Becoming a Writer




When she first started writing stories, Malorie sent them to people hoping that they would publish them. To begin with, nobody said yes to publishing her stories. Two years later, somebody replied saying that they would like to publish her writing. Her first text called 'Not So Stupid!: Incredible Short Stories' was made into a book in 1990.

When Malorie thought about the books that she read when she was younger, she noticed that none of the main characters were Black people. She wanted to do something to change this so she started writing books with Black characters.

Did You Know...?

Before her first book was published, Malorie got 82 letters from people saying that they didn't want to make her writing into a book. She never gave up though and has now written over 70 books!









Malorie's books have won lots of awards and some have even been turned into television series! Some of her books include 'Pig Heart Boy', 'Hacker' and 'Cloud Busting'.



Becoming a Writer



When Malorie thought about the books that she read when she was younger, she noticed that none of them featured main characters who were Black people. When she was in her early 20s, Malorie read her first book with a Black main character. Malorie says that this book helped her to realise that she could be a published writer. As a result, Malorie started writing the stories that she wanted to read when she was a child.

After two years and 82 rejection letters, somebody told Malorie that they would like to publish her book. The book was called 'Not So Stupid!: Incredible Short Stories' and was written for young adults.

Malorie has now written many books for all ages. Lots of her books have won awards and some have even been turned into television series! In 2013, Malorie became the Children's Laureate. This is an award that is given every two years to an inspirational children's writer or illustrator.









Did You Know...?

Although people didn't want to publish her books to begin with, Malorie wasn't close to giving up. She decided that she would only rethink becoming an author after getting 1,000 rejection letters!



An Important Job

Malorie believes that books are important for helping us to see things from another person's point of view. She says that we can begin to tackle issues like **racism** by representing lots of different people within stories.

If you want to be a writer, Malorie's advice is to start by reading lots of different books. She says to try books that you that you might not usually read. 



Early Life

Malorie Blackman was born in London on 8th February 1962. When she was younger, she enjoyed spending time at the library. There, she enjoyed reading adventure stories, classic novels, sci-fi tales and anything else that she could get her hands on.

After leaving school, Malorie trained in computer science and later graduated from a school that specialised in film and television. She worked as a computer programmer before making the decision to try and become a published author.



Becoming a Writer



When Malorie thought back to the books that she read as a child, she recognised that none of the main characters were Black people. It wasn't until she was in her early 20s that Malorie read her first book with a Black main character. Seeing herself reflected in the book, Malorie says that she realised that she might also be able to be a published writer.

As a result, Malorie started writing the stories that she would have enjoyed as a child. These were adventure stories, sci-fi tales and more – all of which featured a Black character.



After receiving several rejection letters from people that she had sent her initial stories to, Malorie decided that she wouldn't reconsider her choice to become an author until she had been given her 1,000th rejection letter. After two years and 82 rejection letters, Malorie's first book was published in 1990. It was called 'Not So Stupid!: Incredible Short Stories' and featured short sci-fi and horror stories for young adults.





Since her first book was published, Malorie has gone on to write many books for all ages. Many of these books have gone on to win awards and some have even been turned into television series! In 2013, Malorie became the Children's Laureate. This is something that is awarded every two years to an inspirational children's writer or illustrator.

She suggests that we can begin to tackle issues like **racism** and **discrimination** by representing a range of cultures, beliefs and **ethnicities** within stories. In an interview that took place in 2016, Malorie explained that, "Books should be mirrors as well as windows."
