As we head into the fall back-to-school period, I hope that you enjoyed a safe and happy summer and that you had an opportunity to enjoy some our city's cultural and culinary specialties.

Now that the kids are headed back to school, please remember to slow down when driving and keep your eyes open for children.

Although the committee work shuts down in the summer here at City Hall, we still had meetings of the TTC Commission (I am one of the seven councillors) and our office was busy every day helping residents with a wide range of questions and concerns.

I would also like to let you know that although we take Fridays to work with residents in the ward, I am happy to come out at any time to a neighbourhood event or even just meet with you and your neighbours to talk about local matters.

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Water bill spikes \$\$

With the advent of new water meters which provide detailed water consumption four times daily to Toronto Water, we have had several residents complain about defective water readings.

In fact, a defective water meter is a very rare occurrence. Through a few investigations, we have learned that the spikes (costing in some cases hundreds of extra dollars) are the result of a leak in the homeowner's water system that could be the result of a running toilet, dripping faucet or defective in-ground sprinkler system.

The most common cause is a running toilet. We are told that often times infrequently used basement toilets are the source of the leak.

Residents who suspect that their meter is giving off inaccurate readings can choose to have it undergo a three hour test. The cost of the test is \$156.00. A representative from Toronto Water told me that they have tested



thousands of meters and they are rarely defective. If the meter is found defective, your test money and overbilling will be returned to you.

Richview Plaza

The sale of the Richview Plaza is pending but not yet final. The prospective owners met separately with me and with our planning staff to outline their preliminary ideas for the site.

They intend to keep the retail plaza intact while adding some second floor office space.

For residential, their plan includes two buildings, one being 24 floors and the other being 11 stories, on the current Beer Store location.

The plaza has an official plan mixed use designation. My position is that I am not opposed to the residential component, but I think the density and height plan is too great. I took photos of buildings on Widdicombe Hill, Fontenay Court (Scarlett Rd. and Eglinton) and Royal York and Eglinton. (see below)

As I pointed out to them, none of the existing buildings exceeds 18 floors.

St. Steven's Court (near Humbertown Plaza)

At the end of June, the owners of 1 to 7 St Stevens Court and 289 and 291 The Kingsway issued an appeal of their application to the Ontario Municipal Board. This was a disappointing, although not unexpected, action by the applicant.

It was not unexpected because the application is more than two years old and under the Planning Act, an applicant may launch an appeal after 120 days if a final report has not been written.

Elia Corporation originally met with Toronto Planning staff October 11, 2012 to discuss their proposal. On May 7, 2013, their application for rezoning and rental housing demolition was received. Elia is seeking to replace five buildings with six, containing 603 residential units (156 units at present).

The proposed building heights and density for this site is clearly unsuitable for the neighbourhood and out of step with the present community. The Official Plan under policy 4.2.3 states that "significant growth is generally not intended within developed apartment neighbourhoods".

The Site Area Specific Policy (SASP) review of the apartment neighbourhoods in the Humbertown area,

which is to define how future development may occur, is scheduled to be completed this fall. After the election, that process was expedited so that the Elia application could be addressed more promptly.

I directed that a public meeting on the application be held, and that was done at Etobicoke Collegiate March 23. In early May, I met Elia's representative and had hoped to avoid an OBM action by illustrating that work on the file was progressing.

Elia met with board members from the Humber Valley Resident's Association in late June and demonstrated no willingness to compromise on their plan. They filed their OMB appeal shortly thereafter.

In an August 6 meeting with Elia's President and board chair, I outlined what we had done to move the process along. I also expressed the importance of the development fitting into the community and being viewed as a welcome addition. I am hopeful that a compromise will be found.

I will be meeting with senior staff from the City's legal, planning and affordable housing offices to discuss next steps.

Upcoming Issue this fall: Island Airport expansion

Later this fall, (likely in November) city staff will come forward with a report on the possible expansion of the Island Airport.

My view on this (at present) is that the expansion and associated higher possible noise levels and increased flight traffic is unnecessary.

Meeting with Premier Wynne

My view is that the TDSB should continue to close schools to become more efficient, but retain properties for community use. I specifically cited Silvercreek school, home to the Etobicoke Children's Centre.

Airplane Noise Complaints

This past month, our office attended a roundtable meeting addressing issues surrounding airplane noise. The main take-aways from the meeting are as follows:

REGISTERING NOISE COMPLAINTS

Do you have questions about airport operations and aircraft noise?

Residents with questions about airport operations or who wish to register a noise complaint are encouraged to contact the Toronto Pearson Noise Office using any of the following means:

- WebTrak: A noise complaint can be registered using this online tool that provides near-real time and historical flight data so community members can investigate aircraft operations from any computer with internet access, and it's available 24/7.
- Online Complaint Form: Use our online complaint form.
- Phone: To make a noise complaint by telephone, contact the Noise Office at (416) 247-7682. Our office hours are Monday to Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Outside of office hours, a prompted voice mail service will allow you to leave a detailed message.

Road Repair Updates

At my request, St Georges Road, from Wimbleton Road to Lambeth Road, was reassessed and has been added to the 2018 Transportation Capital Works Program for local road resurfacing. This is in conjunction with work planned on other streets in the immediate area including: Canterbury Cr, Canterbury Rd and Reigate Rd.

Islington and Eglinton

Acting on the observation of a local resident, I asked staff to look at adding an advance left hand turn green for the benefit of Islington northbound cars.

District staff have received confirmation that the northbound left turn advance feature has been enabled during the A.M. peak traffic period (06:30 a.m. to 9:15 a.m.) and P.M. peak traffic period (3:30 p.m. to 6:45 p.m.) as of June 4, 2015. The left turn arrow advance priority feature is displayed at the start of the North/South direction green signal when two or more vehicles are present in the northbound left turn lane.

Road Speeds and Children at Play

We frequently receive calls and e mail from residents complaining about speeding cars.

From Toronto Police 23 Division, we have placed a speed monitoring device on streets north of Eglinton and more requests have been made.

I have asked Transportation Services to have their "Watch Your Speed" trailer placed on a few Ward 4 high traffic streets.





Our office is currently looking into buying bag signs that residents will be able to place on their lawns alerting drivers that children are walking, running, bike riding and playing on the street, and that they should respect that families what them to drive slowly.
