
Notes on Spokes

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Keltner's

It was hot. Damn hot! It was the hottest day in three years! The first Hillbilly Grand Prix of the season, sponsored by Farmers Cycle Service, was the hottest day in three years. Oh yeah, it was also dry and dusty. Spud had laid out a four-mile loop at Keltner's Place at Spokane, MO. A couple of hare scrambles/grand prix had been run at this location before, so much of the trail had been used before. Spud had put in a new section of single track for the bikes. Let's talk about this trail first. It must have taken half an hour to cut each 15 feet of trail. Well, that was the first part. Then it popped over the top of the hill and it had this killer off-camber. The terrain at Keltner's is very hilly. It's basically one big valley with trails going up and down both sides. There is also a small motocross track in the valley, but the jumps weren't big enough to favor motocrossers. A couple of the big hills caught riders by surprise as ground turned to powder.

The Expert class was packed. Chris Thiele and Caleb Wohletz, regulars from the expert class in the Missouri Hare Scrambles Championship series, showed up. Last year's HBGP winner,

for this race. I didn't know Jeremy Havens was back in the area, but he was signed up for expert class. Karl "KTMKarl" Harris, Zack and Bryant were making their first expert class ride.

Anthony Meyer, signed up. Dale Rector came out of retirement

The first moto was very tight with Wohletz winning by four seconds over Thiele. In the second moto, Thiele had a very convincing win, over 3 minutes ahead of second place rider Rector.

In the Intermediate class, Steve Underwood took first with Jeb Patton 32 seconds back in the first moto. Kreg Simons picked up third only 24 seconds back. In the second moto, Justin Smith had the gas turned on, winning by 1 minute and 36 seconds over second place Kreg Simons. Smith's ride was good enough for 4th overall in the second moto.

Shane Roberts won the 250-Open race in convincing fashion by winning both motos by a good margin. Max Ellison picked up second in both motos.

In the 0-220 class, it was a father and son event with dad winning. Nick Frost Sr. won both motos. Nick Jr. got a second and third for second for the day. Michele Eidem has to get a special mention for racing with the guys. She races in the Women's class in the MHSC series, but for the Hillbilly series, she's running the 0-220 class, picking up 3rd for the day with a fourth and a second.

The 30 Plus class is looking very competitive this year with 15 riders signed up for the first race. J. P. Compton won both motos to win the class for the day. He also finished 9th overall in the second moto. Dwayne Miekley finished second place in both motos, securing 2nd place in the class.

Mike Herbert won the 40 Plus class going away. I should know; I got second in both motos, so I was the one he was going away from! Good job, Mike.

The Beginners Class was the biggest of the day with 17 riders signing up. Mark Dalton won by virtue of his second moto finish with a 3-2. Jason Johnson had 2-3 giving Dalton the day. Milo Carter got third for the day with a 6-1.

Usually, the youth motorcycle class is held on the regular trail, with the riders leaving in the back row. The hills were too tough for many of the youth riders, so the youth class ran two half-hour motos on a shortened track with the pee wee race held between the motos.

Colorado July 2003


Ah yes, the Ozark Mountain Trail Riders' annual trip to Colorado to ride dirt bikes and ATVs. We were going to Colorado, them, assured them that I was not stalking them and that I had been here before on the Colorado 500 and wanted to point out the cabin to Linda. They were very gracious and invited us down to take a closer look. And then, the gentleman came down, showed us around a bit and gave us a bit of a history lesson.

This gentleman is Steve Widner's partner and owns the cabin next door. Widner purchased a share in the property in the 1970s from descendants of the original miners, the Lambertsons. If you look on the map, there is a Lambertson peak located behind Star Mine. By the time Widner purchased his share in the property, the descendants were little old ladies. For 20 years this was their primary residence and for 3 years, it was their only residence. I haven't mentioned there is no electricity and the only running water is in the creek outside the cabin. In the winter, it's a two hour snowmobile ride to the

cabins. Talk about tough. After Widner's cabin, we headed up to Star Mine and took a break for lunch. No, there isn't a restaurant at the Star Mine.

Those ATVs sure are handy for carrying stuff. Then we headed up to the pass between American Flag and Italian mountains. This is the first time we saw snow. Here's where I pulled out the map and had to decide whether we could make all the twists and turns to make it to Spring Creek Reservoir or turn back and retrace our steps.

Of course, we forged ahead. It turned out to be pretty easy to find our way through all the intersections. We would just turn right whenever we came to a two-track until we got to the main road. This is the most difficult section of the loop with the biggest rocks. I did see a couple single track trails in this area. (Continued on page 5)

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

One was Flag Creek Trail and other the didn't have a sign, but looked it like one Ihad ridden a year earlier on the Colorado 500. I knew would be checking this later in the week.

If you are heading from south to north, the trail ends with a major downhill. I don't think I'd want to climb it, particularly if it is wet. There are a couple of tough climbs heading north, so don't think it's going to be a piece of cake this way. At the north end of the trail, I had scooted ahead to take pictures. I thought I would get a better angle if I laid down on the trail. So Racer comes by and I get his picture. Then Terry comes around the cornerand I'm lying on the ground. He thinks Racer has crashed his brains out.

Star trail comes out at the pass between American Flag and Italian mountains. I'd been here the day before and scoped out the single track ahead. According to the map, the trail we headed down doesn't have a name or number, but it is the first single track to the right after the pass. This is mainly a downhill trail toward Spring Creek Reservoir. But you need to turn right before you get to the reservoir on trail 422 – Flag Creek Trail. As soon as you turn onto this trail, you have to head through a bog. It looks bad, but I have never had any problems getting through it

Before you get very far up this trail, you need to take a left on trail 415 – Bear Creek Trail. There are a couple of tricky intersections on this trail. You'll have to pick up some two track for a little bit. Bear Creek trail intersects with Deadman Gulch trail,

where we take a left turn down a rocky two-track to Spring Creek road (FS 744). This is a wide open gravel road, passable by any car. We were taking this past Spring Creek Reservoir to pick up a two-track (FS 746.1) leading to Doctor's Park Trail. This gave us about 8 miles of real sweet single track leading back to Dinner Station campground. Richard had noticed a problem with his bike. A spring inside the transmission had broken and it became difficult to shift.

When we got back to camp, Aaron "Chili" and Kerri Roberts, Shane Roberts and Mick Spickard had arrived and were rejetting their bikes. They had participated in the MHSC race at Florence, MO, the day before and had driven all night to get to Colorado. As you can see from the pictures, they were driving

off the bike. Of course, he didn't notice the missing fanny pack until Pitkin. Bummer.


