



The Word of God Alive: Discussing the Readings with your children

More than a thousand years before Jesus was born, there were people who had to make a choice of who to follow. Joshua, the leader of God's people, helped them understand that they could not serve the God of Israel and the gods of their neighbors. He showed them a way to respond. He announced to all the people "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."

For Simon Peter and the other apostles, what God was asking also seemed unusual, risky and scary. Like Joshua, Simon Pete chose God and served as an example to the community. When Jesus asked the apostles if they would leave like the others. Simon Peter announced the truth he knew so deeply. He said, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

It is not always easy for us to choose God's way either. Some things God asks of us can feel challenging: loving our enemies, sharing when we don't want to, forgiving seventy-seven times. Yet we know that Jesus' word are words of eternal life. In living as Jesus asks us, in choosing God, we are choosing what is right.

When Jesus asked the apostles whether they would stay or leave, he was giving them another chance to choose. In our life of faith, we don't just make the choice to follow Jesus once. We make it over and over. Every time our neighbor is in need of care, we make a choice. Every time we



recall the words of Jesus about how we should live, we make a choice. Every time we gather around the table of the Lord, where we have the best food, Jesus himself, we make a choice.

A reminder that the Diocese of Harrisburg requires a two year sacramental preparation for First Reconciliation, First Holy Communion and Confirmation. Class time for grades kindergarten through 8th grade is from 9:30 AM to 10:45 AM on most Sunday mornings during the school year.

The preschool class meets on Sundays from 9:30 AM to 10:30 AM in the church basement (across from Mary's Kitchen). The children are taught Catholic prayers, traditions, and Bible stories—along with crafts and activities. (In a fun and nurturing setting!)


The next choir practice will be **Wednesday, September 4th** from 7:15pm-8:30pm.


Book of the Month July and August 2024



The Book of the Month for both July and August will be They Might Be Saints: On the Path To Sainthood in America written by Michael O'Neil and published by EWTN. This might be our biggest book we have ever had at just under 300 pages, however, it also might be my favorite book so far in this series! This book is written based off of research for a TV series on EWTN that tried to study and compile the stories of dozens of potential Catholic Saints

that lived in America (both before it was the U.S.A. and since then in our very modern world as well!). The chapters are only about 7-10 pages each, and it covers the stories of at least 24 different holy individuals who are currently in the process of potentially becoming a future Saint in the Catholic Church. Also, this book begins with an incredibly detailed explanation of how the official process currently works (and some past history of the process of becoming a Saint as well), which I guarantee will surprise you in beautiful ways! Eucharistic Revival in the Catholic Church:

Weekly Bulletin Articles

The Catholic Church in the United States has been on a 3-year process of Eucharistic Revival, and we are now in the 2nd year and focusing on revival at the parish level (see this website for more, https://www.eucharisticrevival.org). In addition to trying our best to celebrate every single Mass reverently, attentively, and prayerfully, one effort we will be making is **to write a small bulletin article every week for a year** in order to help all people understand the Catholic Mass more fully. Not only can this help us understand how each prayer and symbol and movement has deep meaning and symbolism, but all the prayers, symbols, and movements should also lead us into the reality of Christ's love on the Cross and His grace poured out from the Resurrection and how we can encounter Him present to us today throughout the entirety of the Mass! Please consider reading along each week with these bulletin articles to help you better understand the history, meaning, beauty, and reality of what we celebrate every weekend as Catholics. This can help us to have a Eucharistic Revival at our parish, and to know, love, and serve Christ more fully every time we attend the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass here at OLV.

The Reception of Holy Communion (Part 7) -

Are my sins forgiven when I receive the Eucharist?!

It is not a substitute for confession, but yes, venial sins can possibly be forgiven!

This is the final bulletin article on receiving holy communion during Mass (we've done seven parts to this one topic on the Mass!), and I hope it has been helpful for you all to meditate on this climatic moment that can transform and change us every single time we approach Jesus in the Eucharist. As we've looked at, using a variety of different reflections, we are being united to the God-man, Jesus Christ, and His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity is united to our bodies/ souls (i.e. to our entire person!). This is such a big deal, and we can only imagine how this can fill us up with Christ's very life through the power of the Holy Spirit in our souls. We become more like Jesus and we can be transformed into His image. This Com-union of persons can unleash the graces of our Baptism and communicate in ever new ways the depth of God's love for us at every single Mass. Therefore, it is a reasonable question to ask, if we are united to the Divinity of Christ, wouldn't that totally annihilate any evil or sin within us? We think for example of the immense heat of fire, and how when materials such as some metals are placed within that intense heat, the impurities within that metal can finally be separated or burned up to make the metal almost perfectly pure. Therefore, how could sin still exist in our souls if and when we receive the Eucharist? Wouldn't all my sins automatically be forgiven when I receive? Wouldn't I be automatically holy and saintly in my daily life?

One of the key aspects of our relationship with God and our spiritual lives needs to emphasized at this point: Our Freedom. We are created as free creatures, and although we are impacted and affected by many exterior people and things, as well impacted by the Spirit of God Himself, we are ultimately free in the most central part of who we are as persons. Therefore, God will always respect this freedom in us (we will never be made AUTOMATICALLY holy without assenting to God's grace doing this within us), and even when we receive Jesus Himself, that uniting of persons doesn't automatically purify us or make us virtuous automatically without our consent/our cooperation. On the other hand, once we open up our hearts, even just a little bit, and try our best to cooperate or say yes to Christ's grace in our souls, then we can experience profound healing, transformation, and purification through our reception of Jesus in holy communion. This leads us into the main purpose of this article, which is talking about the forgiveness of our sins in relation to receiving Christ in the Eucharist.

We stated last article that we couldn't receive holy communion if we have committed a mortal sin, and we should go to confession before coming back to receive communion in that case. The Sacrament of Confession is the place where Christ desires mortal sins to be forgiven (and we cannot be forgiven of mortal sins by receiving holy communion – see 1 Cor. 11:27). In other words, if we have committed any mortal sins, then we need an intentional and total recommitment to Christ in the Sacrament of Confession, before we engage in this total union of persons in the Eucharist! However, if we have not committed any mortal sins, most of us will have committed a variety of venial or smaller sins, and when we receive Jesus in holy communion, those indeed can be forgiven. If we open our souls, and ask Christ to forgive us of our venial sins when we receive communion, then there is a good chance that those sins will be wiped clean as we are united to Christ's perfect humanity and divinity (CCC 1393). May we ask God to always forgive us of our sins, and may we realize the profound effects that can occur when receive holy communion. Christ wants healing, forgiveness, and transformation to happen, and it can happen for you at each and every Mass when you receive Jesus in holy communion.
