I lead the work of WWF US on species conservation. My area of expertise is Asia, especially with regards to tiger, rhino and saola conservation. My wider work touches on red pandas and black-footed ferrets as well as working with people across the globe who are collecting data on small carnivores. My work supports landscape planning, protected area management, poaching prevention, wildlife crime, the science of monitoring species population trends, and community-based conservation.

I have worked extensively in Sumatra, Cambodia and Vietnam and have been engaged in the Owston's Conservation Programme as well as numerous baseline biodiversity surveys across the region. I received my PhD on systematic conservation planning from DICE in the UK. I am WWF's representative as an observer to the Species Survival Commission Steering Committee and have been on the editorial board of the Journal of Small Carnivore Conservation since 2007.
