We continue to practice social distancing and will place pre boxed items into your trunk while you remain inside your vehicle. Thank you for your cooperation! Emergencies call Larry at 815 496 9450 The Village started doing annual sidewalk maintenance and replacements in 2015.

In that time, we have replaced or constructed approximately 4,530 linear feet of sidewalk. This includes some new construction on Bushnell Street north toward the Fire Protection District and Jennings Lyon Day Care. Some years we did entire blocks and other years we did spot repairs as needed (for example: last year we repaired multiple small locations along Si Johnson Street).

An assessment completed in 2018 identified the sidewalks that needed replacement due to their poor condition. From that assessment we still have eight blocks to complete. That's approximately 2,240 linear feet of pending work.

If you have a sidewalk near you in poor condition, please give Cathy a call so that we can add it to our annual sidewalk replacements!



### **Guiding Principles for Planning**

### Health and Safety Protocols

Signs & Symptoms: Parents are responsible for keeping your student(s) home if they are showing any signs or symptoms of COVID-19, which include but not limited to fever over 100.4, cough, shortness of breath, chills, fatigue, muscle & body aches, sore throat, nausea, diarrhea, or vomiting. Students with COVID-19 symptoms that appear during the school day will result in the student being quarantined

Temp & Symptoms Check: All students and staff must participate in one of the following every attendance day.

- 1. Self-certification, before boarding the bus or entering the building whichever comes first. Recorded on form and turned in to school
- 1. Bus-certification, volunteer provides certification before boarding the bus. VOLUNTEERS NEEDED
- 2. Building-certification, volunteer provides certification before entering the school VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Social Distancing & Masks:

While in the building we will maintain social distance of 6 feet when possible.

Masks covering the mouth and nose are required of everyone in the building. Contact the principal if this is an issue.

School Sanitation: Cleaning and sanitation will take place in between classes with the help of staff and students. Maintenance staff will increase cleaning of common areas and restrooms during the day.

### Transportation Information

- 1. Please provide rides to your student(s) when possible
- 2. Parking permits will be free of charge for this school year
- 3. Busses will drop off/pick up in at front of building
- Students drop off/pick up, enter from the east side by tennis courts, drop off/pick up at cafeteria doors, exit from the west side.
