From Your Deanery

Good Shepherd - Jan

I thoroughly enjoyed my first convention and would highly recommend being a delegate to anyone who has not done this. The convention was interesting, very well run and much was accomplished. For detailed information please see:

I have been asked to write about the resolutions passed and will focus briefly on those five that were not passed by acclimation.

Resolution 1 - Proposition 47: Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Act of 2014 was passed. Congregants are encouraged to support Prop 47 which would change courts sentencing structure and the money saved will be reallocated to local agencies, mental health, at risk K-12 student support. There will be a shift from drug offenses as penalty to mental health issue and creates different opportunities (housing, jobs, voting rights) for those convicted of certain felonies. The resolution also includes a request for congregations to engage in prayerful study of the root causes of mass incarceration on men of color in California and the Nation.

Resolution 3 - Liturgical Marriage Equality was passed. This a recommendation to the General Convention that the wording will be changed from a "man and woman" and "husband and wife" will be rewritten using gender neutral terms in the book of Common Prayer.

Resolution 4, 4A and the final amended 4A - Socially Responsible Investing in compliance with Episcopal Church Portfolio Restrictions was passed in the final form. The resolution set no time restrictions on moving funds but asks "that the Committee on Corporate Social Responsibility of the Executive Council and the Church Pension Fund, in consultation with experts in the fields of economics and investing, ethics, renewable energy development, jointly assess whether the benefit of a divestment strategy would be in compliance with our values and issue a report"

Resolution 6 - Benefits Cost Sharing was not passed.

Resolution 7 - Promoting Peace and Justice in Israel/Palestine was passed. It was resolved to recommend to the General Convention that the Church divest holdings in Caterpillar, G4S, Hewlett Packard and Motorola Solutions and that Episcopalians should boycott products manufactured in the West Bank and East Jerusalem

A resolution was made from the floor regarding the firing of 8 faculty at the General Theological Seminary in Manhattan and was approved. From Diocal:

"The Diocese of California deplores the actions of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the General Theological Seminary of the Episcopal Church in firing 8 faculty members protesting the dean and president's allegedly inappropriate behavior. These actions are directly in opposition to the policies and procedures of the Episcopal Church. The board's interpretation of the faculty's letter of protest as a "resignation" cut off the possibilities of real and necessary conversation, and is unacceptable. As members of the Episcopal Church, we call for the faculty members to be reinstated with their full academic rights and privileges, and a robust, independent and transparent investigation carried out. Please know that our prayers have been and continue to be with the whole community of General Seminary."

Convention Delegates

Holy Family - Gloria and Marilyn

Summary of Bishop Marc's 2014 Convocational Address.

"...So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation..."

One of the features of our diocese is religious diversity. Bishop Marc spent the last 2 years with Tibetan Buddhists, who see that the enlightened society is possible because of the basic goodness of humanity. This view reminded the Bishop of the vision statement constructed 7 years ago for the Diocese of California. Historically, the phrase Beloved Community appeared in the 1900s within the Fellowship of Reconciliation. In the mid-20th century, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., a member of the Fellowship of Reconciliation used Beloved Community extensively. Mindfulness in Buddhism helps manifest an Enlightened Society; reconciliation leads to the Beloved Community. In Martin Luther King's Christian vision, reconciliation is similar to mindfulness revealing basic human goodness in Buddhism, and this the underlying work of Christ.

Our role in being the Beloved Community, is forwarding Christ's reconciliation in the world. Reconciliation came to mean bring people at variance with one another into concord, and eventually reconciliation was understood as to make peace between people and God. Christ on the cross is the universal symbol of Jesus Christ's reconciling the world. As Christians we understand that the flourishing of the Beloved Community appears as a result of following Jesus in his universal work of reconciliation. We are invited by God to draw on the everpresent power of love to accomplish this work.

Bishop Marc spoke of some of the many stories of our congregations making partnerships with each other for common ministry. Our area ministry of Good Shepherd and Holy Family was cited in calling a new vicar. At the Grace Cathedral there is Yoga on the Labyrinth which is drawing over 700 young adults every Tuesday evening.

Christ leads us personally. The Bishop told the story of Abigail Nelson who studied global poverty and the transnational economies connected to global poverty. While doing her field research in South America she volunteered at an AIDS clinic. Sitting by the bed of a man who was in his last moments of life, she held his hand, and to her fear he embraced her. She



was afraid of his sores, emaciated body, and his disease; in the embrace she felt joy, and within herself the overcoming of the difference between her and him. It was a dramatic experience of reconciliation that transformed Abigail. It is in these transformative moments when we move forward despite our fears, resting on the grace of reconciliation already won and the confidence of Christ with us that is the hope and good news. Christ is born in each Christian soul, and the ministry of Christ takes place within that soul, bringing forth transfigured individuals.

The reconciling work of Christ is not external to you, it blossoms within you.
