EASTSIDE PROGRAM CONGREGATIONAL FINANCE MEETING FEBRUARY 28, 2021 Draft Minutes

PROGRAM MEETING NOTICE: Notice for this meeting was part of the weekly announcements which are sent via email to Eastside members. As well, the meeting notice was given at the church services, being done via Zoom, the last three Sundays.

1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 12:26 by Sarah Tkachuk.

2. Motion to allow adherents to vote.

Moved by Carol Hein. Seconded by Brian Mitchell-Walker. Carried.

3. Motion to adopt the agenda.

Two minor corrections were made to agenda. Adoption of revised agenda moved by Elaine Hill. Seconded by Sam Baidoo. Carried.

4. Motion to adopt the minutes of the June 14, 2020 Congregational Meeting.

Moved by Bonnie Yake. Seconded by Ken Powers. Carried.

Living Spirit Council Report – Bonnie Yake

A number of LSCC meetings were held over 2020. Sub-committees met with the city about the dog park, no decision yet by the city. The LSC closed its doors for worship and meetings on March 21, 2020 because of COVID-19. Both Bread of Life and St. Philips had a few in-person worships although have not been doing any for some time. Munch is still doing some catering and the Arcola Wellness Centre have still been renting and using the building a bit. Bonnie advised that Munch still does catering and lunches which can be ordered by anyone, Wednesday is soup day. The decision was made to continue with online worship services, along with inperson, once we can start again. Audiovisual equipment was purchased by the LSC in order to help with that. Bonnie thanked all the LSC volunteers and committees, highlighting Property and Maintenance and the great job they do, and thanked Brian Abrahamson for all his work. Our custodian has also done some maintenance work. Brian Abrahamson, who has been a member of the committee for guite a few years. is looking for a replacement for himself. Bonnie also thanked Jim and Anita for looking after our financial matters. We would like to have a farewell party for St. Philips at some point, as it is being replaced by the consolidated Anglican churches in Regina. The consolidated churches are called Immanuel Parish. They have accepted our invitation to use our facility and are currently calling it a Satellite location as they continue to determine with us what the relationship will be. We are looking for new people to serve on the Living Spirit Council and, if anyone is interested. let Bonnie know.

Q1. Could you let us know what the current status is with Immanuel?

A1. They have committed to continue paying St. Philip's portion of the LSC and will be providing representation on the LSCC and the Property & Maintenance Committee. Also, a small committee from all three LSC churches, will be doing further exploration on the relationship. They haven't chosen their main location yet and may have other satellites. Still decisions to be made. They have four clergy and two representatives from each church on the Immanuel Parish task force. Russell announced that Nancy Yee submitted her resignation.



Jim was unable to attend so Sarah provided the report based on the information provided by Jim. The revenues received in 2020 were high compared to recent years. Part of that were one-time gifts by people. The Operating budget was under budget but a good portion of that was due to the reimbursement received for Russell's salary. The overall surplus was just over \$17,000.00. A recommendation was made by the Leadership Team to set \$17,000.00 aside for the mortgage, which will take pressure off the regular expenses. The LeadershipTeam has been doing its best to keep the congregation up-to-date with frequent updates. The year ended with a bank balance of \$58,550. Our share of the mortgage fluctuates, depending on our percentage commitment to the LSC.

Q1. Can we not just pay down our portion of the mortgage?

A1. Because there are three partners inputting to this, one partner cannot pay down their portion without the other partners doing the same.

Q2. Is the money that is set-aside in an interest-bearing account?

A2. No, it is just set-aside on the books.

Greg Thomas moved that the financial report be accepted. 2nd by Anita Tessier. Carried. Carol Hein moved that \$17,000.00 be reserved for future mortgage payments. 2nd by Delia Baidoo. Carried.

Reviewed the 2021 budget. The percentage of our contribution to the LSC has increased, due to our increased revenues in comparison to the other two congregations. Over the next year, we must be careful to ensure we meet our obligations and do not get behind.

Sarah thanked the Gratitude committee for all their work.

Reviewed the chart regarding the mortgage and how much the mortgage has been paid down. The powerpoint pie chart slide on Eastside's givers was reviewed. We no longer get any grants from the national church, which means counting on the community to support our costs. Median giving is about \$1,200.00. About half our revenue is received via PAR so balance must come from envelopes, direct deposit or online. Anyone interested in going on PAR, contact office.

Russell advised that the Outreach activities are no longer being funded by the Living Skies Region, so will need more support directly by the churches. The Leadership Team has directed some support from our budget to that ministry. There may be fundraising that is directed to Outreach. Donations can be directed to these, if members wish to make separate donations to Outreach. Russell will be highlighting each of the different Outreach activities at our services, as done by Carol Hein at a past service.

If anyone has any questions about the budget, contact Sarah or Jim.

MaryBelle moved that the budget be approved. 2nd by Brian Abrahamson. Carried.

Minister's Report

As we review this past year, none of us expected to still be dealing with the pandemic, and continuing to worship online over a year into this time. While this has been a challenge in so many ways, particularly for those who live on their own and without internet, we also acknowledge the ways we have been able to maintain and even grow our community. That has been a blessing and there are things that we will want to take with us out of this time and our learnings, as we move into a new normal.

At the beginning of this season I had to be off on medical leave following sudden quadruple by-pass surgery. I am so grateful to the community for the way people stepped up and stepped into the needs to keep our ministry going. I am filled with gratitude for Ken Powers and Hazel Arbon who took on worship leadership and Amanda who took over hosting Zoom worship. I felt well loved and supported by this community through this recovery period.

We continue to have a faithful and committed **Leadership Team** over this past year, who has always put the safety of our community first, in committing to remain online, and have intentionally looked at what we need to know, hold on to and let go of as we move into a new normal. The **Congregational Care** Committee has stepped up this past year in contacting not only those in crisis and in need, but also those who are isolated, alone, and/or not online. We have experienced a significant number of deaths this year, not all COVID related, which also increases the support offered by Congregational Care.

The **Faith Formation** committee looks after Christian education and worship oversight, and I offer support to this committee through worship and program planning and leadership. I have continued to offer Film and Faith, Craft/Study group, and Courageous Faith sessions online. In December we decided to try our Community Dinner program online, which has been well received with bringing in some good music and faith resources people share online from across the country. We can't do this every month, as there is no budget for it.

I continue to value the opportunity to lead worship with this community every Sunday. I continue to work with the **Worship Feedback Team** of Jayne Krueger-Jickling and Delia Baidoo who review worship and sermons regularly and offer feedback as well as try to keep the pulse on the congregations' perspectives. I appreciate the feedback and am always working to provide meaningful, nurturing, inspiring, and challenging services for you all. We would benefit from having another member to offer feedback. Let any of us know if you are interested.

We celebrate the wonderful musical gifts of our community and are missing our choir as we have been online. We continue to be blessed with the music leadership of Josh Hendrickson and Michelle Dickie leading the hymns for worship through



their recordings. We have enjoyed Wendy Hardman's leadership as well when Michelle took a break in order to focus on finishing her degree this spring.

We have also been working toward being in person for worship again, and the LSC has purchased equipment to enable us to continue online as we do so. I have to thank Barry Sudom who has spent countless hours researching, purchasing, teaching himself on the equipment and preparing to train others. We hope to start offering services online from the Sanctuary before the summer to prepare for what we hope will be in-person services in the fall.

I am grateful to Doug Scheurwater who has coordinated our support to **Indigenous Christian Fellowship** during this pandemic time. Linda and Larry Fowler, and Perry and Debbie Morehouse have faithfully made sandwiches each week for their program. Linda has also coordinated folk to make home made deserts to supplement these lunches.

I have continued to enjoy working with our faithful and committed the **Gratitude Team** who continue to keep the issues of Stewardship and gratitude before the church community. This includes through monthly gratitude messages in the weekly e-mail and a minute for mission once a month. We coordinated a successful Stewardship Campaign this fall as we communicate our needs to the congregation.

During the Pandemic the ministry with the **Living Spirit Centre** has been limited given that we each are using different online platforms. We were able to share a Blue Christmas and Maundy Thursday service and now know how we can do it with the technology. We have been working with the new Immanuel Anglican Parish as they discern their way and explore what it means to be in relationship with the LSC as a satellite for their ministry. We are exploring children and youth ministry programming together as well as working out what our partnership will look like as we move into this new relationship

With regard to the **wider church** my involvement with the Anglican-United Dialogue group completed in the fall. I continue as secretary of the Multi-Faith Saskatchewan Board. I continue with Skylight Festival as Communications chair and are in the midst of discerning what this summer will look like. I also continue to be a consultant with the National church for our Sexual Abuse Prevention and Response committee.

With regard to **Continuing Education** I have done a number of online webinars and courses. This fall, two that were significant were Hybrid Worship, which was about how to offer and engage congregations both online and in person; and Digital Mission about offering ministry programs online. Both were offered by Fresh Expressions US. I will be taking advantage of the free Festival of Homiletics (preaching) conference this month.

This spring our office went through another transition as Harvey resigned to take a full time position elsewhere. We are thrilled to have Becca Dziaduck take on the

position after being able to fill in for us and be trained by Harvey. Becca will be a blessing to the office and communication position.

We continue to be blessed in so many ways to be part of this wonderful community of Eastside.

As many will remember, in 2018, the Eastside Leadership Team embarked on a 3 year plan to discern our path in connection with other churches in the Regina Cluster and our partners in the Living Spirit Centre. Much has changed since then, however we are continuing to examine our best path forward to continue to serve the community with open minds, open hearts and open doors! We are excited about our growth over this time, including a better financial position and some exciting initiatives in our community. The silver lining to the pandemic is an opportunity to easily connect with other churches in Regina and at the Living Spirit Centre, including sharing services and meeting with others.

During the 2020-2021 year we have done the following:

- We met with Russell and Harvey in the fall to help them set goals for the coming year.
- We helped organize Russell's medical leave in the fall with respect to the insurance claim.
- We attended Leadership Team meetings
- We accepted Harvey Gibson's resignation as communications coordinator for Eastside. We presented him with a goodbye card and gift card on behalf of the congregation.
- We drafted a job posting for the communications position, reviewed all the applications, interviewed three candidates, and then offered the position to Becca Dziaduck, who was filling in temporarily after Harvey left.

- Outreach:

- E Examine your own assumptions and perceptions
- C keep Confidentiality

• T – Tolerate ambiguity because we are not here to debate. There are no "winners" or "losers."

Since the beginning of the pandemic we have begun each meeting with a check in time which has really drawn us closer as a group as we are often quite vulnerable in these sharing times. We find it encouraging to know this group of friends care about our well-being. The book studies help us grow; but equally important is the caring that is growing in this group.

Congregational Care

This year our work continued with the following goals:

- To become aware or informed of people in need within Eastside
- Making monthly phone calls to those who have an identified need (illness, grief, loneliness, isolated, etc.)

• Welcoming newcomers on Sunday morning through the designated Congregational Care Greeter from the committee. Since March 2021 we have been doing a part of the "welcome".

• Coordinating and participating in the Prayer Chain. Committee members are on the prayer chain, manage the list of those who wish to be on the prayer chain.

• Grief Support through the offering Journey Through Grief booklet series and offering prayer shawls and visits to those who are bereaved. Nine grief books and six prayer shawls have been offered and accepted to date.

- Celebrating new babies into our community
- Overseeing the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre Worship service for the residents has not occurred this past year. If and when Wascana services are again allowed this ministry could be one coordinated in conjunction with the United Church Chaplain and the Regina Cluster of churches. Eastside partnered with Wesley at Christmas to distribute cards and snowflake ornaments (donated by Sonia Abrahamson) to United Church residents at Wascana Rehabilitation Center.
- Supporting one another to carry out the ministry
- We are committed to encouraging the congregation to keep us informed when

people are in need.

We met the first Thursday of each month via ZOOM in April, May, June, took July and August off, then again starting in September to this date. We use a rotating chair process as well as a rotating phoning process.

This year has been particularly busy for Russell and committee members with phone calls, since there have been many prayer requests related to Covid 19 challenges.

In addition, we checked in on those we have not seen on Zoom and connected with those who aren't on online, including delivery of weekly e-mails and announcements.

We would like to thank Clare Banks who stepped away from this committee after many years of faithful service.

We would also acknowledge and thank the prayer shawl knitters/ crocheters/ contributors; Gladys Oleksyn, Clare Banks, Debbie Morehouse and the other "anonymous secret angels" whose shawls mysteriously appear in the bin each month and also Sonia Abrahamson who sends sympathy cards on our behalf to those who have lost loved ones.

Affirming Ministry



We continue to be without a formal Affirming Ministry Committee but do have a number of folk who step up to help and participate on events. With the pandemic Pride week activities were postponed to September. In June, the regular pride week time, there was a vehicle only parade that only 30 entries were allowed and the Faith Communities were invited to be one of them. We had three vehicles from 5 churches participate, and three Eastside folk. Once September came, we were still in the midst of the Pandemic and so events were adapted for online and to fit within protocols. There was another vehicle only parade which we did not participate in as a congregation no vehicle was available, and I was still on medical leave. Sunset represented the Churches with our usual Affirming Ministry and multi-faith signs.





This spring, Saskatoon City Council passed a motion banning 2SLGBTQ conversion efforts and the mayor here was asked her opinion of this and whether Regina should have a ban. She agreed it should and that started a process to get a motion in place. The Affirming Ministries in Regina formed an ad hoc group to support and work toward this ban, which also included Stewart from Bread of Life, and Nancy from Immanuel Parish. I was interviewed a few times about this and when the motion went to the City Wellness Committee April 14, myself, Sterling and Janet Bjorndahl each spoke to the committee as part of 16 delegations. A few weeks later on April 28, I was one of 31 delegations presented to the City Council on the motion to create a bylaw by early 2022. While many were against a ban, there were a number who wanted to still counsel and support those who wished to change. In the end, after an almost 12 hour meeting, approved for the administration to draft a by-law based on the Saskatoon by-law to come back for con-

sideration and vote at council on July 14. The community of supportive churches have really stepped up to advocate for this change.

Gratitude Team Report

The Gratitude Team has continued to meet on a monthly basis via Zoom over the last year. Our current members include: Russell Mitchell-Walker, Wanda Barr, Maureen Hughes and Delia Baidoo.

From May until December 2020 the team worked on the Stewardship Campaign. This involved preparing documents to be sent out to the congregation, a dedicated Worship Service on October 25, and the follow up on Pledge Response Cards. We assembled a jigsaw puzzle as a visual representation of the pledges collected from the congregation. The campaign was done through email this year for two reasons. Firstly, the team could not meet in person to plan and package the materials. And secondly, it was a cost saving measure as we did not have the cost of printing and mailing packages.
