
Herb of the Month Rosemary

While Rosmarinus officinalis has long been the botanical name for rosemary, DNA research has revealed that the plant characteristics are more closely aligned with plants in the Salvia genus. Therefore, the scientists at the Royal Horticultural Society in London have reclassified rosemary as Salvia rosmarinus.

- The genus name Salvia comes from the Latin word salveo, meaning "to save or heal".
- Early Egyptians used rosemary in their embalming practices.
- Rosemary is associated with improved memory and alertness. Greek scholars often wore a rosemary garland on their heads to help their memory during exams.
- It was also the symbol of remembrance. A sprig of rosemary was often placed in the hands of the deceased at funerals.
- As a symbol of happiness, loyalty, and love, rosemary sprigs were used in bridal bouquets, or a simple sprig was worn by the groom symbolizing faithfulness.
- Napoleon Bonaparte's Eau de Cologne was made with rosemary.
- Grow rosemary in well-drained soil with additional sand or gravel added to the mix.
- Water rosemary when the soil is slightly dry to avoid root rot.
- Depending on the cultivar, rosemary can be hardy to zone 6. Winter protection can improve hardiness.
- Indoors, rosemary prefers a sunny, cool room and water when drying but before completely dry.
- In addition to culinary uses, rosemary can be used to create wreaths, garland, bath/beauty and potpourri products. As a dye plant, rosemary produces a yellow-green color.




BACK TO OUR ROOTS

"When our small committee discussed how we could honor our long-tenured members, the operative word was "remember". What better way than rosemary. The circle? In all cultures the circle has been the symbol of long life, never ending or a continuation. And so began The Rosemary Circle. Time to Give Thought to Local Gardens


- Each year the HSA-STU allocates funds to support herbal education in local gardens. The decision about which gardens to fund is driven by the membership. Proposed gardens will be discussed at the Annual Meeting in June. More information to come.
- As a Unit, we are blessed with both healthy membership numbers and healthy finances. Over the past several years, roughly \$2,000/year has been budgeted for donations to local gardens. We have spent
- \$1,500 for the past two years from our Garden Donation funds to buy our membership in the Houston
- Botanic Garden.
- Past recipients of our charitable donations include: Nature Discovery Center in Bellaire, TX; Herb Gardens at Festival Institute in Round Top, TX; the following herb gardens in Houston: Urban Harvest, Urban Harvest Garden Education for Children Program, Center for Contemporary Craft,
- Mercer Aboretum, Houston Botanic Garden, and Sight into Sound (non-profit for visually impaired).
- Big, small, famous, or tucked away in a corner we are calling on members to propose a garden for funding that is dedicated to herbal education in some way. Please provide a description of how the garden is involved in promoting herbal understanding and how much money is needed.

Garden/gardens to receive funding will be determined by member vote at the June Annual Meeting.
