain Chickadee.

CBC's will also be conducted in Bosque Del Apache NWR, Carlsbad, Gila, Guadalupe Mts., Loving, Portal, Roswell, and Silver City. The dates for these will be between December 14, 2002 and January 5, 2003, for information on whom to contact, call Bob the Hueco Tanks compiler.

BOSQUE DEL APACHE NWR

One of the more popular National Wildlife Refuges in the country (there are over 500) is located about 180 miles north of El Paso off of Interstate 25. How about 20,000 *Snow Geese* with a number of *Ross's* included, see if you can tell them apart, 12,000 *Sandhill Cranes*, 25,000 *ducks* and *Bald Eagles*.

Start off your 2005 bird list with some great entries. Last year over 70 species were recorded on our trip, these included 15 waterfowl species, 8 Raptor and 3 Merganser, also a number of passerines and other wildlife. We will probably have a tour on Sat at 1 PM, in a large refuge van, so try to call Bob if you think you might attend, we need an approximate count.

KEYSTONE - SUNLAND

A look at hundreds of gulls, mostly *Ring-billed* but quite often a *Herring Gull* or *California Gull* has been around, and remember last January when a State of New Mexico first, the *Lesser Black-backed Gull* was in the area for almost 2 weeks. You probably will see *Snow Geese*, maybe *Buffleheads*, and some wading birds, perhaps *Great Egrets* or *Longbilled Dowitchers*.
