Having a Miniature Pinscher at that time, school, college, and working abroad (in Taiwan), her dream of owning a Sheltie had to be postponed.

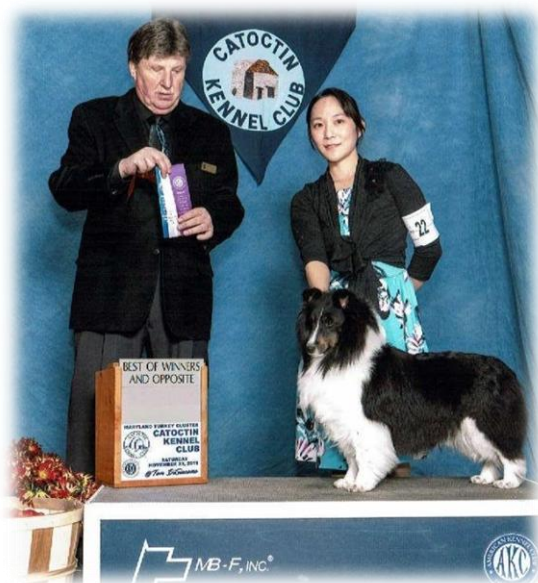

FRIENDS OF WOLF TRAP (FOWT) – DOG FRIENDLY HIKING

Friends of Wolf Trap – 2020 First Day Hike

On New Year's Day, Parks all across the Country offered free, guided First Day Hike Programs. These hikes provide a means for individuals and families to welcome the New Year in the outdoors, exercising and connecting with nature. On New Year's Day 2020, Donna and husband, John Somiak hiked the trails with Prince on a 75 minute hike with a group at Wolf Trap.

On January 1, 2019 nearly 55,000 people rang in the New Year, collectively hiking over 133,000 miles throughout the country on the guided hikes.

In addition to the First Day Hike on January 1, Wolf Trap offers several hiking options and leashed dogs are allowed to participate on the First Sunday Hikes - the exception would be "hikes" that are actually presentations or lectures (indoors) or hikes where dogs might prevent the group from seeing the subject of the hike (ie wildlife). And there are places to dispose of bags along the trails and near the parking lots.

Wolf Trap TRACK Trail (approximately 1.5 miles) - Winding through the woods and over Wolf Trap Run, the TRACK Trail is a great way to explore the outdoors. This orange-blazed trail is oriented for children and families, but is also great for those interested in a more leisurely hike. The trail head and self-guided adventures can be found in the Meadow, but the hike can be started from any point and by following the footprints or logos.

Wolf Trap Trail (approximately 2.5 miles) - This trail takes hikers around the less developed perimeter of the park and features portions of woodland and wetland areas. The trail was developed and is maintained by Potomac Appalachian Trail Club (PATC). The trail can be started from any point of the map, following the blue blazes. Green blazed shortcuts allow hikers to shorten the hike or visit Theatre-in-the-Woods.

FOWT First Sunday Wolf Trap Hikes of Each Month. FOWT volunteers lead free, guided hikes on the first Sunday of each month. The hikes start at the Filene Center Main Gate (Box Office) and last about 2 hours. Walks will focus on different topics: history, biodiversity, wild flower and woodland shade gardens, birds, and general flora and fauna. Times and topics vary and traditionally follow the Wolf Trap Trail loop (2.7 miles). Please dress appropriately for a hike and weather. NATIONAL PARK SERVICE: Take Rover On A Road Trip Too!

The National Park Service welcome pets in developed areas, on many trails and campgrounds, and in some lodging facilities. The National Park Service preserves special places for visitors to enjoy the out-of-doors with your furry family members.

Be a B.A.R.K. Ranger



National parks are exciting places for pets to visit with their family while on vacation. Sometimes these new places can be so exciting as to be overstimulating. Ranger led programs let you know what you can do with your pet and what to watch for.

Join these events to learn how to have a positive experience with your pet in unfamiliar environments. Learn the B.A.R.K. principles so you and your pet can have a safe and fun visit anytime you go to a national park. This program is part of the Healthy People Healthy Parks Initiative. B.A.R.K. stands for:

- Bag your pet's waste
- Always leash your pet
- Respect wildlife
- Know where you can go

Wolf Trap will be launching their own BARK Ranger program in the spring and they are interested in promoting responsible dog owners on the trails and in the park. Wolf Trap place to launch their program in April.

Are you Familiar with Snuffles

Snuffles have been around for years - we often see people making them / or selling them at dog events. A snuffle is made of various materials and you drop treats or kibble into the snuffle. This gives the dog an activity to keep them busy.

HOWEVER, recent research has shown that giving your dog a snuffle reduces stress. HOW?

There are several articles and diagrams, but Dog Walks, Sniffing, Shaking and Pulse Rate: New Research Explores the Connections, in the October 2019 issue of Bark: The Dog Culture Magazine explains it best. The article was submitted by Karen B. London, PhD.



“ . . . Sixty-one dogs were walked three times for 5 minutes each, and their pulse was recorded throughout. One walk was with a 1.5m leash, one was with a 5m leash and one walk was without a leash. (The order of the walks for each dog was random.) The dogs in the study were diverse in terms of breed, age, reproductive status, size and lifestyle.

One of the most interesting results of this study was that the length of the leash influenced the amount of time that dogs spent sniffing. Dogs on a long leash spent almost three times as long sniffing as dogs on a short leash. Unleashed dogs sniffed even more than dogs on a long leash—over three times as long as those on a short leash. This was true for dogs who were walked often and for those who almost never went on walks and everything in between. It was true for all types of dogs (age, size, sex) and was even a pattern for dogs who don't pull on the leash. An important practical takeaway from this research is that walking dogs off leash when feasible and on a long leash otherwise may encourage dogs to engage in more sniffing behavior. That may allow dogs to enjoy their walks even more than they already do—if you can imagine!

Sniffing and pulse rate showed a correlation, too. When dogs sniffed, their pulse rate went down. The more intensely they were engaged in the sniffing behavior, the more their pulse rates lowered. The decline in pulse rate cannot be solely attributed to level of physical activity because pulse rates of dogs declined when they sniffed even if they continued walking.

The behavior commonly called “shaking it off” was also associated with a decline in pulse

rates. Dogs on walks often shook their bodies for a couple of seconds in much the same way that wet dogs shake their body and send water in all directions, and they often did so when their pulse rate was especially high. Following this shaking behavior, their pulse rate declined. The shaking behavior and the associated declines in pulse rates happened in all three leash conditions—1.5m leash, 5m leash and unleashed.

Though the researchers have concluded that sniffing and shaking it off *cause* a lowering of pulse rate, their study does not allow us to definitively determine that. They have certainly found a very interesting correlation, but further experimental research added to these observational studies are necessary to know for sure.”

Often after sniffing and getting treats from the snuffle, the dog is so relaxed they fall asleep. My three Shelties get excited as soon as they see the snuffles!

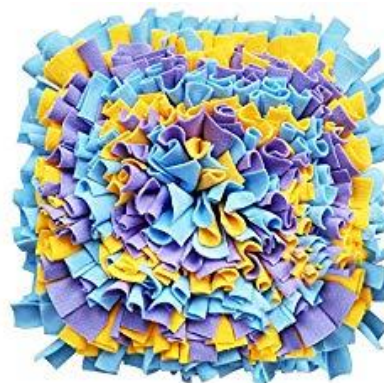

How I TRAINED My Dog to Take a Pill

Does your dog take pills in the same manner and enthusiasm as they do treats? Or, do you have to hide the pill or jam it down their throat?

Ms. Anderson's blog has a simple solution: *train pill-taking as a behavior.*

The concept is quite easy and she makes very good points why a dog should be "trained" to swallow pills:

- The "hide it" method may eventually fail (and you'll have to force it down the dog's throat).
- There may come a time when your dog has to take a pill without food (and you'll have to force it down their throat).

And on a personal note, it saves me from getting frustrated. In the YouTube video Teaching a Dog to Take a Pill, Eileen Anderson shows how she trained her Clara to take pills. The link to the video:

The 2020 Westminster Kennel Club Show engaged many Sheltie owners on the final night when the competition of the AKC dog groups commenced to select the Best in Show. Conrad placed FIRST in the Herding Group and besides being a fantastic example of the breed standard in form and gait, he displayed the Sheltie personality which made him truly an awesome dog and was a favorite of many spectators. Unfortunately, he did not win the title Best of Show. Instead the honor was bestowed upon Siba, the black Standard Poodle by Judge Robert H. Slay.

A LITTLE ABOUT CONRAD

Conrad finished his championship at the young age of one years old by his owner. Since then he has accomplished much in the show world under the expert handling of his friend and co-owner Tyler Crady. Before the age of two "Conrad" had multiple specialty wins and a Reserve Best In Show. He finished out the 2015 year being the #13 top winning Shetland Sheepdog.

In 2016 at the young age of 2 he has done some incredible winning under very respected judges in Specialties and all breed shows. He has been awarded multiple Best In Shows and Herding Group First Place wins, and was America's #1 Shetland Sheepdog in breed and all breed standings for 2016. Conrad is currently one of the Top 10 Herding Dogs. He finished out the year by winning the breed and receiving a Group 2 at the prestigious AKC National Show.

Conrad was awarded an Award of Merit at the 2016 ASSA National behind his sire who was the 2016 National winner. He has also joined the elite Shetland Sheepdog Century Club by winning over 100 Best of Breeds.

CONRAD'S TITLES

Many of us know the performance titles, but not too knowledgeable of the Show Titles. To help us I looked up the titles and was impressed at the confirmation titles Conrad, only 6 years old has obtained.

MBIS RBIS MBISS GCHG CH SYRINGA-AKADIA THE CORSAIR CC AOM

MBISS means Multiple Best in Specialty Shows. A Specialty Show would be a show sponsored by a breed club such as our PVSSC Shows. The purpose of the Specialty Show is intended as a way for many dogs of the same breed to compete with each other at once. A dog who has won Best In Specialty Show multiple times will receive the MBISS title.

MBIS is for Multiple Best in Show. These are not limited to Specialty Shows.

RBIS is for Multiple Reserve Best in Show (2nd place)

CH is Champion. A GCH means the dog has achieved the title of GRAND CHAMPION by meeting the following criteria:

- Twenty five Grand Championship points
- Three majors won under three different judges
- At least one or more points won under a fourth judge
- Must have defeated at least one other AKC Champion of Record at three shows

GCHG is Grand Champion Gold. Any Grand Champion that has won 400 Grand Championship points shall become a Grand Champion Gold (GCHG).

CC is for Challenge Certificate. You need to win three of these under different judges for your dog to become a champion. It can only be won at Championship shows.

AOM is the Award of Merit and is awarded to the judge's final few selected for consideration for Best of Breed at Specialty Shows that are not the National Specialty.

Best of Breed: The 144th Westminster Kennel Club Dog Show

On February 11, GCHP CH Stone Run Afternoon Tea “Siba” the Standard Poodle from the Non-Sporting Group was named the next Westminster Best in Show winner. More than 2,600 dogs competed for the title. Standard Poodles have won the Westminster title ten times, Miniature Poodles three times and Toy Poodles twice.

The other top contenders for the BIS were:

- Reserve Best in Show was “Bourbon” the Whippet (Grand Champion Pinnacle Kentucky Bourbon), who closed out last year as the nation’s number-one Hound.
- Toy Group was “Bono” the Havanese (Grand Champion Oeste’s In The Name Of Love), last year’s immensely popular Reserve Best in Show winner as well as the nation’s top dog overall in 2019;
- Working Group winner, “Wilma” the Boxer (Grand Champion Cinnibon’s Bedrock Bombshell);
- Terrier Group, a Wire Fox Terrier named “Vinny” (Grand Champion Irvonhill Voignier);
- Herding Group, blue merle, “Conrad” the Shetland Sheepdog (Grand Champion Syringa-Akadia The Corsair); and

Having a Sheltie is like having a best friend who’s good at everything! Fans of the breed are sure to recognize these Sheltie traits.

1. He is the epitome of the herding dog. Developed in the rugged Shetland Islands, off the coast of Scotland, near the Arctic Circle, the Shetland Sheepdog was bred to be an agile, alert, and intelligent herder. He loves having a job to do and learns easily.
2. Because he’s so smart and trainable, he succeeds in almost everything he tries. Shelties are used as medical alert dogs, as well as service and therapy dogs. They also excel in dog sports, including rally, agility, herding, and obedience. In fact, this little “Collie in miniature” ranks among the top canine competitors in the world.
3. He’s playful, affectionate, and [devoted to his family](#). It’s not unusual for him to follow family members around everywhere they go, just to be close. Given his natural instincts, don’t be surprised if your Shetland Sheepdog herds the kids in the yard.
4. Shelties can be reserved with strangers, although not aggressive. They’re quick to bark to let you know someone’s coming, which makes them [good watchdogs](#). Speaking of barking, this is a vocal dog that likes to bark ... a lot.
5. Shetland Sheepdogs love learning new tricks and tasks. Shelties (and their owners) enjoy the challenge of coming up with new things to learn, from “helping” around the house to canine gymnastics.

P!nk Named Westminster Agility Champion

Border Collie, P!nk won the 2020 Masters Agility Champion at the Westminster Kennel Club's 7th Annual Agility Competition on Saturday, February 9. She is the sixth Border Collie to win top honor since the competition began seven years ago. Although coming in right behind her was a Shetland Sheepdog.

The Westminster agility trial preceded the club's 144th annual dog show. Border Collies outnumbered any other breed, with a total of 44 entered. The only other breed to come out on top at Westminster's increasingly popular agility event was – no surprise – another Herding breed, the Australian Shepherd, in 2016.

Pink and dog trainer/owner Jennifer Crank, of Pickerington, Ohio has won her 16-inch agility class for three years straight. Pink's time for the winning run was 29.35 seconds, a split second improvement over her 29.78-second run last year and a Westminster best for the black-and-white Border Collie.

The Westminster record is 28.44 seconds, set by a Border Collie named Kelso in 2014. Last year's winner, Verb the Border Collie, also took to the course at this year's competition, weaving through poles and barreling through tunnels to finish at 40.14 seconds.
