

GLYNN COUNTY REGISTERED LIVE OAK TREES

The Coastal Georgia Historical Society registered Glynn County's first two trees in 1979 with the Live Oak Society of the Louisiana Garden Club Federation. In 2005 Reverend Dave Hansen began documenting the county's Live Oak Trees and brought the number of registered trees to 58. The Golden Isles Fund for Trees (GIFT) was founded in 2015 and has continued the work.

1	Lover's Oak	Albany Street Brunswick	35'1"	400	Lover's Oak is said to date back to the 12 th century. According to local legend, Native American braves and maidens would meet under the enormous oak. Its measurements were updated in 2016.
2	Captain Young Oak	At Youngwood Dr. and 101 Dellwood Ct.	30'3"	344	Capt. Nicholas C. Young was the captain of Howard Coffin's yacht and later captain for the Reynolds family. He owned this property, which included a home built in 1880 which still stands today. He named the homestead Youngwood Plantation where he set up a dairy farm. .

5	John Wesley Oak	Epworth-by-the-Sea, SSI	17'4"	195	John Wesley and his brother Charles, the founders of Methodism, arrived on the Island in 1736 with Capt. James Gascoigne. John Wesley was authorized to perform all religious duties in Savannah and the Town of Frederica on St. Simons Island. He stayed in the colony of Georgia for less than two years before returning to England.

7	The General	116 Arthur J. Moore, SSI	22'	252	
8	Blanche Oak	440 Kings Way	22'7"	253	This tree is named after Blanche's Courtyard Restaurant, which stood on this site for many years. The Blanche Oak is now in the center of the rear deck at Mellow Mushroom. Special care was taken to accommodate the large limbs of the tree. Mellow Mushroom was the first recipient of Golden Isles Fund for Trees (GIFT) Business Award for Tree Preservation. The tree is regularly cared for by an arborist.

He was an absentee owner of a personal empire including over 500 slaves and 1100 acres of cotton and rice.
