
### AMANA SOCIETY, INC. BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION

If you use a hose, remove when done to ensure the spigot does not freeze and break.

#### COVID-19 and the Amana Community

Residents agree, the last couple of weeks have brought significant changes and significant challenges as Amana community groups, the CCA School District and local employers respond to the COVID-19 global pandemic and control measures put into place by lowa health officials with the Center for Disease Control guidelines.

As the situation unfolds it is possible that more scheduling changes will be made. As of Tuesday, March 17, 2020 here is what we know:

• The Clear Creek Amana School District will be closed for four weeks as per Iowa Governor Kim Reynold's March 15 recommendation. All school activities, rehearsals, competitions and team events are postponed until further notice. As per the CCA website, "We are in the process of developing plans and will communicate these plans as quickly as possible. Immediate focus will be on the next few weeks, beyond that, we will operate with a week-toweek mindset. As you know the situation is evolving daily, sometimes hourly."

• The Amana Church has announced that it will suspend worship and church events at the Middle and Amana Churches until May 10. This includes regular Sunday and Wednesday evening services, Amana Sunday School classes and the spring dumpling soup supper to have been held March 22.

• Amana Church worship services will be offered for all to listen to at home. The Amana Church Elders are working on a "Facebook live" presentation for 10 a.m. Sundays. More information about that and about Easter services will be shared via social media and the church's email list.

All services will be posted as audio podcasts on the church's website amanachurch.com. On the webpage past services are available for you to hear. Watch for the upcoming services as they become available.

• Monday congregate meals, otherwise known as "senior dining," at the Amana Church will continue at this time.

• The Amana Colonies Food Pantry at the Middle Amana Church will be distributing food as per its regular schedule. The next scheduled distribution is March 29. See the story below for more information about the Food Pantry and COVID-19.

• Iowa's restaurants (with the exception of carry out) will be closed until March 31 by an executive order of Gov. Reynolds issued Tuesday noon. Many small merchants in the Colonies are open as per their normal March hours, the ACCVB announced Tuesday. It is possible for many local merchants to arrange for home delivery to you or for you to preorder and pick up food/ product. Local restaurants do offer carry-out meals/ foods too.



The 23rd Psalm that I used to dislike so much when I saw it (it seemed) every memorial card comes at me with new meaning and I wonder after all these years I should be still and listen to those words more carefully.

The television is off at our house and we are really getting the collection of books we have stored up over the years read. It is satisfying knowing when another book has been read or chore been done.

It is truly wonderful to write letters to people and get letters back from people one has not heard from in a long period of time.

Perhaps taking some time off is not that bad after all.

I called Jon Childers about the influenza epidemic that happened during WWI (1918 Spanish Flu). It seems that four men from the Amanas were infected and died from it, but then there were some who survived. All were soldiers so they had been in close quarters.

During the black Plaque which can and went over four centuries, one town (Eyam in Northern England) self quarantined+by leaving large rocks around the perimeter of the village and then leaving money that had been disinfected with vinegar by the rocks with which people from other villages could buy food with and leave near the rocks. This went on for a year.

- **Avoid touching eyes, nose and mouth.** Hands touch many surfaces and can pick up viruses. Once contaminated, hands can transfer the virus to your eyes, nose or mouth.
- **Practice respiratory hygiene.** This means covering your mouth and nose with your bent elbow or tissue when you cough or sneeze. Then dispose of the used tissue immediately.
