Greetings! Since our last report, the space we had identified and had begun some preliminary work on, fell through. However, we have a new space on Farmington Road (21023 Farmington Rd. 2 blocks north of 8 mile Rd. next door to Meadows Liquor) and finalized the lease a couple weeks ago. We paid a deposit of \$12,150 (refundable when we vacate the premises - down the road). Work has commenced on the build-out of this space with the expectation we will occupy it within 2 - 3 months. We also have spent just under \$6000 on build-out expenses so far. To recap, the Auxiliary donated \$4000 and SAL donated \$10,000 towards the build-out. The balance of costs will be paid out of the proceeds of the sale of the old building, which are being held in the Home Board account at the bank. On May 31, 2024, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs will launch a new program - <u>the Veterans</u> <u>Affairs Servicing Purchase (VASP) program</u> to help more than 40,000 veterans experiencing severe financial hardship avoid foreclosure and stay in their homes.

VASP is a new, last-resort tool in <u>VA's</u> <u>comprehensive suite</u> of home retention options for eligible veterans, active-duty Service members, and

surviving spouses with VA-guaranteed home loans who are experiencing severe financial hardship. Through VASP, VA will purchase defaulted VA loans from mortgage servicers, modify the loans, and then place them in the VA-owned portfolio as direct loans. This will empower VA to work directly with eligible veterans to adjust their loans - and their monthly payments - so they can keep their homes. With VASP, these borrowers will have a fixed 2.5% interest rate, which will provide a consistent, affordable payment for the remainder of their loan.



Theft watch! Many mailboxes in the area have been updated with new slots that allow only oneway insertion of envelopes. This makes it nearly impossible for thieves to steal your mail (checks, personal info, etc.). Look for these updated boxes and use them instead of older unsecured mail boxes!!

Need Internet or a Tablet for Appointments?

VA Telehealth (doctor visits) brings you the care you need, wherever you are. With video telehealth visits, you can save time and still talk face-to-face with your doctor. It can be difficult to use telehealth if you don't have internet or a video-capable device at home. VA is working to bridge this digital divide. <u>Here are the ways that VA can help you get connected.</u>

7 Ways to Avoid a Scam

1. Be skeptical when anyone contacts you. Scammers can spoof calls and emails to make it look like they are coming from legitimate sources, including government agencies, charities, banks and large companies. Don't share personal information, usernames, passwords or one-time codes that others can use to access your accounts and/or steal your identity.

2. Don't click unknown links. Whether the link arrives via email, text or direct message, never click on it unless you're absolutely certain of the sender. If the message says it's from a company or government agency, call the company using a number that you look up on your own to confirm its legitimacy.

3. Be careful with your phone. If you suspect a spam call, don't respond or press a button. The safest option is to hang up or ignore the call entirely. You can always look up the organization and initiate a call yourself if you're worried there may actually be an issue.

<u>4. Enable multifactor authentication.</u> Add this feature to any of your accounts that offer it as an option.

5. Research companies before taking any actions. Before you make a purchase or donation, take a few minutes to review the company. Do a web search for its name plus "scam" and/or "reviews" and research charities on <u>CharityNavigator</u> and <u>CharityWatch</u>

6. Don't refund or forward overpayments. Be careful whenever a company or person asks you to refund or forward part of a payment. Often, the original payment is fraudulent and withdrawn later. As far as your bank is concerned, you are on the hook for any money you voluntarily send. See also item 5 on page 7.

7. Look for suspicious payment requirements.

Scammers often ask for payments via wire transfer, money order, cryptocurrency or gift cards. Legitimate businesses do not request these types of payments.

Poppy information/e-donation instruction sheets are also available. Remember: We do not "Sell" poppies, we "Offer" them in exchange for donations. You can confidently tell



the public that 100% of these donations are used for their intended purpose!

I was once asked "Carol, why do you put so many Fraud & Scam articles in the Bulletin?"

So many reasons. 1) According to <u>AARP Fraud Watch</u> <u>Network</u>. Americans lost a total of \$43 billion dollars to fraud in 2023, and with technology changing and advancing on a daily basis, this number just keeps on growing.

2) I have had personal friends of mine lose money through scams and feel embarrassed and ashamed to tell anyone about it. If you've been caught by one of today's sophisticated scams, it doesn't mean you're stupid or gullible, it means you're human. You are not alone, not by a long shot!

3) Everyone I know (including myself) receives dozens of emails, phone calls, texts, and advertising designed to take your hard earned savings, each and every week. Informing people about scams has become a personal quest.

4) There is so much information out there to help prevent frauds and scams, and I have this platform to spread information to my friends and fellow Legion members, why would I not take advantage of it? Knowledge is power and knowledge about scams could save you hundreds or thousands of dollars. Thank you for asking, Carol

Scammers might use new technology and recent events to add a twist to tried-and-true scams.

Learn about the latest scams to stay safer in 2024. <u>1. Al-Powered Scams</u>

Scammers might use AI to: Write more convincing and natural-sounding phishing emails and text messages. - Create <u>Deepfakes</u> of celebrities to trick victims into thinking they're investing in a good company or project. - Impersonate the victim's friend or relative and ask for money as part of a grandparent scam.

- Impersonate an employer and ask for personal information.

2. Student Loan Forgiveness Scams

The scammers know people want to believe their student loans will be forgiven, and they'll use that. Scammers may contact you via phone or create phony application websites aimed at stealing your Social Security number or bank account information. They may put pressure on their victims with urgent messages that encourage you to apply for debt relief "before it's too late." Then they'll charge you a hefty application fee. It costs nothing to apply for student loan forgiveness, so someone asking you to pay a fee could be a scammer. In addition, the U.S. Department of Education won't contact you by phone. You can stay safe and avoid student loan forgiveness scams by going directly to the Department of Education website.

3. Phone Scams

- Robocalls: Robocalls may offer everything from auto warranties to vacations, or issue a threat to try and get your attention. Some robocalls can even respond to your questions.

- Impersonators: Scammers impersonate IRS personnel, police, survey takers, relatives, delivery people and wellknown companies to threaten you or gain your trust. They use scare tactics related to your Social Security number, and/or bank account before asking for your personal, account or credit card information.

QR codes: These convenient codes have gained popularity as a touchless option to do things like read a restaurant menu or make a payment. However, scammers place their QR codes in inconspicuous spots, and scanning the code could prompt you to make a small purchase or enter your credentials on a look-alike website.
One-time password (OTP) bots: Some scammers use so-called OTP bots to trick people into sharing authentication codes. The scammer might try to log in to your account, prompting the company to send you a onetime code. At the same time, the bot imitates the company and calls, texts or emails you asking for the code. If you respond, it sends the code to the scammer, who can now log in to your account.

- Text: These scams can take many forms, but the scammers often impersonate a well-known company, such as a bank, online retailer, delivery company or government agency. They might say there was suspicious activity in your account, your bill is past due, your item couldn't be delivered or that you were selected for a job interview.

They then ask you to click on a link or call a number. Often, these are attempts to get you to share personal information or install malware on your device.

4. Zelle Scams

The scammer might email, text or call you pretending to work for your bank or credit union's fraud department. They'll claim that a thief was trying to steal your money through Zelle, and that they have to walk you through "fixing" the issue. Then, they may instruct you to send the money to yourself, but the money will actually go to their account. <u>Report a scam to Zelle here.</u>

5. Romance Scams

Scammers often steal someone's identity or create fake profiles on dating and social media apps to meet victims. Scammers may use stock photos and make excuses for why they can't meet in person. After gaining your trust, they may ask you to buy them something or send them money. Or, the person may "mistakenly" send you money and ask you to send it back or forward it to someone else. If your bank later determines that their payment was fraudulent, that amount will be withdrawn from your account. See also item 6 on page 5.

6. Online Purchase Scams

Some scammers set up fake stores, buy ads for websites on social media, or list items for sale on online marketplaces. The scammers might take your money and never send anything in return. Always look for red flags such as too-good-to-be-true prices, lack of details or high-pressure sales tactics. Paying with your credit card can also help limit potential losses, if you don't receive a product or service.

7. Employment Scams

Employment scams use enticing lures to target people who've been out of work. Some scammers take a slow approach with interviews and a legitimate-seeming operation. They then collect personal information from your employment forms, or tell you need to buy equipment or training. Other scams get right to the point and promise guaranteed or easy income—if you purchase their program. Sometimes, a fake employer sends a large paycheck and asks you to send the "extra" back—a version of the popular overpayment scam (see #5). You may also see job opportunities that involve receiving money and sending funds to another account, or receiving and reshipping packages. These "money mule" and "reshipping mule" jobs are often part of illegal operations, and you could be personally liable.

8. Check Fraud

Criminals break into mailboxes and rob mail carriers to steal personal info and checks. If you mail a check and it's stolen, they might use it to create a counterfeit check and withdraw large amounts of money from your account. It might be best to avoid writing and mailing checks altogether. Making digital payments is much safer today, especially via your bank's website (if available). If you have to send a check, some pens, such as Uni-Ball pens, claim to stop check washing. Also the US Postal Service is upgrading mailboxes with new anti-theft slots, look for and use them.

Post 346 Membership Eligibility



Legion membership eligibility. Veterans or active duty military who have served at least one day of active duty in the US Armed Forces any time after Dec. 7, 1941 AND have been honorably discharged or are still serving. Potential member must present a valid DD-214 (DD-217, DD-256, or DD-257) with membership application.

Auxiliary membership eligibility. 1) Relationship to veteran: Grandmother, mother, sister, daughter, granddaughter, male or female spouse, or self (for female veterans). Per IRS regulations, step-relatives are not eligible. The IRS only allows two degrees of a blood line, so great granddaughters and beyond are not eligible. Potential member must present a valid DD-214 (DD-217, DD-256, or DD-257) of the related veteran with membership application.

2) a) Potential member must be related to a LIVING veteran by one of the relationships stated AND veteran is a current member of the American Legion.
b) OR, potential member is related to a DECEASED veteran who served at least one day of active service during eligible time periods (Apr. 6, 1917 to Nov. 11, 1918 and any time after Dec. 7, 1941) AND was honorably discharged. Deceased veteran does not have to have been a member of the American Legion.

Sons of the American Legion membership eligibility.

1) Relationship to veteran: All male descendants adopted sons, and stepsons. Potential member must present a valid DD-214 (DD-217, DD-256, or DD-257) of the related veteran with membership application.

2) a) Potential member must be related to a LIVING veteran by one of the relationships stated AND veteran is a current member of the American Legion.
b) OR, potential member is related to a DECEASED veteran who served at least one day of active service during eligible time periods (Apr. 6, 1917 to Nov.11, 1918 and any time after Dec. 7, 1941) AND was honorably discharged. Deceased veteran does not have to have been a member of the American Legion.

We know how hard it is to know everything you need to take care of when a loved one passes away. Legion Service Officers can help a deceased veteran's family receive all the benefits they may be entitled to. Remember, and tell your loved ones:

1) Know where your DD-214 is.

2) Tell your funeral director the deceased was a veteran.

3) Contact your Post, and not only can you receive the help of a Service Officer but, the Post's Honor Guard can help with a military funeral service. Other benefits might include a free burial plot, headstone, survivor benefits, burial expenses, and an American flag to drape the deceased's casket.
