I hope everyone is enjoying these longer, warmer summer days.

I attended a meeting led by District 10 Councilman Clayton Perry at the Tool Yard near the end of May. One of the interesting items that came up was about some work that will be done at the intersection of Weidner and Randolph Boulevard as part of a \$500,000 transportation and capital improvements plan.

First, some of you may have already noticed the concrete divider that went up at Interstate 35 and Weidner intersection, ostensibly to help control traffic trying to turn into the new 7-11 convenience store that has opened at the corner. Personally, I'm not happy about the longer lines that have formed to wait on the traffic light since the divider makes Weidner a one-lane westbound road approaching the I-35 intersection. But the divider is undoubtedly preventing accidents that would be occurring if eastbound traffic was allowed to turn into the 7-11 parking lot.

However, congestion at Randolph and Weidner has also been a concern over the years as new communities have popped up in our community and nearby neighborhoods. With that in mind, the city is looking to make a few improvements to that intersection.

1. Add a dedicated left turn lane that leads from Weidner to Randolph in both directions

2. Add new lane striping

3. Improve the existing traffic signal by upgrading from string wire to a more durable light pole.

4. Add pavement markings

5. Add closed-circuit TV cameras to the intersections, with plans to upgrade to radar sensors in the near future

Whatever you think about radar sensors and TV monitors at traffic lights, they are coming, and hopefully will serve as a deterrent to people wanting to run the lights at that intersection.

A marked cross walk was not listed as part of the project, but Councilman Perry said the city would find money in the budget to have one added. We'll check back in with his office to make sure this important safety feature is added. The entire improvements project is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

Councilman Perry also took the opportunity to provide an update on his priorities for the city budget.

1. Homestead exemption for seniors

2. Additional police officers on streets

3. More money toward infrastructure (streets and drainage)

The councilman pointed out the city does not have a homestead exemption for older adults in our community. We'll report on the success of his efforts since more money would have to be squeezed from other parts of the city budget to fund his other desirable priorities.

The city also provided an update on the homeless situation in our area. Overall, the number of unsheltered homeless in the San Antonio area is up 23 percent. In the District 10 area, the city has identified 27 to 30 homeless residents in the area.

The city is looking to add a dedicated outreach coordinator to work with faith-based outreach groups and other ancillary organizations to eventually develop a long-term solutions to get the homeless off the streets in District 10. The city has about a half dozen outreach professionals for the entire community today. Getting a dedicated staffer to focus just on District 10 will be a challenge.

City staff encouraged those in attendance to discourage people from giving money directly to the homeless. Carrying hand sanitizer, socks, travel size toothbrushes and toothpaste to give is a better alternative if you want to really help.

Also, there is growing concern about so-called "professional" panhandlers, people who are asking for money who may not be in real need. Things to look for are dirty fingernails, worn-out shoes and whether the homeless person is carrying a bag with clothes and other belongings. This would indicate that the person may be genuinely in need.

The signs of a long hot summer are beginning to appear. Disturbances (family and noise), assaults (family and others) are showing up in greater numbers than in previous months. It's time to cool off and handle our differences more calmly and take greater care to respect our family members, guests and neighbors.

The longest day of the summer is past and so the sun will start to set sooner. The ne'er-dowells are plying their trade in the wee hours of the morning and so that doesn't make a great deal of difference in detecting them. What would help is for everyone to turn on their porchlights and to make sure their security lights are in good working order. RR COP patrols note many security lights not working and many, many residences without porch lights to illuminate their front entrances. LED bulbs and fixtures have become much more affordable and cost very little to operate over time. If you don't presently routinely turn on your porch lights at night and haven't checked to see that your security lights are working, we ask that you do so to improve our overall safety and security.

There are other colors of course and even these three have different meanings to some and at varying times. I was curious and thought others might be interested.)

RR COP reports sometimes show frustration with walkers, joggers and bikers on the wrong side of the road and, on top of that, with dark clothing without visible markings. Yes, we live in a relatively safe neighborhood but defying convention and other's expectations is flirting with trouble. Please observe the rules of the road and make sure you are visible at night if you are in a roadway for any purpose.

The SAPD will resume COP training classes this fall with the first class on Monday evening, September 10th, 6-10 pm and another on a Saturday, October 13th, 9 am – 1 pm. RR COP needs new members to continue operating and so please plan on attending now and join us once you've been trained. Please!

Take care and watch out for one another as summer progresses, neighbors go on vacation and guests visit. **Report any and all suspicious persons, vehicles and activities immediately to the SAPD on their non-emergency number, 210-207-SAPD (210-207-7273).** We'll all benefit from the police investigating your reports. Thanks!

Club membership is around **120 members** at the time of my article submission (June 30). The membership numbers are **No Where** near last year **(162 in 2017)**. In **2016**, we had **110** members at **\$225** yielding **\$24,750**. Below is the 2017 & 2018 breakdown:

The numbers are truly discouraging and the future of the Clubhouse/pool continues to be in jeopardy. Our incoming monies should by all means be at plus and not a minus.
