



I would like to share the following reflection from Fr. Greg Boyle, founder of Homeboy Industries. "Be on the lookout" might just be a theme for me this coming year....

My friend Mirabai Starr, a mystic who writes about mystics, says, "Once you know the God of Love, you fire all the other gods." It is always hard for us to believe in the nonjudgmental, loving, and merciful God, and yet, that is the God we actually have. Joel, a man who did considerable time in prison, told me, "When my toes hit the floor in the morning, I'm on the lookout." "On the lookout for what?" I asked him. "For God," he said. "God is always leaving me hints. He's dropping me anonymous tips all the time." This is the God of love trying to break through. This God will not be outdone in extravagant tenderness. This position with the Friends World Committee for Consultation Section of the Americas (FWCC) is full-time (35 hours per week), exempt, with full benefits, with a salary range from \$41,000-55,000 DOE. The preferred position location is the Friends Center office building in Philadelphia's Center City but remote locations will be considered. The Advancement Coordinator will work closely with the Executive Secretary and other staff to collectively raise \$500,000 annually through a combination of individual gifts, grants, and contributions from other denominational bodies. Excellent written and spoken English is required, Spanish proficiency preferred. As I reflect upon the blessings of 2024, I am filled with gratitude for your generosity and care for the work of Friends United Meeting. Your support has been instrumental in transforming lives across the globe, allowing us to embody the theme of "Becoming A River of Blessing."

In reviewing FUM's financial blessings this year, I am humbled by your extraordinary commitment. Featured Recipe from Pendle Hill Crock Pot Apple Pear Butter

If you have an abundance of seasonal produce, turn them into this sweet and tangy spread to add to your holiday charcuterie boards, or slather over toast at breakfast. This recipe was created by former kitchen intern, Stacy Nagel, who encourages experimentation with this recipe!



Ingredients: 10 apples and pears altogether in any combination 1-2 cups apple juice (depending on the texture you want) 2 cups milk 1/8 - 1/4 cup molasses honey to taste 2 Tbsp cinnamon 1 Tbsp cloves Allspice to taste

Peel, core, and rough-cut enough apples and pears to fill your crock pot. (Or you can put them through a food mill.) If you want to speed the process, precook the fruit with the juice on the stove until the fruit is soft.

Put all of the ingredients in the crock pot. Stir and let the mixture cook down, uncovered, until it reaches the consistency and color you prefer. Taste and adjust the flavor by adding more spices, molasses, and/or honey to achieve the desired flavor. Leave your apple butter chunky or process it to a smooth consistency in a blender. Let cool and enjoy!
