Epiphany Chalk

One of the ancient traditions of Epiphany is the blessing of Chalk at the Epiphany Mass which is then distributed to the Parish. The blessed chalk is used to mark the doorposts of your homes with the initials: 20+C+M+B+21

The "C+M+B" stand for the traditional names of the Three Wisemen: Caspar, Melchior, and Baltassar. "C+M+B" are also the initials for the Latin phrase *Christus mansionem benedicat*: "May Christ bless this house." The "+" signs represent the cross, and the "20" at the beginning and the "21" at the end mark the year.

It is an ancient tradition that calls upon God's protection and blessing over the household for the coming year. This tradition harkens back to the book of Exodus and the first Passover when the Israelites marked their doorposts with the blood of a lamb and all in the house were kept safe from the plague when the Lord struck all the first born of Egypt (see Exodus 12:1-13).

The prayer said over the chalk specifically asks God that those who will use it with faith in your most holy name, and with it inscribe on the doors of their homes the names of your saints, Casper, Melchior, and Baltassar, may through their merits and intercession enjoy health in body and protection of soul; through Christ our Lord.

We certainly can use all the health in body and protection of soul that we can get this year. I encourage you to take some chalk home with you and write this sign on your doorpost, praying,

Bless, + O Lord God almighty, this home, that in it there may be health, purity, the strength of victory, humility, goodness and mercy, the fulfillment of Thy law, the thanksgiving to God the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit. And may this blessing remain upon this home and upon all who dwell herein. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The traditional practice is for the head of the home to say this prayer and to mark this sign over the main door of the home.
